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
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
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
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Chapter One

THE BEST OF NEW YORK

If you are dashing about in a New York Minute, or thinking that all the possibilities in these pages are overwhelming, this at-a-glance chapter might help you get started quickly and easily. This chapter features some easy-to-locate shops where you can find what you need if you're short on time, as well as some easy-to-make choices when in a hurry. Each store mentioned here is explained in greater depth in later chapters, and, of course, there are plenty more shops discussed inside.

Addresses in all listings are given with cross streets so that you can find your destination more easily. When taking a taxi, tell the driver the cross streets as soon as you get in the car so there is no confusion.

If you're in a hurry, the subway may be your best bet—especially for long hauls, which can get tedious (and expensive) in traffic. Never take the uptown or downtown bus when you are in a hurry unless it's an express bus; cross-town buses, however, are worth the effort.

Note: I use 34th Street as the dividing line between uptown and downtown. This is not a traditional dividing line (many people use 14th St. or 23rd St. as the official dividing point and consider 34th St. as Midtown), but I find it very handy and use it throughout this text.

YOU HAVE ONLY I HOUR TO SHOP

If you have only an hour to shop, your choices really depend on what part of town you're in, what your goals are, and how frequently you get to New York. Sometimes I'm willing to blow my single hour in town on something totally nontraditional, and sometimes I'm forced to look for something as specific as a matching button. But let's concentrate on location in this chapter, since time is so tight here.

Upper East Side

I can walk from 57th Street to 79th Street along Madison Avenue in about 2 hours, poking into whatever stores interest me (but not doing serious shopping). You can do this same stroll in an hour if you stick to window-shopping. Few districts of the city give you a better overview of why New York is so special.

Midtown Fifth Avenue

Do you want an hour's worth of visual stimulation and excitement or do you want to do some serious shopping? If it's inspiration you seek (and maybe not that much in terms of durable goods), poke in quickly at **Takashimaya** (693 Fifth Ave., at 54th St.) and **Henri Bendel** (712 Fifth Ave., at 56th St.). Then stop by **Felissimo** (10 W. 56th St.), a shop filled with whimsy and wonder.

If you really need something and need it fast, do what I do and spend an hour at **Saks Fifth Avenue** (611 Fifth Ave., at 50th St.). Saks in New York is a festival unlike any other Saks in the world, but it's also a bit of a cop-out since it's very tame. I want you to have your hour at Saks, but I do hope you've got another hour to do some shopping that's more wild and crazy.

Herald Square

One hour divided between Macy's (Broadway, at 34th St.), Forever 21 (50 W. 34th St.), and Old Navy (150 W. 34th St.) should get your shopping juices flowing. If you can do all this in an hour, you should possibly run the Kentucky Derby.

Meatpacking District & Chelsea

Take a taxi to Jeffrey (449 W. 14th St., near Tenth Ave.) and step on it. Walk over to Barneys Co-Op (236 W. 18th St., near Seventh Ave.) if you have time.

SoHo & Nolita

Sure, you can spend an hour breezily and easily in SoHo, but take time out and head for nearby Nolita! You'll only have time to window-shop, but you'll get a whirlwind tour of what's new and what's happening in New York retail. Head directly to Calypso (280 Mott St., near Prince St.).

YOU WANT TO SEE SOMETHING *VERY* NEW YORK

If you're visiting from Europe, much of American retail will seem new and fresh to you. If you're visiting from another American city, you'll find that many Manhattan versions of your favorite chain stores are bigger and better but fundamentally the same. Therefore, visiting those stores that are the epitome of New York style (even if they have stores in other cities as well) will give you supreme pleasure, whether you buy anything or not. For those reasons, check out:

YOU WANT ONE-DESTINATION SHOPPING

SoHo. No doubt about it, SoHo is bursting with new stores—some original shops and some branches of big names. The big money (Chanel, Louis Vuitton, Armani Casa) continues to move here, so if you're looking for funky, hunt for it on the fringes. If you have the energy, there are plenty of great shopping areas (let's call them SoHo Adjacent) nearby. Stores open late, so make a day of it by adding on dinner at one of the hot restaurants in the vicinity.

YOU WANT SOME PLACE NEW TO DISCOVER

Way Downtown

It's Nolita for me, which is conveniently near SoHo, so if you have the time, you can shop 'em both.

Union Square

Union Square is hardly new, but now offers tons of new stores, lots of energy, and the chance to hit the **Greenmarket** as well. Check out **Whole Foods, Trader Joe's, Filene's Basement, DSW,** and **Forever 21.** There's also some fun and funky nearby shopping, and the L train will take you directly to trendy Williamsburg, Brooklyn. Can yu get more hip, dawg?

Midtown

Head for Columbus Circle and the **Time Warner Center**, which houses a hotel, a large mall, and a huge **Whole Foods**. The mall is sort of over-glitzy, but many of the stores are one-of-a-kinds or flagships, such as the only **Joseph Abboud** home store.

YOU WANT ONE ADDRESS TO TELL FRIENDS ABOUT

Get your fix at Dylan's Candy Bar (1011 Third Ave., near 60th St.), operated by none other than Ralph Lauren's daughter. This place has two floors of goodies and items not found anywhere else, including 24 colors of M&Ms. I would have preferred a more old-timey Polo kind of decor instead of this moderne take on a penny-candy store, but the sweets are moving like, uh, hot cakes. There's a basement floor as well as an old-fashioned soda fountain. You'll see plenty of gift ideas, including beautiful ready-made and custom-made gift baskets.

ONE ADDRESS YOU CAN'T BELIEVE YOU DON'T KNOW

Speaking of Ralph Lauren, you probably think you know it all and there's not much more to say. So, have you been to **Rugby** (99 University Place, at 12th St.) yet? This new store near the NYU campus is very Ralph, but has been tweaked just so for the college set. There's clothing and gear for all of life's needs, from active sportswear to dress-up.

SOMETHING FOR THE YOUNG ONES

Toys "R" Us is all over the U.S., but the best one is at Times Square—you ain't seen nuthin' like it, I promise you. I'll give you a hint: indoor Ferris wheel. Also in Midtown are the Disney Store (711 Fifth Ave., at 55th St.) and the Metropolitan Museum of Art Store at Rockefeller Center, which has a wonderful kids' department.

BEST ARRIVAL FROM OUT OF TOWN

Manhattan is constantly invaded by foreigners, but the arrival of Sur La Table (75 Spring St., at Crosby St.)—a

tabletop-and-cookware store based in Seattle—takes the, uh, cake. This one isn't as large as many other branches, but it has an intimacy not often found in Manhattan and provides a nice change of pace for those looking for perfect table settings, gifts, or items for their own homes.

BEST DOWN & DIRTY BARGAINS

It's got to be Ladies' Mile (Sixth Ave., around 18th St.). And no, it's not just for ladies anymore. When the mayor of New York rezoned this part of downtown, discounters and off-pricers quickly moved in. The district now has off-pricers like T.J. Maxx and Filene's Basement (in the same building at 620 Sixth Ave., at 18th St.).

Although Loehmann's (101 Seventh Ave., at 16th St.) is not in this stretch, it's only a block away and should definitely be included in this neighborhood.

BEST STUFF FOR YOUR APARTMENT OR HOME

You won't believe you read this here, and I can't believe I'm writing it, but here goes: the East Side, mostly around the East 50s and 60s! We'll forego the James Robinson silver on Park Avenue and the original artworks in tony stores on East 67th Street and still have a good time.

Move over to Madison for Crate & Barrel (650 Madison Ave., at 59th St.). Or head straight for the Terence Conran Shop (407 E. 59th St.) and Bed Bath & Beyond (410 E. 61st St.), both under the 59th Street Bridge.

Not too far away, there's also a big department store at 59th Street and Lexington Avenue called **Bloomingdale's** (yep, you've heard of it before!), which has a terrific bed-linen selection that, when it goes on sale, equals discount prices. And for the final flourishes, head to **Gracious Home** (1217 Third Ave. and 1220 Third Ave., both at 70th St.).

You should also check out Lower Broadway and Ladies' Mile. Start at ABC Carpet & Home (888 Broadway, at 19th St.) and Fishs Eddy (889 Broadway, at 19th St.); then wander the side streets east of Broadway and look for the upholsterers and quiet fabric and furniture sources nestled in and around 20th Street. Or just head straight over to Ladies' Mile for Bed Bath & Beyond (620 Sixth Ave., at 18th St.). And while you're there, check out home style at T.J. Maxx, in the same building.

BEST GIFTS

Need to pick up a few quick gifts for friends? Here are a few ideas:

- A bag of gourmet coffee from Bloomingdale's (\$15).
- Bath bombs from Lush (\$5).
- Soap or a Dead Sea beauty treatment from Sabon.
- Something from Tiffany & Co. Small leather goods, scarves, and items in sterling silver are reasonably priced. I like the leather case that holds Post-it Notes (\$30).
- Health, beauty, or well-being products from a brand with limited distribution—possibly unknown in your hometown,

like maybe the Slatkin Body Therapy line, sold only at Bergdorf Goodman.

- Art or folk art from any of the museum stores—or even the street. The Metropolitan Museum of Art has a shop in Macy's and one at Rockefeller Center; look for the tin plates patterned after French china (\$7.50 each). Notebooks and stationery items are in the \$6.95-to-\$11 price range and make useful, stylish gifts.
- A gift for their pet—pet boutiques are the rage in New York. Try Canine Styles (43 Greenwich Ave., near Charles St.); the Statue of Liberty holding a dog bone is a winner at \$9. The Sherpa Shop (400 Madison Ave., near 48th St.), inside Crouch & Fitzgerald, is where you'll find high-quality totes for cats and dogs.

BEST QUICKIE SHOPPER'S LUNCH

Burger Heaven. Yummy burgers. See p. 64 for locations.

BEST HOTEL LUNCH

Fancy hotels can offer very competitively priced luncheons, served in restaurants that are true hidden gems. The Mark (25 E. 77th St., near Madison Ave.) has a great menu and a fixed-price lunch, plus it's in the heart of the Madison Avenue shopping district.

The Surrey is home to Café Boulud (20 E. 76th St., near Madison Ave.), which also has a fixed-price lunch. The Pierre (2 E. 61st St., near Fifth Ave.) also has a sensational full lunch at Café Pierre.

BEST AFTERNOON TEA

The Rotunda at The Pierre (2 E. 61st St., near Fifth Ave.)—a gorgeous location.

BEST OVERALL DEPARTMENT STORE

Saks Fifth Avenue (611 Fifth Ave., at 50th St.) has it all.

BEST SALE

Nothing beats **Saks Fifth Avenue** (611 Fifth Ave., at 50th St.) when the sale merchandise gets marked down an additional 30% to 40%.

BEST OFF-PRICER

New York is suddenly teeming with off-pricers and discounters, so a new and better resource could pop up at any time. I left my heart at Century 21, which has locations in Manhattan (22 Cortlandt St., near Church St.) and Brooklyn (472 86th St., between Fourth and Fifth aves.).

BEST RESALE SHOPS

Try Encore (1132 Madison Ave., near 84th St., second floor) and Michael's (1041 Madison Ave., near 80th St., second floor).

BEST PLACE FOR A WEDDING GOWN

Filene's Basement now holds its famous bridal sale twice a year in New York, too! See p. 287 for details.

If you time it right, you can get to the Vera Wang sample sale, usually held at the Hotel Pennsylvania. Call © 212/628-3400 for the dates and details.

If you miss the sales and want to try wholesale, the best thing to do is to shop in the **Garment District**. Try 1375 and 1385 Broadway (near 38th St.). Many makers have moved out recently, but those remaining usually sell to the public.

Should you be willing to wear a used gown (of course you are), **Michael's** (1041 Madison Ave., near 80th St., second floor) has one of the best selections in town.

If nothing but the full regalia will do, and your mom wants to sip tea while you try on your train, Saks Fifth Avenue (611 Fifth Ave., at 50th St.) has been doing this for years and remains the last of the full-service wedding belles.

And finally, I have to remind you that **Kleinfeld** of Brooklyn has just come to Manhattan (110 W. 20th St., near Sixth Ave.)—by appointment only, dear. It has over 1,000 gowns on hand and all sorts of insider information, tips, and services for the bride and her entourage.

BEST HANDBAGS

I'd head straight for J. S. Suarez (450 Park Ave., at 57th St.) which sells a variety of designer-style handbags made in the same Italian factories as the big names (Gucci, Prada). We're not talking cheap here—there's probably little for under \$100—but we are talking quality and less money than at bigname stores.

BEST "REGULAR" DRUGSTORE

Manhattan is dotted with drugstores. CVS, Duane Reade, and Rite Aid are fighting it out for the hearts and minds and teeth of New Yorkers, even in the best business districts in Midtown. Just about everywhere you wander, you can find a branch of one or all. They carry all the basics, from bottled water to beauty aids to condoms. Please note that prices on sundries in Manhattan are more expensive than anyplace else in the U.S., so you'll almost always pay less at home. Unless home is overseas.

Best for beauty supplies is **Ricky's**, which also sells wigs, jewelry, and funky gifts. See p. 226 for details and locations.

BEST FANCY DRUGSTORE

Go straight to Clyde's (926 Madison Ave., near 74th St.). Wait here please, James.

BEST MUSEUM STORE

METROPOLITAN MUSEUM OF ART STORE

Fifth Ave., at 82nd St. (Subway: 4, 5, or 6 to 86th St.).

The flagship inside the museum itself is the best, but there are multiple branches around town, including one inside Macy's and one at Rockefeller Center. © 212/570-3894. www.met museum.org/store.

BEST TRENDY SHOP

JEFFREY NEW YORK

449 W. 14th St., between Ninth and Tenth aves. (Subway: A, C, E, or L to 14th St./8th Ave.).

This place has trendsetting clothes and the attitude to go with them. There's an excellent service policy as well as a DJ. Time to rock 'n' roll. © 212/206-1272.

TRENDY WITH ARCHITECTURE

ADIDAS

610 Broadway, at Houston St. (Subway: B, D, F, or V to Broadway/Lafayette St.).

Not as large as Niketown, but the store is sleek and black and minimalist and functional all at once. © 212/529-0081. www. adidas.com.

JEAN-PAUL GAULTIER

759 Madison Ave., near 65th St. (Subway: 6 to 68th St./Hunter College).

Check out the Philippe Starck decor here. © 212/249-0235. www.jeanpaulgaultier.com.

PRADA

575 Broadway, near Prince St.

There are other Prada stores in Manhattan, but this is the one for style freaks and architecture buffs to check out. You don't have to buy anything; just bring a tissue in case you start to drool.
