Alabama

Called the Cradle of the Confederacy, Alabama is steeped in Civil War history. Fascinating tours include Montgomery, the first Capitol of the Confederacy. During the Battle of Mobile Bay, Admiral Farragut exclaimed, "Damn the torpedoes! Full speed ahead!" At the **USS** *Alabama* **Battleships Memorial Park** in Mobile, visitors can explore the park's namesake as well as over 20 other World War II ships, aircraft, and weapons. The recipient of nine battle stars in World War II, the "Mighty A" saw plenty of action as part of the Pacific Fleet—fighting in Leyte, the Gilbert Islands, and Okinawa. The *Alabama* is lovingly preserved and is open for tours all year. If you're traveling with a group, you can spend the night in the battleship's barracks. A World War II submarine, the **USS** *Drum,* is also open for tours. Exhibits in the park's Aircraft Pavilion include a B-52 bomber, and a Blackbird jet, in addition to several Medal of Honor–winning aircraft.

The Civil Rights movement thrust Alabama into the national media spotlight in the 1950s and 1960s. Defining events included the 1955 Montgomery bus boycott and the historic Selma to Montgomery march. You can gain a deeper understanding of the movement at the **Birmingham Civil Rights Institute.** Located across the street from the **Sixteenth Street Baptist Church**, site of the 1963 bombing that killed four little girls, the BCRI walks visitors through the many barriers that were overcome for the advancement of civil rights, with the aid of film, sound, and sculpture. An exhibit dedicated to human rights activists around the world is equally as moving.

Natives call Alabama "the Beautiful," and we agree. Its northeast corner lies at the southernmost terminus of the **Appalachian Mountain** range. Quaint mountain towns, such as **Mentone**, offer rich fall foliage and excellent craft and antiques shopping. Check out the **Log Cabin Restaurant and Deli**—an intimate soup-and-sandwich shop that has the best root beer float on **Lookout Mountain**. Mentone has plenty of campsites and cabins, but if the weather is nice, spaces are taken up fast—so take the time to call ahead. Mentone is also the getaway for several country music artists. In nearby **Fort Payne** ("The Sock Capitol of the World"), country music fans might want to check out the museum dedicated to hometown heroes Alabama.

Fort Payne's Little River Canyon is one of the deepest gorges east of the Mississippi. A national preserve, Little River Canyon is a sanctuary to a number of rare plants, such as the green pitcher and Kral's water plantain—an aquatic plant native to this region. Trails for hiking, horseback riding, and ATVs abound. Alabama also has four national forests, and numerous lakes throughout the state provide enthusiasts with plenty of hunting and fishing.

Campers who truly need to get away from it all can find solitude in the **Sipsey Wilderness.** A 25,000-acre spread in northeast Alabama's **Bankhead National Forest**, Sipsey is a popular spot for camping, hiking, hunting, and getting lost. With over 13 miles of trails, there is plenty of room to accommodate horseback riding, ATVs, and mountain bikes. Sipsey's climate has somewhat of a challenging for campers—temperature average between 50–75° with frequent rain—so be sure to pack accordingly.

Those looking for warmer climates will be inclined to head for the beach. Alabama's **Gulf Coast** region is home to moss-covered oak trees and white sand beaches. **Orange Beach** is known for top-notch saltwater fishing. The **Alabama Coastal Birding Trail** dots historic **Mobile Bay** with spots for viewing both wading and shorebirds.

Golf is the feather in Alabama's outdoor cap. Anchoring the golf offerings are the eight facilities of the **Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail.** An ambitious project designed by the revered architect for which the course is named, the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail is 378 holes of golf that will impress avid and novice players alike. Beautifully sculpted and reasonably priced, it's not a surprise that five of the eight courses are routinely listed as some of the best in the country.

NASCAR racing fans are familiar with the **Talladega Superspeedway**, home of the **Diehard 500** in April and the **Winston 500** in October. Combination tickets for year-round track tours and admission to the **International Motorsports Hall of Fame** are available. RVers should take note that race time in Talladega is tailgate heaven.

On the shores of 40.000-acre Lake Martin in east central Alabama, Wind Creek State Park is an excellent choice for families. Children will enjoy the large playground and variety of natural and recreational programs. Campers with lakefront sites are allowed to swim and dock boats right at the sites. Anglers will find catfish, crappie and bluegill as well as largemouth, salt water striped, white, and hybrid bass. Wind Creek State Park is not the top choice for peace and quiet as it is full of children and boats. The park should be assiduously avoided on holiday weekends. Security is outstanding at this gated and extremely remote park. The campground at Wind Creek State Park is laid out in five main sections including a primitive overflow area. The large, flat, grid-like section B is nicely shaded by a stand of loblolly and longleaf pine. Section C includes sites on an open peninsula with unobscured views of Lake Martin. Sites C190, C191, and C192 are the prettiest in spite of their complete lack of privacy. Other attractive lakefront sites are found in section D. Section E contains a few sites with lake views and a modicum of privacy (try E32, E33, E34, E36, E38, or E30). All the sites at Wind Creek State Park are small compared to other Alabama state parks. While some sites are extremely shady, the open sites tend to have better views of the lake. The back-in, paved parking spaces are in various states of repair and disrepair and may be peppered with pine straw, gravel, or grass. However, the bathhouses here are in excellent condition-large and clean with no frills.

Prairie Creek is typical of the top quality campgrounds managed by the Army Corps of Engineers. Sites are extremely spacious and most have uncluttered views of the Alabama River. Spanish moss-laden oak trees provide shade and privacy. Two of the three camping areas, Beaver Point and Eagles Roost, are newer and feature paved back-in parking. The older Whitetail Bluff camping area contains pull-throughs but is now used for overflow camping. At Beaver Point, sites 56-62 are reserved for tent campers. RV campers will not be disappointed with any of the waterfront sites, 27-51. Since so many sites are excellent, choose your site based on proximity to facilities. The campgrounds located on the Alabama River Lake system are all extremely remote. Prairie Creek makes a great summer destination as it only fills to capacity on the busiest holiday weekends. Gates lock at night making the park extremely safe. Prairie Creek is located six miles from Holy Ground Battlefield Park, site of 1813-1814 clashes

between the Creek Indians and the U.S. Army, led by General Andrew Jackson. Today, Holy Ground Battlefield Park is a day-use only recreation area with swimming beach, boat launch, playground, bathhouse, picnic shelters, multi-purpose court, hiking trails, and observation deck. Day-use fees are waived for Prairie Creek campground guests.

Though not as attractive as nearby Oak Mountain State Park, KOA Birmingham South is tidy and offers comfortably spaced sites. While reasonably attractive, Oak Mountain State park doesn't boast the most gorgeous campground in the state. The camp sites are a little ghostly—we could tell that they used to be lovely. Sites are situated in two main areas, within which site shape, size and privacy vary immensely. Area A contains 71

sites, 24 of which have full hookups. Area A is prettier, shadier and more woodsy than B, which has 72 sites crammed into half the space of A. In fact, most of area B is downright unattractive, with the exception of tent sites B6, B8, B64, and B65. All RV parking is on untidy gravel and both areas have back-in and pull-through parking. Oak Mountain is exceptional for its proximity to Birmingham. It's a good place to stay while visiting Birmingham and it's also the favored outdoor playground for the city's natives. This means that hiking, mountain biking, and other activities may not provide the solitude we would expect at other parks. Still, the park's broad offering of activities and its proximity to a number of restaurants and attractions make it a good choice for a visit. Security at Oak Mountain is fair. The back gate is never manned, but both gates are locked at night. Avoid Oak Mountain State Park like the plague on holiday weekends and during the hotter summer months.

Golf and fishing are the primary draws at Roland Cooper State Park. Created by a dam on the Alabama River, 22,000-acre Dannelly Reservoir is home to numerous fish species, as well as beaver, waterfowl, and American alligator. The nine-hole golf course is a bargain; greens fees are only \$9 for 9 holes and \$13 for 18 holes. Here, the woodlands are dominated by pine. The majority of the campsites enjoy the shade of a mature stand of loblolly pine. A bit of privacy is provided by the trees, but none of the sites are entirely secluded. Most of the sites are situated on one loop and feature paved, back-in parking. Sites 22, 24, and 28 are pullthrough sites, with views of the reservoir and gravel parking. In the primitive tent camping area, site 10 has a nice view of the water. Site size is comfortable but not exceptional. Roland Cooper's rural location and gates that lock at night make it fairly secure. Avoid this park in July and August when summer heat crescendos. Also avoid Memorial Day, 4th of July, and Labor Day, when crowds are at a maximum.

This small, privately owned campground is clean and attractive. Part of a complex that includes De-Soto Caverns and a small amusement park, the campground is sandwiched into the front corner of the property. Because some sites are only a few feet from the amusement park, quiet afternoon naps may be out of the question when the park is busy. The triangular campground offers compact sites which are well shaded by pine trees. Parking is mainly back-in, with a few pull-throughs, and patchy grass invading the gravel. Sites 2 and 3 are farthest away from AL 76 making them the quietest at night. Big rigs should avoid this tight, hilly campground altogether (opt for one of the sprawling campgrounds along Logan Martin Lake). Less than 60 miles from Birmingham, this kitschy-but-fun park will be appreciated by children especially. The Great-Onyx Cavern is the venue for a laser light show and the amusement park includes a fishing' hole, gem panning and more. Keep in mind that there is no snack bar at the park. Count on driving about 5 miles to Childersburg if you're not cooking at your site. Security is poor here. There is no gate and the campground is visible from AL 76. Cave touring is a delightful summertime activity. Just steer clear of visits during holiday weekends and big event weekends at Talladega Superspeedway.

Named after Alabama's only woman governor, Lurleen Burns Wallace, this lake is popular with anglers. The 250-acre lake is stocked with bream, catfish, crappie, and largemouth and striped bass. Rather not fish? Swim, hike, or canoe. Located 12 miles northwest of Tuscaloosa, this park stays busy all summer so we recommend weekday, spring, or fall visits. With an elevation of 2,407 feet, Mount Cheaha is the highest point in the state of Alabama. Park guests can enjoy the gorgeous mountain view from atop the observation tower. The campgrounds are also very attractive, with spacious sites and a variety of shady hardwood species. Site privacy varies, with dense foliage buffering some sites from their neighbors. There are two campgrounds at Cheaha, Number 1, or "Upper," and Number 2, or "Lower." Campground Number 1 features mostly back-in parking, but there are a few spacious pull-throughs. Parking spots are an amalgamation of dirt and gravel. In campground Number 1, sites 4 and 5 are extremely private and wooded. Large pull-through sites include 30, 31, 34, 35, and 36. Of these, 34 is the shadiest. In campground Number 2, sites 56 and 57 have a gorgeous view. Most sites in Number 2 are pull-throughs. The popularity of Cheaha's campgrounds can sometimes detract from their beauty. The campgrounds are fairly well maintained, but the rest rooms and trash bins sometimes need more attention than they get. Security is fair at this rural state park. We got the idea that gates may or may not go down at night. This Appalachian park stays cooler than most of Alabama during the summer. Nonetheless, we recommend avoiding Cheaha on summer weekends when the park's beauty and myriad activities attract the masses.

Located 28 miles from the hiking and equestrian trails at Sipsey Wilderness Area, Corinth Recreation Area offers 52 campsites with full hookups. Sites are attractive, spacious, and heavily wooded. Dense brush between sites provides privacy. The campground is laid out in two main loops plus a group camp loop. The Yellow Hammer loop is much prettier than the Firefly loop. All parking is paved. Hide your carrots. Lakepoint Resort Sate Park campgrounds are full of bunny rabbits. The flat campground is situated along Lake Eufaula, home to beaver and American alligator. Four camping areas provide over 500 sites. Of these areas, the Clark Loop, with sites along the lake, is the most attractive. Clark has only water and electric hookups, and is the best choice for tent campers. Even-numbered sites 20-42 have the prettiest views. RV campers should head for the Deer Court area, which has full hookups, and both back-in and pullthrough sites. All parking is paved and ground cover consists of grass and pine straw. Site size varies, but sites are generally comfortable. Most sites are nicely wooded with a variety of tree species, some adorned with Spanish moss. None are very secluded. With excellent resort amenities, Lakepoint Resort State Park is a good choice for active families and couples, making its remote location worth the drive. Gated at all times, campground security is excellent. This park becomes chaotic on holiday weekends and should also be avoided in July and August when it's bound to be unbearably hot and humid.

Situated about halfway between DeSoto Falls and Little River Canyon, DeSoto State Park has a rugged ambience even though it's less than 10 miles northeast of Fort Payne. Sometimes referred to as "The Grand Canyon of the East," Little River Canyon has drops of up to 600 feet. Hardcore outdoorsfolk climb the canyon's sandstone bluffs and paddle the Little River's Class III–V whitewater. The campground at DeSoto State Park is laid out in two loops, each with its own playground and rest rooms. Sites are nicely spaced and the campground is heavily wooded with a variety of hardwoods and pines, making site size outstanding and site privacy excellent. RV parking spaces are gravel. Of the 78 campsites, 10 are pull-throughs. Since all of the sites are nice, choose your site based on proximity to (or distance from) playgrounds and rest rooms. RV campers may want to procure one of the 20 sites with full hookups. Gorgeous sites make this one of the most popular campgrounds in the state, so visit in the spring to avoid the masses. This city-owned park will be a big hit with the young'uns. The historic Pioneer Homestead consists of over 50 structures which have been preserved by the city of Gadsden. Buildings such as the blacksmith shop and the loom house contain tools typically used by early Appalachian pioneers. Children will also love the passenger train, animal park, and mini-golf. Adults will appreciate the urban location, with shopping and a choice of restaurants found within six miles of the park. Everybody will enjoy the park's centerpiece, 90foot Noccalula Falls. The campground is attractive, with plenty of back-in sites and a handful of pullthroughs. A few sites have gravel parking, but most are paved. Here, site size varies greatly, with most sites being comfortably sized. The majority enjoy the shade of tall pine trees. But with little foliage between sites, privacy is poor. The prettiest sites (A19-A38) overlook the large bluff that leads down to Black Creek. Security is good at Noccalula Falls. The city of Greenville operates this impeccably manicured campground. The tidy landscaping includes native azaleas and dogwoods with intermittent shade provided by tall pines. The park encompasses two fishing lakes, stocked with catfish, bluegill, brim, bass, and crappie. For golfers, 27hole Cambrian Ridge (part of the Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail) is adjacent to Sherling Lake. Nearly deserted in the spring and fall, this campground is an excellent choice for golfers. For families, the playground is one of the nicest we've seen. The majority of the campsites are situated near the "Top Lake.' All sites have ample paved parking and there are plenty of large pull-through sites. Folks with large campers should consider 1, 14, 18, and 25-41. Although all sites at Sherling Lake are spacious, back-in sites often feel a bit more secluded. Two-thousand-acre Buck's Pocket State Park is exceedingly beautiful and not heavily visited. Built around the 400-foot deep Buck's Pocket Canyon and featuring five moderately difficult hiking trails, the park is appreciated by day hikers. Anglers can access Lake Guntersville at Morgan Cove, seven miles from the park. We were very impressed with the quiet campground that lies in the flat valley of the canyon. Completely shaded by a stand of hardwood trees, the campground features sights adjacent to lovely boulder-lined Little South Sauty Creek. Campsites are not huge, but this campground rarely fills to capacity so you'll have plenty of elbowroom. While internal roads are paved, sites offer back-in gravel parking. If you are looking for solitude, head for secluded site 17. At 900 feet above sea level, this little "pocket" of the southern Appalachians stays cooler than most of Alabama during the hot summer months. Visit Buck's Pocket comfortably during spring, summer, or fall. The park is very remote with poor signage. It is equipped with gates, but as one local said, "there ain't no need to lock 'em!"

When we visited Gulf Shores, Doc's RV Park was the quietest in town. Three miles from the beach and within easy distance to restaurants and shopping, Doc's isn't far from touristy hustle and bustle. Campsites at Doc's are built around an elliptical grassy park area. So even though sites are narrow, campers enjoy a view of the grass. Most sites have a little shade provided by trees on the periphery of the park. All sites have back-in, gravel parking which looks a little untidy in some places. The shadiest sites are 46-30. Unfortunately, the large campground at Gulf State Park offers no campsites within walking distances of the beach. However, the campground is very attractive and perennially popular with families; don't expect any solitude here during the summer months. Site size is acceptable but the bustling atmosphere makes the campground feel crowded. 185 sites offer back-in parking and 25 offer pullthrough parking. Parking areas may be paved, gravel, or packed sand. Many of the sites are shady and a few offer views of small Middle Lake. Tent sites offer soft sand tent pads. Of those with lake views, sites 17-39 are the most picturesque. Unless you really want a pull-through, avoid the noisy, highly trafficked sites along the main road. Located just a few miles from the tourist town of Gulf Shores, campers have easy access to excellent dining and other tourist attractions. Amenities within the park are also outstanding, including the state's largest fishing pier (825 feet), an 18-hole golf course, and two-and-a-half miles of white sand beach. Lake Guntersville Sate Park is really lovely, but the campgrounds are often way too crowded for our tastes. Set in a beautiful stand of tall pines, the huge campground (with over 300 sites) stays full for much of the summer. If you don't mind spending your vacation with an entire village of new friends and neighbors, you may enjoy this park. Here you will find paved back-in sites with very little privacy. Sites are small compared to other Alabama state parks. The campground is laid out in eight grid-like areas (A-F). Tent campers should head for Area A, especially sites 16 and 17. RV campers should try to land a lakeside site in Area D or G. Sites G9, G11, G12, G13, G24, and G36 are among the most attractive. Area E should be avoided as it abuts the picnic pavilion and experiences heavy traffic. Families wishing to camp right next to the playground should head for C51-C59.

Lake Guntersville State Park offers plenty of amenities and activities, but their pride and joy is the American bald eagles that winter here. The campground is gated and guarded, but security isn't fantastic because of the number of folks on the campground. We recommend visiting Lake Guntersville in spring or fall to avoid the crowds.

Little Mountain Resort is noteworthy for its modern amenities rather than its natural beauty. Located on Guntersville Lake, the resort caters to active families and large groups. For fishing and

boating enthusiasts, there's a boat launch, marina, fishing pier, and two covered piers containing a total of 86 boat slips. Land amenities include a 500-seat great hall as well as multiple swimming pools and other activities. The gigantic campground is a no-frills affair with mid-sized sites. There are no barriers to provide privacy between sites. Back-in gravel parking is the rule and no tent camping is allowed. The prettiest sites are numbers 110-119 and 110A-119A, which are adjacent to the lake and have power and water only. The nicest sites with full hookups and views of the lake are 18-20, 27-29, 36, 37, 120, and 121. Avoid sites in the 200s and 300s, which have unattractive views of the boat and RV storage areas. Some sites are completely open while others provide plenty of shade. In spite of Little Mountain's extremely remote location, you may feel like you've arrived in Lower Manhattan once you're here. This flat campground on top of Monte Sano features lovely hardwoods with foliage between all campsites. In some instances, sites are very secluded by dense foliage. In the heart of William B. Bankhead National Forest, Clear Creek offers incredibly spacious sites with majestic views of Lake Lewis Smith. This suburban campground is a perfectly acceptable place to stay while visiting Birmingham and Tuscaloosa County. This park's location is its saving grace. On the banks of Logan Martin Lake, the park maintains boat launches, fishing piers, and a swimming area. Area attractions include the Talladega Superspeedway and DeSoto Caverns. Campers hoping to enjoy the beauty of nature will have to leave Lakeside Landing. We suggest a drive to Pell City Lakeside Park where you'll find walking trails, picnic facilities, and boating and fishing facilities in a more natural setting. The huge campground at Lakeside Landing won't win any beauty contests, but it is clean and well equipped. There are back-in and pull-through sites that once featured paved parking. The necessity of a waterway connecting the Tennessee River to Mobile Bay was noted as far back as 1770, when the Marquis de Montcalm made a report to King Louis XV. Since before Alabama attained statehood, governors have asked Congress to fund such a project. Finally completed in 1985, the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway flows south from the Tennessee River. Aliceville Lake is now one of many recreation destinations along the Tenn-Tom. Straddling the Alabama-Mississippi border, the lake provides fishing, swimming, and other activities. The Pickensville campground consists of 176 sites laid out in three loops and two spurs. Though mostly flat, the campground is very attractive. Sites are shaded by a variety of tree species and the water's edge is graced with lovely cypress trees. All roads and parking spaces are paved. Most of the sites offer back-in parking and a good deal of privacy. Eight pull-through sites are gigantic, but lacking in privacy. Riverside sites, numbered 105-138, have the nicest views of the water. Built next to a cypress-lined creek, sites 49-61 are also very pretty. Attractive and clean with friendly owners, Logan Landing is a good choice if you plan on spending a few days in the area. Alaska

Alaska, seemingly the granddaddy of destinations for RVers and campers, lives up to its reputation as the last frontier in several ways. Glaciers, mountains, crystal-clear streams, and wildlife appear as otherworldy entities that make you reconsider your standard perceptions of an untamed wild. However, in this state you will also be entering another world of RV parks and campgrounds. After you cross the mountainous border, you notice that the quality of both state and private campgrounds changes dramatically. Here, many private RV parks look like they were constructed hastily, without consideration for aesthetics and privacy. Bulldozed lots that sandwich vehicles together are more standard than not. State campgrounds and facilities don't fare much better for RVers. Although generally more private, they tend to have bumpy roads, uneven campsites accommodating only the shortest of vehicles, few facilities, and no hookups.

Primitive though the campgrounds may be, they are nothing compared to the road system. Although most of the state's main roads are now paved (some just recently), what is considered a highway in Alaska is a backcountry road to the rest of the nation. Except for Anchorage and Fairbanks, even modern thoroughfares are mostly narrow, single lanes without shoulders, curb banks, or passing areas. Factor in the many unexpected curves, a stargazing trucker in front of you, slower speed limits, or the occasional moose blocking the way, and your travel time increases significantly. As a general rule, it would be very difficult to cover more than 300 miles in one day if you planned on making any pit stops. A three-week minimum stay is recommended to see Alaska, though travel agencies and tour guides say at least two months. Visitors are always surprised just how far it is from one civilized destination to another and how slow the pace can be. However, your trip will be worth every pothole, irregular campsite, and outhouse. Alaska is worth every square foot you drive.

If you're the adventuresome type and need a distraction from all the distractions, the 49th state has a few peculiarities for your fancy. If in Nome on the Seward Peninsula around Labor Day, make plans to attend the **Great American Bathtub Race**. If heading back east at the start of March, and you enjoy seeing frozen water get sculpted, Fairbanks holds the annual **World Ice Art Championships**. Arriving early could mean witnessing an ice harvest from O'Grady Pond. Still around Fairbanks in July? Might as well attend the city's **Golden Days** festival to witness the hairy chest, legs, and beard contest or the rubber duck race on the Chena River. To see the northernmost totem pole in the world, though, you'll have to head due north to **Barrow Point**, the northernmost inhabited locale in the United States.

The scenery in Alaska is unrivaled, and you will find yourself gasping and holding your breath countless times a day. Just when you begin to think you've captured the mountains from every possible angle, suddenly you turn a corner to see a heart-stopping scene that makes you feel like you're the first to glimpse these giant rocky wonders. The massive hanging and piedmont glaciers are visible right from the highway, the turquoise water of the lakes and streams, sprawling forests of spruce and birch, and seemingly endless fields of wildflowers all conspire to woo you.

In addition, if viewing wildlife is your goal, there is nowhere better than Alaska. Wake up very early to increase your chances of seeing moose by the roadside. Besides moose, there are caribou, Dall sheep, 300 varieties of migrating birds, whales, wolves, foxes, coyotes, and bears—just some of the animals you have a chance of glimpsing on your trip. If it's fish you came here for, then welcome, anglers, to the state where the fabled 98.5-pound king salmon and 395-pound halibut were caught. Fishing opportunities are as bountiful as mosquitoes are chummy in this state.

Anchorage RV Park, located 15 minutes east of downtown, takes camping in Alaska to an entirely new level. This immaculate and well-maintained campground spoils RV travelers for all other parks. With 195 full-hookup sites, one might think that campers feel overcrowded here; however, plenty of birch and spruce trees, coupled with manicured flower gardens, make it easy to forget that you are at the largest campground in the state's largest city. And besides, one can always seek reprieve in the cedar-lined lounge area, where a fireplace, TV, games, books, and coffee make guests feel like they are back home in their living rooms. For travelers who don't want to waste time shopping, Anchorage RV Park has a general store and gift shop right on the premises. And for those who can't quite get used to the cooler temperatures of the state, Anchorage RV Park offers rest rooms with heated floors to keep those toes toasty. Both back-in and pull-through sites are available, although the latter are a bit more expensive. We preferred the most wooded sites, 101-115, but keep in mind these are quite far from the rest rooms and showers. Anchorage RV Park is located adjacent to Elmendorf Air Force Base, so if you hear a deep rumble, look up for F-16s flying daily maneuvers. Also keep your eyes peeled for the fox and moose that like this part of town.

If you are looking for a truly Alaskan camping experience, Granite Creek campground, tucked into a trio of Chugach mountain peaks, will not disappoint you. This campground is only a half mile off the Seward Hwy.; but it can still be considered "off the beaten track," since Anchorage locals tend to occupy the campground on weekends, and out-of-state visitors rarely find their way here. You'll have to come prepared with plenty of food and fuel (as well as mosquito spray from mid-June to mid-July) because you will not find convenience stores or other amenities for at least 25 miles in any direction. However, the nature-lover will be entertained merely by listening to the rushing waters of Granite Creek, taking in the stunning views of the Chugach mountains, or identifying the lush variety of wildflowers that fill in the gaps between spruce trees. All sites are back-in, spacious, and private. However, the loop layout is a bit tight for extra-long vehicles, and it is not recommended for RVs 30 feet or longer. You'll find the most impressive views at sites 8, 11, 12, and 16. although a bad site does not exist at Granite Creek Campground. Chances of spotting moose are high

here, particularly if you are an early riser. Ask the campsite manager where to look.

If you've been traveling awhile and feel that all campgrounds look alike, Montana Creek will offer a refreshing change of pace. Attention to detail is what makes this campground stand out from the rest. Sheila Lankford, the owner and operator of the campground, tends her perennial gardens and campsite grounds personally, and vibrant displays of wildflowers and berries are sure to delight those with or without a green thumb. Sheila was born and raised on a homestead in this area, and she can offer guests great stories and solid traveling advice. Look for her with her dog, Cody. Montana Creek Campground has 18 back-in/pull-through sites with electric hookups available in a grassy area adjacent the creek. All-sized rigs can be easily accommodated here. These sites all have new fire pits and grills, as well as lanterns for the evening hours. For smaller RVs, more scenic, dry camping is available in the meandering campground loops tucked into birch and spruce woods. Campers will enjoy the private, heavily treed sites that have been uniquely named after regular guests. Our favorite spot was "Hilton's Hotel" located right next to the serene Montana Creek bed.

Only blocks away from downtown, Ship Creek Landings offers guests a resting spot that is within minutes of the highlights of Alaska's largest city. However, this campground is not one to choose for its scenery or quality. Located in Anchorage's warehouse district, dilapidated buildings surround the area, and the Alaska railroad passes directly by. Looming power lines cut through the center of the campground, and even though the city's hub is so close, a steep hill and industrial traffic do not make walking ideal. All of this said, Ship Creek does offer full hookup camping, clean rest rooms and showers, and a convenient location. It is also within the vicinity of Anchorage's prime fishing creek-you guessed it, Ship Creek. This loopshaped campground consists of mostly back-in sites, but four pull-throughs are also available for larger rigs. A separate area at the back of the campground offers respite for tenters only. Besides a steep birch-lined hill bordering one side of the campground, there is little plant life. About five feet of grass separates individual spaces. We found no one site to be better than another. It is simply a choice between being next to a power line or a fence.

Relatively new to the RV scene, this immaculate and newly paved campground is a stone's throw away from Portage and Whittier, as well as an ideal overnight stopover for travelers heading to Seward or Homer. Williwaw is a U.S.F.S. campground, and therefore without hookups or other amenities—but waking up to the dynamic blue of the hanging Middle Glacier, the campground backdrop, is an experience sure to delight young and old alike. Campsites are spacious and private and can easily accommodate the largest of RVs. With both pull-through and back-in spaces available, it is worth planning ahead and making reservations for a campsite with a view of the Glacier. We recommend sites 2–6 or 34–36.

When you begin to feel the need to pamper yourself after long days on the highway, spend a night at the Kenai Princess RV Park for a bit of luxury. The park itself is nothing extraordinary; however, it's adjacent to the beautiful Kenai Princess Lodge, where RV guests are welcome to dine in the restaurant, enjoy an evening cocktail outside at the bar, use the facility exercise equipment, or dip into the indoor and outdoor Jacuzzis located on the grounds. During your time at this facility, you will feel like a coach passenger who just got bumped to first class. A small campground tucked well away from the main roads, Kenai Princess RV Park is quiet and without traffic. The peak of Cecil Rhode Mountain makes for a stunning backdrop, and the glacial waters of the Kenai River are just a short walk away. The campground has a pleasant border of Sitka spruce, but the individual sites are without trees, and only about ten feet separates campers. All sites are back-ins-the longest being 55 feetso extra-large rigs might find the campground to be a tight squeeze. No sites stand out as superior or inferior, but we do recommend a spot that is away from the dump station since the tour buses going to and from the lodge utilize the area throughout the day and can be somewhat distracting.

If you're looking to capture some of the hearty Alaskan spirit from the days of yore, Denali Grizzly Bear Cabins and Campground will make you feel like you're back in the pioneer times. One of the highlights of this campground is chatting with the workers here. Most of them are part of the Reisland clan, descendants of the family that settled this land decades ago. Siblings and cousins now run the campground in the summer, and they have gone to great lengths to preserve some of the flavor of yesteryear. Take a few moments to admire the unique Alaska paraphernalia that decorates the general store and office. Almost everything you see has a story behind it. With several thickly wooded back-in sites (and two pull-through sites) available, all-sized rigs can be accommodated, but longer vehicles may have some difficulty maneuvering if they wander beyond their designated area. This campground has many loops and turns, making campers feel like they're much farther away from the park highway than they really are. The rushing Nenana River that borders the campground, coupled with the snow-capped mountains in the background, complete the effect of being away from it all. Ask for a riverside site if possible.

This campground, the halfway point between Tok and Anchorage, is not a destination in itself, but

rather a place to layover before journeying to your next checkpoint. However, the highway-weary traveler will find a surprisingly unique experience at Mendeltna Creek Lodge. Set in the gnarly black spruce forest with the sinuous Mendeltna Creek flowing by, the campground has a bit of a rustic, wild feel to it. This campground has treed sites with plenty of back-ins and pull-throughs. The several loops and slightly bumpy road make some parts of the campground difficult for larger rigs, but ultimately all can be accommodated. The sites are not numbered and seem slightly scattered about. We preferred the creekside sites, but they are the farthest away from the showers and rest rooms. Overall, the campground is clean and on par with Alaska's other RV sites-it simply has a very "seasoned" feel to it.

Set just where the Glenn Hwy. T-bones the Richardson Hwy., Northern Nights is a convenient stopover for those en route to Tok, Fairbanks, Valdez, or Anchorage. This spruce-lined campground is tucked away from the roar of the trucks and cars on the highways and has a quaint, cozy atmosphere. It is a good place to refuel, get a hot meal in town, and make preparations for the following day's travel. As an added bonus, if you stay at Northern Nights on a Monday or Wednesday, you can join in on their free bonfire and dessert nights-an attraction worth timing your visit for. The town of Hope is a tiny speck on the Alaska map that is often overlooked by tourists. However, the traveler who ventures off the Seward Hwy. and down the curvy 18-mile road to this vintage goldmining community will not regret the detour. Seaview RV Park lies on the edge of Hope and is host to the downtown area's only bar and dinner restaurant. Sweeping views of the Turnagain Arm, coupled with a convenient placement, allow one to ignore the fact that the RV park itself is a barren, crowded lot with back-in and pull-through sites to accommodate all vehicles. Since there is little to no privacy between sites (and because there is a bar next door) this is not a campground for a person who sleeps lightly. However, for the more sociable, Seaview RV Park is an ideal place to meet local Alaskans, fish for salmon in Resurrection Creek, and explore a few well-preserved remnants of the gold rush.

This campground is justly named. On a clear day, the view of the famous mountain trio I.R.S. (Iliamna, Redoubt, Spur) will remind you why you came to Alaska. Although just off of the Sterling Hwy., Scenic View feels more remote than other RV Parks on the Kenai Peninsula, with very little development in the surrounding area. Scenic View would make a wonderful stopover on the way to Homer, as well as offer a great rest stop for adventurers who want to try their hand at digging up razor clams at the nearby Clam Gulch. Scenic View Campground is located on a gently sloping hill reaching downward toward the Cook Inlet. All sites here are back-in, but larger vehicles can be accommodated. There is about five to ten feet between camping spots, and grass or shrub-covered strips separate sites. Request a site next to the ocean and away from the highway. Wherever you end up, you'll have an amazing view.

We chose to feature this park because it is a bit off the beaten path, and during busy times when other RV parks are bursting at the seams, Mountain View RV Park will likely be able to accommodate you even at the last minute. This pleasant campground is located three miles off the Glenn Hwy. in Palmer and offers close and personal views of Marsh, Byers, and Lazy Mountains. With spacious, grassy sites and farms on either side, Mountain View RV Park feels more like a stay in the country than a wilderness getaway. Of course, one does have to overlook the many trucks, cars, and engine parts stored behind the campground office. Come here on the Fourth of July, when the owners throw their barbecue bash for the whole town, and you can join the festivities for free. Mountain View RV Park consists of mostly pull-through sites that easily accommodate all rigs. There are no trees on the campground, as the owners say this keeps away insects. Anywhere from five to ten feet separate the sites. We found that sites 1-5 and 22-25 offered the best view of the mountains and were conveniently located.

This sprawling campground spans almost the entire Seward waterfront, and it's probably one of the most popular RV destinations on the Kenai Peninsula. Visitors will understand why when they arrive; the panoramic views of the Kenai Mountains and Resurrection Bay are breathtaking, and the variety of activities within walking distance from this campground will make you want to schedule more than one night here. Waterfront Park is always active with the hustle and bustle of tourists, and there is very little distance or privacy between RVs. However, you will be too busy sighting bald eagles, looking for whale spouts, and enjoying the ever-changing sunlight in the mountains to notice the crowds. Make reservations for a waterside campsite (sites 12-82 are best), and then bring your walking shoes and take the scenic paved trail either to the Small Boat Harbor, where you can watch the fisherman bring in their daily cache, or to downtown, where shopping and dining are bountiful.

If you are going to Alaska to fish, you might as well head straight for Centennial Park Municipal Campground in Soldotna. Located directly on the Kenai River, this campground includes a popular fishwalk where guests can cast for dolly vardens, red salmon, and king salmon within walking distance from their campsite. Be careful not to tell too many friends about this coveted fishing hole, since it is a favored area for locals and annually returning guests. Evenings at this campground are lively as fisherman fry up their daily catch and talk about "the one that got away." Centennial Park consists of a series of winding loops and is snugly tucked into a forest of spruce and birch. Vehicles of all sizes can be accommodated, but some of the curves will be a bit tight for larger RVs, and all sites are back-ins. Riverside sites are far superior to the inland ones. Campsites on the water include sites 6, 7, 9, 21, 23, 24, 25, 27-31, 84, 86, 88, 91, 93, 95, 97, 98, 100, and 102.

Bayside RV Park is set amongst several other RV parks in Valdez, but this campground stands out for its cleanliness, friendly atmosphere, and waterfront campsites. If you're looking for information about the surrounding area, or are just in the mood to chat with someone, Chuck is the man to talk to. Bayside RV Park is basically an open gravel lot, but it's set on the edge of tranquil Prince William Sound with 360° views of the Chugach mountains. The campground is within walking distance from all the major attractions, and local tours can be booked directly through Chuck. There are no trees at this campground, so privacy is minimal, but this is the case at most RV parks in Valdez. At Bayside, the availability of full-hookup sites (plus cable) coupled with unlimited hot showers make this campground a welcome sight after driving the somewhat grueling Richardson Hwy. We preferred the waterside sites, odd numbers 1-41. Sites 45-66 are closer to the highway and tend to be a bit noisier. Both back-ins and pull-throughs campsites are available, and all size rigs can be accommodated.

For many, one of the primary goals of visiting Alaska is to see the longest rock face in the world, Mt. McKinley (more commonly referred to as Denali by Alaskans). Unfortunately, 75 percent of the tourists who visit this area do not even get a glimpse of this elusive monolith, since it is usually cloaked in a thick layer of clouds. However, if you are willing to take a chance that during your visit the weather will break, then the Denali View North Campground is the place you'll want to be

when the sun finally does shine. Views of Mt. McKinley are the sole reason this campground was constructed, as there are no other attractions or guided activities for 30 miles in any direction. However, if the mountain does reveal itself, seeing it from this campground will be the highlight of your trip. A newly paved lot with extra-long pullthrough sites makes this campground easily accessible to even the longest of vehicles. There are no hookups here, but a campground water pump is available, as well as regularly maintained outhouses. Some picnic tables and grill areas line the campground. There are also informational placards, a spotting scope, and benches to rest and enjoy the view. The campground is designed so that all RVs face the mountain. However, this really is a parking lot-style campground, and there is little to no space between sites.

Arizona

Arizona blends a rich Native American past and present with a wild West legacy of cowboys, cattle, and mining. Snowbirds annually flock to Arizona's deserts for the mild winter temperatures, golf, and Major League Baseball's spring training **Cactus League**. Hundreds of RV parks with every imaginable amenity come to life to accommodate the winter influx, and most book up well in advance of the annual RV migration.

The desert has its own distinctive brand of beauty. The hardiest of heat lovers will gladly brave summer temperatures soaring past 110° in capital city Phoenix at **Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument** to take in the splendors of the **Sonoran Desert**. Many opt for the cooler months from fall through the spring wildflower season. Though still in the 100s, Tucson summer temperatures are about 10° cooler than those in Phoenix, and get even cooler if you visit the **Colossal Cave** and learn the legend behind the money supposedly hidden there. If that's not cool enough, the summer monsoons can be refreshing but generally bring flash floods. If you miss the monsoons, visit the world's tallest fountain in **Fountain Hills, Maricopa County,** and get downwind from a breeze to bask in the mist. By August, bird-watchers invade the **Upper San Pedro River Valley** southeast of Tucson, an area about 15° cooler than Phoenix. History abounds in **Bisbee,** an old copper mining town with an RV park overlooking an open pit mine. Few ghost towns rival Tombstone's ambience, not to mention the world's largest rose bush, which blooms there every April. Water-formed **Kartchner Caverns,** where you can witness the largest natural column in the 48th state as well as the most minuscule of formations, satisfies an appetite for geological oddities.

Arizona is also a land of mountains, which means winter sports and summer campgrounds that are a refuge from the desert heat. Both deserts and mountains abound with lakes and reservoirs, and fishing and boating are a popular part of the cooling summer mix. Outside Flagstaff, you can venture to and climb Arizona's highest point, **Humphrey's Peak**, for a tremendous 360° view of the land. The **Colorado River** along Arizona's western border is a water playground with a collage of private RV parks, marinas, and state and county campgrounds between Parker and Lake Havasu, home of the old **London Bridge.** Nearby **Quartzsite** becomes a giant winter flea market and gem show, attracting over a million visitors who park their RVs on Bureau of Land Management land all over the desert. Equally as exciting but more intimate and obscure is the annual solar egg-frying contest every July 4 in Oatman. Anyone can enter, but your egg must be done within the 15-minute time limit. Don't forget to feed carrots to the wild burros that carouse freely around the town—over the years they have been fed and enjoyed one too many eggs, so they are on a more strict diet now.

The **Grand Canyon** to the north is an international attraction and gateway to the **Navajo Nation. Canyon de Chelly**, just east of the Hopi Indian mesas, is also on most international itineraries as a link to the past through the 1600-year-old-plus ruins, and through the Navajo who presently reside and farm here. There is no camping inside the **Painted Desert** or **Petrified Forest National Park**, but choices outside the parks, between Winslow and Holbrook, range from archaeological sites and power-plant cooling reservoirs to commercial campgrounds. While in the area and looking for something touristy to do, take a trip out to **Four Corners** and you might get invited to square dance in four states at the same time. South of the Petrified Forest is high mountain country, with a number of forest, lake, and reservoir campgrounds, and even a White Mountain Apache casino RV park for those wanting some Nevada-style action.

Designated an International Biosphere Reserve by the United Nations in 1976, Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument showcases Sonoran Desert plants (28 cactus species) and animals adapted to extremes like summer air temperatures of 118° and ground temperatures of 175°. The Monument's namesake, organ pipe cactus copes in part by only opening its lavender-white flowers at night. Campers cope best by coming from October to April, when daytime temperatures are in the 60s and 70s. The campground stays open through the torrid summer, when the organ pipe and other cacti colorfully bloom and storms suddenly appear out of nowhere, triggering flash floods. Hardy tent campers can head to more primitive campgrounds, some in cooler mountains with juniper, oak, rosewood, agave, and jojoba. Lukeville has Mexican food, and plenty of hookups are available in Why and Ajo, 22 and 36 miles north, respectively.

The big news at Lost Dutchman State Park is the addition of showers, though being without hookups this was never the sort of place people came to for RV amenities. The major attractions here are the great views of the spire-like Praying Hand rock formation backed by the tall Flatiron formation, plus many nature trails for hiking and horseback riding. The area's intriguing eroded rock formations are fronted with saguaros, palo verde cholla, and other desert vegetation tall enough to screen the campsites and add privacy. The campground's 35 sites are divided into three small loops within a larger loop, so the natural environment predominates over camping neighbors. These natural environment qualities, not the presence or absence of standard amenities, cause this campground to fill up fast. The group-camping area sometimes doubles as overflow. BASICS

Without the age restriction of many of the megalots in the Mesa-Apache Junction area, this place is a great family destination. The combination of decent-sized lots (50 × 25 feet on average), attractive landscaping, views of the Superstition Mountains, and full services makes this a campground worth your while to visit. Tent sites are well tucked away, but would be improved with grass instead of gravel. RV sites 116 and 177 sport a fine mature shade tree, making them the best for the money. Far enough from the main highways so that the only external sound is the wind blowing, Cochise Terrace is like a little city with street lights. Streets have bird names like Raven Road and Quail Run, and an 80-foot-tall American flag near the front entrance office doubles as a navigation landmark. Barrel cactus, ocotillo, mesquite, and a wash are reminders that there is a desert surrounding this little oasis of paved streets. There are almost 100 annual residents of Cochise Terrace, and the 200plus remaining RV sites are particularly popular with snowbirds. So, if the largest 42-foot site is needed for a winter visit, call ahead and reserve it. As far as locations go, this is about as central a base for touring southeast Arizona as there is, being an easy drive to almost all the sights from Tucson and Tumacacori to Tombstone and Bisbee.

The Caverns, which require separate admission tickets (call (520) 586-CAVE for cavern tour reservations), are limestone caves with pooling shelfstones, spar crystals, cave pearls, dripping stalactites, stalagmites, coral pipes, columns, and drapery. Discovered 49 miles southeast of Tucson by two cave explorers in 1974, the caverns were kept secret until purchased as a state park in 1988. The Discovery Center has an explanatory video, plus a hummingbird garden. The campsites are very large, and include 16 50-amp pull-through sites. Thick mesquite barriers between sites provide privacy, and agave, ocotillo, and prickly pear make this campground one of the most beautiful in the desert. However, the attractive sites fill up early almost every day of the year. Since there are no campground reservations, be prepared to make this a day trip and find alternative campsites in Benson, Huachuca City, and other nearby areas.

Roughly 10 miles from the nearest highway and 30 miles to the nearest town of any size, Betatakin campsite is rustic and isolated in the extreme. Hidden amidst piñon, juniper, sage, and a smattering of yucca, sites are far enough away from the visitor center to avoid light pollution. On a clear night, the sky comes alive with stars, and the only sounds to be heard are the chirping, fluttering, or howling of nocturnal animals. This campsite is so natural that there are even black-bear warnings issued, and campers would be wise to keep their sites free of trash or food that might attract a bear. The visitor center contains a small display of artifacts, and shows informative videos upon request. Guided tours to the ruins can be reserved up to two months before your trip, but are only offered between Memorial Day and Labor Day. The canyon is still used by Navajo Indians, who herd sheep and gather herbs that can only be found in this canyon. Hopi Indians also still make a yearly pilgrimage to a sacred spot for a Sun Clan ritual.

Perched on a circular hilltop just opposite and above the Oueen Mine Tour, with RVs circled around the perimeter like a wagon train, the Queen Mine RV Park looks out on orange, ochre, and gray hillside layers exposed by a deep pit copper mine known as the Lavender Pit. Some may call the pit mine a scar on the face of the Earth, but it has its beauty, particularly after a rain when the hillside colors become deeply saturated. For at least a brief moment it is possible to fantasize that a mighty river, rather than copper miners, carved out this three-quarter-mile wide, 950-foot-deep chasm filled with water at the bottom. In any event, it is just a block downhill from this clean, well-run, breezy hillside RV park to the start of Bisbee's historic old Main St. and all the shops, restaurants, hotels, galleries, theaters, and saloons.

Located off a roundabout southeast of the Lavender Pit mine, Shady Dell got its start in 1927 when copper mining was going strong and Bisbee was better known than Phoenix. Getting a campsite here is tough, and late afternoon arrivals are usually of out of luck, as most of the campground is rented out to year-round campers. Even more coveted than the camping sites are the furnished aluminum travel trailer rentals, an homage to American road travel that includes a 1949 Airstream, 1950 Spartanette, 1951 Royal Mansion, and 1954 Crown, all furnished in near original blonde woods and polished aluminum with vintage radios, blackand-white TVs, phonographs, and vinyl records of early rhythm and blues and big bands. Dot's Diner, a ten-stool 1957 art deco Valentine model, makes Shady Dell a good early breakfast stop even if not camping.

A small, friendly village with a great little bakery guaranteed to defeat efforts to keep off the pounds, Black Rock is a welcome refuge from the January and February crowds jamming nearby Quartzsite. A few trees and cacti-lined gravel streets with names like Which Way, What Street, Wash Way, Fun Gully, and Easy Street. Desert amenities abound for snowbirds, and people here enjoy walking alongside the road. Winter activities include Sunday afternoon ice cream socials, bean bag baseball, line dancing, cribbage, crafts, painting classes, exercise programs, bingo, darts, pinochle, and jam sessions. The rec hall attracts entertainers like Terry Raff, the singing mountain man. The area to the north is BLM land with ATV and hiking trails, as well as 18 holes of golf and a remote control airfield for flying model planes. On the northern outskirts of Bullhead City, along AZ 68, between Davis Dam and the Laughlin Bridge, there are three clusters of camping sites with palms and eucalyptus along the banks of the Colorado River. This former federal housing area for Davis Dam workers, now a regional county park, looks across the river a mile to Laughlin, Nevada's glimmering casinos, and is the area's best

combination of outdoor activities and casino proximity. Hardy outdoor types can swim, boat, jet ski, fish for world record striped bass (59 lbs., 12 oz. caught just below Davis Dam), and walk to Laughlin for food, gaming, and outlet shopping. Children have a safe, shallow swimming cove and spacious play areas with swings, slides, and basketball hoops. Dogs are commonplace, and the roar of the nearby highway and river traffic add to the noise. The most coveted sites, particularly for tents, are the 50 beachfront ramadas with tables and grills near the north beach fishing pier.

Overlooked by a scrub-covered hill with exclusive houses at the crest, this campground is pretty, with well-tended landscaping. The campground is laid out in rows, half located by the entrance, and the other half or so on a terrace at the foot of the hill at the west end of the grounds. Ancient Puebloans occupied 83,000-acre Canyon de Chelly National Monument at least as long ago as 350 AD, and sites like the White House Ruins, Canyon del Muerto, and Spider Rock attract visitors from around the world. At least 20 Navajo families still seasonally graze their sheep and plant corn crops here, and 4WD- and ATV-guided tours

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into Canyon de Chelly are a tourist staple. Overlook views and the White House Ruins trail are free, as amazingly enough is the campground. When Cottonwood's free sites are gone, private Spider Rock RV Park (P.O. Box 2509, Chinle, AZ 86503; (520) 674-8261; no hookups) ten miles southeast on South Rim Dr. is happy to have the business. Although the campground is sandwiched between two busy roads, one side borders woods, and there are enough trees in the park itself (most sites have several) that the camp feels more rural than its urban location should warrant. Noise is a bit of a problem, given the proximity of I-40 and the 75 trains that run daily through town. Furthermore, since tent sites are simply RV sites that "for one reason or another" are unusable for RVs, tenters

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would be advised to push on to the Ponderosa Forest campground in Parks. However, RV campers don't have it nearly so bad, and there are some impressive views of Arizona's highest mountain (Humphreys Peak) from inside the park. One of the excellent Maricopa County Parks ringing the Phoenix area, McDowell Mountain attracts many groups; individuals using the Mayo Clinic in Fountain Hills, and mountain bikers coming to race on the competitive track. With over 100 picnic tables and grills, this is also a popular day-use park, featuring 50 miles of mountain biking and horseback riding trails traversing several ecosystems with six different rattlesnake species. Even though surrounded by the Superstition, McDowell, and Four Peaks Mountains, the park is conveniently located near urban areas. An Native American casino is nearby, downtown Phoenix is just 20 miles away, and Scottsdale is within 6 miles for those wanting to shop and enjoy the urban amenities. The campsites at McDowell's E. Near Painted Rocks Dam and Reservoir, Painted Rock Petroglyph Site and Campground is a place for self-sufficient campers carrying their own water and firewood. It also makes a good picnic lunch stop when approaching or leaving Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument via I-8. The drive to the campground has lots of dips and flood-warning signs, as sculpted hills and grain and alfalfa fields teeming with birds give way to desert scrub. The one-acre rock outcropping behind the covered tables chained to the ground in the eating area is densely covered with petroglyphs depicting spirals and animals as varied as deer, lizards, snakes, coyotes, and birds. During the hot summer months of May to Oct., the campground is rarely used, and there is no fee. The only noise most nights is that of howling coyotes, though there are three huge group areas that have the potential to cause noise disturbance.

One of the Phoenix area's six little-known Maricopa County parks, Estrella is scenically situated 18 miles southwest of Phoenix in 19,200 acres of mountainous terrain with horse and hiking trails. Weekends during the school year, Estrella is crowded with scout and school groups, many camping in the deep mesquite shade of the Navy Area and using the park's many playgrounds. Weekdays and school vacations, with the exception of special events like dog shows and medieval pageants, Estrella is relatively empty. The six sites with RV hookups are near the amphitheater and stable area. Tent campers can camp almost anywhere on acres of flat grass, in the open or among shady mesquite groves. The mesquite tree shade can cool the area underneath by 10°, enough to make summer camping bearable.

One can imagine by looking at Mather Campground how the Anasazi slowly ground their way out of existence: a large number of people competing for limited resources. Campers are definitely advised to arrive early-the earlier, the better. Large numbers of people want to camp within the Grand Canvon's boundaries, and with hikers taking advantage of the maximum stay of seven nights, numerous campsites will already be taken when you arrive. By 4 p.m., it is a scramble to pick up any spot, which, naturally, leaves the slimmest picking for the late arrivals. Sites to avoid (if possible) are those closest to the rest rooms, as the lights remain on all night and the doors slam with a thud that can raise the dead. In addition, try to avoid sites close to the busy roads (such as sites 53 and 54 on the Aspen Loop or 318 and 319 on the Pine Loop), with foot and car traffic that will annov all but the soundest sleepers. Having said that, this is the Grand Canyon after all, and perhaps the greatest natural wonder of the world is only a few minutes' drive away. Also, the campground offers an extremely rugged and wild flavor. If you can abide the few annoyances inherent in a campground of this size, it is definitely worth the stay.

Imagine a department store parking lot during a Christmas tree liquidation sale. That pretty much sums up the aesthetics of Trailer Village. Most lots are divided by low shrubs, and the lucky few contain trees, while some have no vegetation at all. However, as nearby Mather Campground does not offer RV hookups, those who want fuller service should consider Trailer Village-especially as there are no other full-service RV parks on the South Rim. (Some services, such as showers and laundry are shared between Mather and Trailer Village.) Arranged as a grid, the campground offers 50-foot pull-through sites spaced a scant 20 feet apart. Although tents are permitted, the mere thought of camping here in a tent seems ridiculous-unless the campgrounds are all full and you've got to stay in the Grand Canyon. Not nearly as sylvan as Mather Campground, Trailer Village is recommended to travelers who desire a less primitive

experience than the campground, and don't mind taking in the sight of equal parts RV and forest while at home base.

Situated around a manmade cattail-ringed lake whose waters cool and generate electricity at the four adjacent coal-burning Cholla Power Plant units, rustic Cholla Lake County Park provides travelers on I-40 between Flagstaff and Gallup, New Mexico, with a convenient overnight stop or a base for exploring the Petrified Forest, Painted Desert, Mogollon Rim, and nearby Hopi and Navajo Indian Reservations. The lake, one of the largest in northeastern Arizona, can be used for boating and water sports or fishing for largemouth bass, sunfish, and catfish. For some campers, the power pylons, tall cement smokestacks, and piles of coal waiting to be pulverized will seem a visual blight. Others may enjoy the educational displays explaining how scrubbers remove sulfur dioxides and particulates.

Flanked at the entrance by a 200-million-year-old petrified log, the Holbrook/Petrified Forest KOA has more than enough amenities for families and is an excellent location for exploring the area's geology (Petrified Forest, Painted Desert), kitsch (tepee motel, Rte. 66), and Native American (Hopi and Navajo Indian Reservations) sights. Trees line the perimeter and a small café serves up pancake breakfasts and cowboy-style barbecue dinners during the peak tourist season. Fortunately, the campground is far enough from the interstate that truck noise is not a major problem. Though RVs are sometimes parked seemingly close enough to touch, the campground is usually relatively quiet. Pull-through sites 1-20 have cable TV (\$2 extra), and sites 10, 20, 40, 50, 92, and 102 are 50 amp. It's camping at its best along five secluded loops in the pine forest at 7,900 feet, just an hour's drive (40 miles south via a slow, windy road) from the forested North Rim of the Grand Canyon. Widely dispersed pull-through sites provide plenty of forested privacy, yet Jacob Lake Campground is within one-quarter mile of a 24-hour gas station, general store, counter café, restaurant, rangerstaffed visitor center and motel. However, water is scarce and available only by the bucketful. In contrast to the North Rim Campground (see Appendix), which books up over a month in advance with reservations, the key to getting a spot here is a very early afternoon arrival, as Jacob Lake Campground fills up just after 4 p.m. most June, July, and August afternoons. Campers wanting hookups should head to nearby Kaibab Camper Village. For a more primitive experience at a smaller campground (23 sites; 30 feet maximum) run by the same concessionaire, head south on US 89A towards the North Rim another 23 miles to DeeMotte Campground (see Appendix).

Tall pines, grassy meadows with picnic tables, the closest hookups to the Grand Canvon's North Rim, and wide pull-through sites make Kaibab Camper Village a top choice for quiet relaxation and North Rim excursions. Management goes to great lengths to keep the campground quiet, even banning electrical generators. Tent campers will appreciate the grassy sites separate from the RV loop. Although it feels isolated in a tall pine forest surrounded by horse pastures and tall mountain backdrops, the campground is only one mile (half via a dusty but extra wide gravel road) from a 24hour gas station anchoring the U.S. Forest Service's helpful Kaibab Plateau Visitor Center, a motel, an old-fashioned counter café, a sit-down restaurant decorated with Native American rugs, and a general store loaded with curios. All in all, it is hard to go wrong with this combination of wilderness and comforts.

Kingman, a stop en route to the Grand Canyon from Las Vegas, had its heyday when local boy Andy Devine was playing Jingles in cowboy movies, and Rte. 66 was still the place for getting your "kicks" when driving cross country from Chicago to Los Angeles. Downtown Kingman is just now coming out of a deep boarded-up funk, and the KOA is just about the only campground away from the noise of I-40 with a little space for campers to spread out, short of heading out of town into the Hualapai Mountains. The KOA is a little oasis with oleanders and trees between the campsites, a pleasant ambience, free morning coffee, 50 TV channels, and newspaper machines. Tent campers have their own area, and a policy of not running generators ensures quiet.

On the shores of Lake Havasu, Islander boasts ample amenities, including two swimming pools, boat docks, fish-cleaning stations, and winter activities for snowbirds. Premium and waterfront sites have the best lake views, but inland sites have tall eucalyptus trees and some decent mountain views. Unlike Beachcomber Resort (see Appendix) down the road, which rents empty mobile home spots to RVs, Islander terminates the rental agreement of anyone showing signs of residency like enrolling kids in local schools or taking a job in town. The typical 36-foot wide space has a patio pad and enough space for parking a tow vehicle and boat. Those who like it quiet will appreciate that the park is far from noisy highways, though only a short jaunt from the London Bridge, whose 10,276 granite stones were reassembled in this planned desert city by developer Robert McCulloch.

Formed when the Colorado River was dammed near Parker to end the area's annual spring floods and provide water for Arizona and southern California, 45-mile-long Lake Havasu's boating, fishing, and bird-watching recreational possibilities can be accessed at Lake Havasu State Park's Windsor Beach Campground. The large gravel campsites at Windsor Beach combine camping in the desert scrub with a lakeside location. Plus the palo verde, mesquite, and other desert plants are lush enough here to provide each campsite with a barrier of privacy. A swimming beach, a marina with 104 boat slips, and rentals of everything from pontoons and sea doos to fishing boats and houseboats makes Sandpoint Marina a worthwhile destination on the shores of Lake Havasu. Sandpoint Marina is actually within Cattail Cove State Park, and is reached via a fork in the road at the entrance to Cattail Cove Campground (see Appendix), which makes a good alternative for large vehicles and has 40 campsites accessible only by boat. The surrounding mountains have red, orange, chocolate brown, white, and green bands of sandstone that give the area its name, Marble Canyon. In the 1920s, this was an important area for crossing the Colorado River by ferry, as well as the site of Jerry Johnson's polygamous Mormon colony at Lonely Dell Ranch. Ferry service ended after a deadly accident in 1928, when the historic Navajo Bridge opened. The boat launch near Lees Ferry Campground is still one of the best places to enter the Colorado River where it flows smooth and green beneath both the old and new Navajo Bridges. The National Park Service has an interpretive center at Navajo Bridge, near where the river splits into its upper and lower basins. Only a few camp sites have trees or manmade structures for shade. Noises echo at the campground, but when the neighbors are quiet, this is a peaceful spot. Few places are better for river recreation, and it's away from the hubbub of Lake Powell and Page.

National Park Service rangers patrol Lone Rock Beach, making this two miles of Lake Powell's 1,960
miles of shoreline among the more secure stretches
of beach for camping. A large lone monolithic sand-
stone rock sticking out of the lake and straddling the
Arizona/Utah border gives the beach its name. It
seems like southern California, complete with beach
bums, albeit sans surfboards and backed by the
incomparable beauty of Glen Canyon sandstone.
Motor homes share the hard beach sand with tents

Wahweap Campground is more spacious and private in feel than Wahweap RV Park, and the Lake Powell views are surpassed only by camping at Lone Rock Beach. However, RV campers may prefer downtown Page and the more amenity-laden Page-Lake Powell Campground (see Appendix) over Wahweap Campground when Wahweap RV Park's hookups are full. Indeed, the spacious campsites and small loops are tailored to tents and small trailers, with plenty of shade trees and desert scrub separating sites from each other along smallish loops. Wahweap RV Park offers plenty of boat parking for nearby Wahweap Marina. An attractive grassy area with trees separates the RV Park from the road, but once inside it is more like a huge parking lot full of boats and vehicles. If hookups and amenities are of more interest than boats and the lake, downtown Page and the Page-Lake Powell Campground (see Appendix) are an attractive alternative. With card games, ice cream socials, and potlucks in the rec hall, Branson's caters to snowbirds in winter with its tightly packed concrete pads and grass strip RV sites. If relaxation and plenty of play space for the children are more important than partying, then Buckskin Mountain's paved sites separated by dirt and trees are a better choice than Fox's Pierpoint Landing and Tony's Road Runner. A group-use area with sheltered tables is one mile north at Buckskin Mountain State Park's River Island Unit, which has another 22 campsites and large grass play areas but no hookups on 420 acres with a boat ramp and a Colorado River swimming beach. Island Unit is closer to the highway and farther from the water, but is quieter when not overrun with weekend groups. During the cooler winter months, hiking the short steep trails into the surrounding mountains for spectacular overviews of the area is a worthwhile alternative to water play. Some trails go by abandoned mines and have interpretive stops about the local ecosystems and vegetation.

A true destination resort with plenty of amenities, including an Olympic-sized pool, and enough winter activities to keep snowbirds happy, Havasu Springs Resort has over 250 boat slips, three motels, a restaurant with a bar and lounge, and everything from par 3 golf to houseboat and fishing boat rentals. In contrast to the Colorado River and Havasu partying areas, even teenagers must be under tight adult reign here. Motorcycles are banned, which helps keep the park quiet. Gate security is also relatively tight, and visitors must obtain passes. Though the cement pads here are good, it will be a few years before the trees are large enough to provide some shade to the RV sites. But if protection from noisy Harleys and rowdy party animals is part of the Colorado River recreation game plan, then reservations here may fit the bill.

Though lacking ice cream socials and some of the snowbird amenities of Branson's Resort next door, LaPaz offers lots of open space and green grass. Golfers can practice on the putting green and cross the street to use the driving range or play 18 holes, and there is a baseball field, tennis court, and plenty else to do besides boating, fishing, and swimming in the Colorado River. During the winter, tent campers have a prime dirt beachfront area along the river, and designated sites are kept open for RVs. Boating, fishing, and water sports are the chief attraction at Red Rock Resort, which is notable for its waterfront cabana campsites. The large pullthrough sites (41-56) and sites 64-71 near the winter overflow and RV and trailer storage areas are farthest from the Colorado River. However, site 41, a large lawn corner pull-through is closer to the water and worth the small rental premium. The best sites are right on the Colorado River, and are open only to smaller vehicles and tent camping. These waterfront cabanas, which offer the opportunity to barbecue on the banks of the Colorado River and sit in the shade, are numbered 1-40 and are difficult to score, as they are often rented for four months solid during the peak winter season. Situated between Patagonia and Nogales on the Mexican border, Patagonia Lake is reached from AZ 82 via a curving paved road through housing developments and a hillside forest of mesquite and ocotillo. One of six excellent Phoenix area county parks, Lake Pleasant Regional Park contains both the Desert Tortoise and Roadrunner Campgrounds. Roadrunner's hillside sites 7-24 fill up first because of their excellent views. Desert Tortoise's tent-only and improved pull-through sites along Den and Bajada Loop Roads have coveted lake views that are also snapped up fast. On long holiday weekends it seems like all Phoenix is headed here with boats. Since there are no reservations, an early Thursday arrival is advised to ensure snagging a holiday weekend campsite. Most sites easily accommodate vehicles in the mid-30- to mid-45-foot range, though the sites tend to be narrow (e.g. the 80-foot-long site is only 13 feet wide). The native desert hillside saguaro, octotillo, and brittlebush landscape blooms with yellow, purple, and blue wildflowers after April showers. This campground is slightly less pretty than Welcome Home, due to a cement retaining wall that runs along the edge of the property from sites 34-44. In addition, while the park seems equally well insulated from highway traffic sounds, noise from a ballpark located across the street invades the entire park when games are on. Still, this is not a bad place to park your RV while you explore the humongous city of Phoenix-and it is certainly much more convenient than the several campgrounds located 30 miles out of town. There are some wonderful flowering trees, giving the grounds a city park-like feel: you know you're in the city, but removed a bit from the action. Definitely not for the tenter looking for a wilderness experience. Often confused with Picacho Campground seven miles to the north, Picacho Peak RV Resort exudes a very different atmosphere. Though the sites are attractively landscaped with medium-sized ocotillo, cacti, and trees, Picacho Peak RV Resort feels like an upscale RV parking annex for the mobile home park sharing the rear of the property. The benefit of mixing mobile homes and RVs is sharing the clean, well-maintained mobile home amenities. The RVs are closer to the interstate than the mobile homes, and the sandstone-colored perimeter wall and trees do not keep out all the truck noises and nightly train sounds. Also, there is not a convenience store here with the long hours found at Picacho Campground. However, the Resort is affiliated with Adventure Outdoor Resorts, Coast to Coast Network, and Resort Parks International, and members of those groups are promised good deals.

Picacho Peak, an ancient Hohokam Indian site, is a colorful mixture of 22-million-year-old lava flows and sedimentary rock strata rich in saguaro, cacti, grasses, and cottontail rabbits. Though it doesn't have the swimming pools and amenities of the nearby private campgrounds, Picacho Peak State Park is the best place to experience the raw nature of this historic area. The three loops are far enough back from the interstate that noise is not a problem. The 14-site hookup loop closest to the peak and park entrance is literally just a paved parking lot, albeit with a spectacular view and natural sur-

roundings. Indeed, those who end up here as Catalina State Park overflow casualties are pleasantly surprised by the historic peak that served as a landmark for Father Kino, the Butterfield Overland Stage, and the forty-niners headed to the California gold fields.

Created in the 1950s by impounding Trout Creek, 300-acre Hawley Lake offers rustic waterfront camping on the lands of the White Mountain Apache. Tall ponderosa pine trees, boulder-strewn meadows, small waterfalls, roadside fishing (requires daily White Mountain Apache permit), and good lake views from many hillside campsites are among the attractions. Rainbow trout thrive in the lake, though Apache, brown, cutthroat, and brook trout are also caught summer and winter (ice fishing). Many prefer fall fishing when the browns come up in the shallows. Wild turkey, deer, elk, and black bear make for good wildlife viewing and attract hunters. Be prepared for cold weather here, as at 8,200-feet elevation, summer temperatures can drop below freezing at night. The last two miles into

the lake are on a gravel road, and big vehicles should call ahead to make sure they can be accommodated.

A popular destination requiring advance reservations, Hon-Dah RV Park is across the street from Hon-Dah Casino's 500 slot machines and offers ample amenities to those visiting the area for boating, fishing, or winter skiing at nearby (20 miles) Sunrise Park Resort. Every winter Quartzsite's few thousand permanent residents are joined by 200,000 in RVs, and during the giant Gemboree (gem show/flea market) the population surges into the millions before its annual contraction back to almost nothing during the scorching summer months. Hundreds of unofficial RV parks spring up to join the official ones. Literally any patch of desert along the roadsides becomes RV habitat, though there is more security in Long-Term Visitor Areas (LTVA) like La Posa, operated by the U.S. Dept. of Interior's Bureau of Land Management (BLM). Besides La Posa, BLM operates five smaller no-fee, 14-day limit camping areas (Plomosa Rd., Hi Jolly/MM112, Dome Rock Mountain, Scaddan Wash, Road Runner/MM99) around Quartzsite. Though La Posa lacks RV park amenities, it has the beauty of literally camping out in the desert wherever you choose, provided it is not too near another campsite (to reduce the danger of a fire spreading).

The largest completely solar-powered campground in the United States, Cholla Campground and Boating Site is located on the shores of central Arizona's largest lake, Theodore Roosevelt Lake. Blue shelters make the campground look like a blueroofed village with solar panels amidst the tall saguaro, mesquite, and palo verde providing the campsites a privacy barrier. The 13 tent-only sites farthest from the boat ramp on the steep slopes at the end of Christmas Cholla Loop and the five tent-only sites at Cane Cholla Loop on the slopes closer to the campground entrance have the best waterfront views. The gravel and sand campsites are flat, and many double sites are available for those with multiple vehicles and big boats. For those wanting a more primitive experience, head to Indian Point on the northeast side of the lake or check out the sometimes crowded beach camping nearby at Bachelor Cove or Cholla Cove.

Often packed with local boaters on summer weekends, Windy Hill feels isolated because it is two miles from the main highway and the campsites are widely dispersed among ten loops. Each loop has its own trailheads and is named after a different animal that might be seen in the area, such as javelina, desert bighorn, gray fox, and coati. However, watch out for the rattlesnake (which does not have a loop named after it) here and in most other Arizona campgrounds. Double sites are big enough for a small beach party, packing in up to four cars, two boats, and 20 people. The level ground is good for tenting, and abundant desert plants like palo verde, ocotillo, and mesquite between the campsites add to the feeling of isolation and privacy.

Charming, gorgeous, breathtaking, revitalizingpick any superlative, they all fit. But so does "filled quickly." This campsite is a favorite in the welltraveled Oak Creek Canyon-and for good reason. Striking red rock bursts out of the forested hills above the creek, while rocky crags jut overhead. The entire canyon is beautiful and, as one local resident put it, "plum fulla history." The campsites mostly string out along the creek, and these sites (along with 10 and 19 on the ends) are the most highly prized. The sites to avoid are 6 and 7 situated by the outhouse and up against the road. Admittedly, this campsite is not for everyone, and the lack of services or the hairpin turn in the road that prohibits larger rigs may put off more than one. (Those who do want full hookups or don't want to negotiate that curve could press on down AZ 89A to the lovely Rio Verde in Cottonwood.) However, campers looking for a great base for outdoor activities or a really romantic nook should definitely try their luck at scoring one of these spots.

Established in 1991 as a partnership between the city of Show Low, the U.S. Forest Service, Arizona State Parks, and Arizona Game and Fish, Fool Hollow provides RV campers with large cement pads and hookups in four separate loops (Red Head, Mallard, Ruddy Duck, and Cinnamon Teal). Tent campers have good lake views from their three separate loops (Northern Harrier, Osprey, Bald Eagle). Pines, tall junipers, volcanic boulders, and jack rabbits contribute to the rustic feel. Show Low Creek feeds Fool Hollow Lake, which is stocked with rainbow trout by Arizona Game and Fish. There is also a good chance of catching brown trout, large and small mouth bass, black crappie, and green sunfish. Away from the water are 103 miles of hiking trails within 15 miles, and golf links in the rapidly suburbanizing surrounding area.

Show Low Lake was formed when the Phelps Dodge Corporation built Show Low Dam as part of a water exchange agreement with the Salt River Project to supply water to its mining and metallurgical operations elsewhere in the state. Indeed, the park land is leased from Phelps Dodge. Navajo County recently issued a private vendor a special permit to run the park and take campsite reservations. At 7,000-feet elevation in the White Mountains, the area makes a relatively cool summer retreat for Phoenix and the hot desert valleys. A favorite of local windsurfers and waterskiiers because of the lake's smooth surface, boaters like 6,000-foot-elevation Lyman Lake because it doesn't have boat size and motor horsepower restrictions (though there is a no-wake area near the fishing dock). There is a self-guided petroglyph trail on Peninsula Point, as well as a ranger-guided weekend boat trip to another petroglyph trail on the opposite side of the lake. Rangers also lead a summer tour to fourteenth-century Rattlesnake Pueblo for those curious about the ancient Mogollon and Pueblo cultures formerly inhabiting this high plains area. RV campers have 38 electrical and water hookup sites attractively separated by grass and aspen and juniper trees. Tent campers can opt out of the designated sites altogether for more of a wilderness experience and camp along the shoreline beaches of this 1,500-acre reservoir.

On the Arizona side of Lake Mead, across yuccastudded desert that yields to creosote bush interspersed with brown and black chunks of lava and white hills. Temple Bar is one of the most remote designated campgrounds on Lake Mead. The Temple, a huge monolithic chunk of sandstone that glows brilliant orange at sunset, was an early landmark for Mormon settlers and the site of placer mining operations in the 1800s. The campground is a tightly packed cluster of sites beautifully landscaped with palms, oleander. and eucalyptus that provide privacy. Gravel pads make for good tent camping, and lake and mountain views are common. The campground's remoteness and isolation are part of its beauty, and like the rest of Lake Mead, the activities center around the water. There are 64 boat slips.

Though at the edge of Tombstone's historic boardwalk, Wells Fargo RV Park becomes almost as quiet as a tomb at night, as this once brawling, saloonand brothel-filled frontier mining town now shuts down at sundown. Some claim to hear ghosts at night, but usually the only commotion at this treelined campground is dogs in a howling frenzy as deer and javelina strolling through like they own the place. Wells Fargo's year-round residents are mostly a friendly group, and many work at local establishments like Big Nose Kate's Saloon. Next door is what locals call the best breakfast place in town, the O.K. Cafe, which also charbroils emu, ostrich, and buffalo burgers. It's "just a biscuit sling from the O.K. Corral," where Doc Holliday joined Wyatt and the Earp brothers for the famous shootout with the Clanton and McLaury families.

At Canyon Lake, 17 miles north of Apache Junction, a gated kiosk and steel fence encloses Laguna Beach Campground, a lakeside stretch of parking lot and grassy campsites (ten hookups) within Canyon Lake Marina. The Marina prides itself on round-the-clock security and being "a gated community with the lake as one border and steel fencing preventing land access." Campers must adhere to strict rules, like no fishing around the boat dock or restaurant without a Marina member. Jet skies, mini-bikes, boats, and trailers are among the items banned from the campground, though they can be left in the parking lot on the other side of the steel fence or stored for a fee. Getting to this maximum security campground is a scenic ordeal via a slow twisting mountain road with one-lane bridges for added adventure. Just east of Canyon de Chelly at 7,200-feet elevation. Wheatfields Lake is a relatively uncrowded place to catch cutthroat and rainbow trout, though a fishing permit first needs to be obtained from Navajo Fish & Wildlife (call (520) 871-6451) in Window Rock. Unlike Camp Asaayi Campground at Asaavi Lake where the terrain mitigates against RVs, smaller vehicles can squeeze into Wheatfields Lake when the weather is favorable. If the beer cans left behind by those not observing the tribal prohibition on alcohol are too much of an eyesore while shoreline fishing near the roadside, the other side of the lake can be reached by vehicle, and a boat can be launched from the base of the Chuska Mountains. The campground gets plenty of shade from tall ponderosa pines, though with port-a-potties this is a primitive spot in a rural area where careful driving is advised to avoid hitting horses grazing

Big patches of mesquite ensure privacy at Catalina State Park, where the smallest campsite length is 55 feet and half the sites have hookups. Ten years ago this Santa Catalina Mountains desert foothill cattle ranching area was considered remote. Now Tangerine Rd. between I-10 and the park and the whole Oro Valley is filling up with subdivisions for retirees and aerospace engineers commuting to Tucson. Park roads run through a floodplain with flat ridges that provided the ancient Hohokams a home with water. When Sutherland Wash, the key floodplain drainage, becomes impossible to cross, access to hiking trails and Romero Ruins is blocked, though the campground is still reachable. From January through April, Tucson's peak season, morning arrivals snag all the campsites by noon. Afternoon arrivals (overflow) are typically sent to either Gilbert Ray Campground or Picacho Peak State Park. Plans call for alleviating winter-use pressures by adding 75 campsites with electric hookups.

Far enough back from I-10 to be quiet and near enough a truck stop to have a gas station, minimart, and restaurant next door, Crazy Horse is especially attractive to families with children. Thomas Jay Littletown Park, a quiet Pima County–run park two blocks north, is popular with kids and an easy walk from Crazy Horse. Most sites are pull-through, mostly 24-feet wide and accommodating vehicles up to 45 feet in length (one site accommodates a 60-foot vehicle). The attractive oleander, mesquite and agave landscaping is concentrated around the front of the campground. For more amenities and the feel of a small luxury city, the adult-oriented Voyager RV Resort a few miles down the road is a good alternative. A favorite of many for its low cost and location west of Tucson near Saguaro National Park West and the Desert Museum, Gilbert Ray's river gravel sites are a particularly convenient stopping place when driving from Ajo or Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument through the Tohono O'odham Indian Reservation en route to Tucson on AZ 86 (Ajo

Tucson's largest RV resort opened in 1984 with 37,000 square feet of enclosed recreational space, including special crafts rooms for stained glass, lapidary, ceramics, and silver. With its own bank branch, restaurant, travel desk, store, and other facilities, Voyager has the feel of a small self-contained city. Streets are numbered 1–18, and then skip by tens from 20–50 for the pull-through

area surrounding the recreational facilities. Though daily RV rentals are welcome, the orientation is adult, like many southern Arizona RV parks catering to snowbird retirees. Except during summer, when kids are welcome, families with children will do better at the more child- and family-oriented Crazy Horse Campground. Since the fees are higher here, commensurate with the myriad of recreation options, Voyager is best thought of as a destination resort. But Voyager also works well as a luxury tourism base for exploring Tucson and southeastern Arizona.

A collection of mundane RV parking spaces packaged with an impressive array of amenities, including an indoor pool and weight room, De Anza Trails offers 50 amp electric power, unlike Mountain View next door. However, De Anza falls short in parking convenience, as its spaces are all backins and require a security guard to supervise placement, in contrast to Mountain View's pull-through sites. Higher prices than the RV park next door have not helped, and on a recent summer day (admittedly the slow season this far south), De Anza had one customer while the funkier Mountain View was packed with RVs. Tents are prohibited, as are noisy trucks, cars, and motorcycles. Noise from trucks traversing the adjacent highway linking Tucson and Mexico might bother some people, but inside the clubhouse, library, and other facilities it should not be a problem.

Along the highway linking Tucson with Nogales, Mexico, a brick wall separates Mountain View RV Ranch from the newer De Anza Trails RV Resort next door. A loyal coterie of supporters keeps Mountain View humming year-round, even during the summer slow season when many other nearby RV parks look like deserted ghost towns. Nestled amongst saguaros and ocotillos where wild burros roam and golden and bald eagles soar in the Bill Williams River Valley, bass-filled Alamo Lake has a collection of eight developed and primitive camping areas on widely separated loops. During the five-month winter season, this small RV park is filled by regulars from around the country and Canada, some of whom have been coming here for over a decade to form part of a small community that gathers for evening cocktails while watching the sunset from the clubhouse porch before evening games commence. During the hot summer, when there is space for tent campers to plug into the electric hookups left behind by migrating snowbirds, the surrounding fields are growing cotton, cantaloupes, watermelons, and a variety of fruit and vegetables for the Delmonte cannery. Founded by German immigrant Henry Wickenburg after the discovery of gold at the Vulture Mine in 1863, Wickenburg sprang into existence 60 miles northwest of Phoenix with the motto "Horses have the right of way on all Wickenburg streets." Though horses no longer wander the streets of this crossroads town of motels and restaurants, Horspitality RV Park continues the tradition of catering to horses with a boarding stable with 65 horse pens. Nine miles north of the town of Nothing and near old copper mining towns like Baghdad, Burro Creek Recreation Site is seemingly in the middle of nowhere, though it is just off US 93, the main artery linking Phoenix and Las Vegas, Nevada. Many regulars come back here every year because it is such a good place to just sit and relax, with little else to do besides hiking along the tree-lined creek and looking for the blue and purple agates and Apache tears that endear the area to rock hounds. Day use of the park is free, including the solarlighted rest rooms and the ample picnic area surrounded by saguaros and mesquite. The small cactus garden is a good introduction to desert botany and nesting desert pack rats. Fishing in the year-round water pools is taboo, as the Sonoran suckers and roundtail chubb are endangered. Bird watchers can spot great blue herons and bald eagles.

Mostly used as an overnight stop by travelers on I-40, Homolovi Ruins is farther from the highway and not near a power plant or lake like the nearby and more rustic Cholla Lake County Park. The paved sites have small trees that should eventually grow up to provide some shade. Raised dirt pads make for comfortable tenting, though it is advisable to shake your boots for scorpions before putting them on in the morning. The name Homolovi means little hills in the Hopi language, and the area was a sacred gathering place of the clans and is still visited as a sacred place by the Hopi. The park opened in 1993, but archaeological excavations date to 1896. The over 1,000room pueblo is the most accessible site in this park, which has good wildlife viewing areas along the Little Colorado River.

Arkansas

Rice paddies. Catfish fillets. Only country-and-western radio stations. A polite "sir" or "madam" in every sentence. Life in Arkansas draws on the Deep South in ways outsiders may consider out of sync with modern America. With county bans on alcohol sales reminiscent of Prohibition, one native went so far as to call the state "backward," but that depends on your perception. Residents possess an intimate knowledge and palpable love of the land they inhabit, and visitors are welcomed warmly in the best tradition of Southern hospitality.

Arkansas calls itself "the Natural State," and the moniker is reinforced by its inhabitants—even businesspeople take weekend hunting trips. Nearly everyone you meet has a fishing pole, knows where to catch a trophy bass (or maybe just dinner), or has photos from the last fishing trip. Perhaps the best way to get to know this state is to camp at some of the many state parks—they give you a feel for the breadth of the state's natural diversity and the depth of its history. Arkansas is also home to the country's one and only diamond mine. Rockhounds and fortune-seekers alike will want to visit **Crater of Diamonds State Park** near Murfreesboro, where visitors can keep whatever gems they uncover. Diamonds found in the park have all varied in size and color. One of the biggest finds was by one of the park's own employees, who found a whopping 16-carat diamond (about the size of a wild pecan) after a rainstorm.

Aside from the hunting, fishing, boating, and hot springs, even just driving through Arkansas is a pleasure. This is such a verdant state you can't help but revel in its greenery. **Bull Shoals** and the **Ouachita Mountains** are as representative of Arkansas as Little Rock and Texarkana. Lush vegetation wraps around small roads like clothing. Wildlife abounds, including armadillos and even alligators. Go for a drive through the **Ozark National Forest** or along the **Mississippi River**, and you'll never think of Arkansas the same way again. I-540, which passes through Fayetteville, is 38 miles of billboard-free driving—making for an obstruction-free view of the **Ozark Mountains**. Another inspiring view is **Byway 71**, which runs from Alma to Fayetteville. On this particularly dizzying drive, the amount of breathtaking sights is equaled only by many twists and dipping curves—sort of like a roller-coaster ride through the **Ozarks**. Need a tour guide? If you're around Fayetteville in late September/early October, you might be able to get a few folks from the **Bikes and Blues and Barbecue Motorcycle Roll and Music Festival** to give you guided tour. With all that music (everything from rock and country to blues and jazz), food, and great weather (highs averaging in the mid-70s) you might be tempted to stay in Fayetteville for the weekend.

In fact, it seems to be the natural state of being for most Arkansas natives to gather in large numbers and celebrate all things Arkansas. Some festivals of note include the **Arkansas Scottish Festival** (complete with bagpipe music and Highland dancing), the **Hot Springs Documentary Film Festival and Institute, Hot Springs Music Festival, Mount Ida's Good Ole Days** (originally called Charlie Weaver Day), the **Pink Tomato Festival, Riverfront Blues Festival, Purple Hull Pea Festival, Hope Watermelon Fest, Johnson County Arkansas Peach Festival, Greek Food Festival** (in Little Rock), **Mount Magazine International Butterfly Festival, Shakespeare Festival of Arkansas, White Water River Carnival, Turkey Trot Festival,** and (perhaps the most curiously titled festival of the lot) **Toad Suck Daze.**

The question to ask yourself isn't "Why should I go to Arkansas?" but "Why haven't I gone there before?"

This campground is west of a restaurant, gift shop, and office complex, and north of Arkansas River Valley vineyards. The park itself is little more than a large open parking lot of a gravel, grass, and dirt. Sites 1–10 back up to woods, while 11–20 back up to a pretty agricultural setting. Site 1 is partly in long prairie-type grass, but is close to a shade tree. Sites 7 and 8 are shaded, as is 20. This latter site is probably in the nicest location, as it is farthest from the restaurant complex and next to a large tree. Sites 9-12 are closest to the visitor parking lot. While there is no real maximum length to the vehicles this park can accommodate during off-season, it is unrealistic to haul more than 50 feet during the wine fest-the best time to come to this park (at least, if you don't mind crowds). Tents can cover the entire field to the west during the September wine fest, making it difficult to find a spot. There are few trees anyway, so most tenters will be in the same boat-camping on a hill with no shower facility. Of course, the atmosphere of the festival can override other concerns, but tenters (and RVers without indoor showers) must remember that they will have to spend a day or so without showering. There is one modern unisex rest room that must surely be packed during the festival. This campground is a somewhat dull park without many facilities, although the atmosphere of the restaurant and the wine fest help make up for these shortcomings.

Most of the sites in this campground are wellshaded, which is good news to summer campers in this part of the state. Laid out in an arc with internal sites, the main camping area has 12 sites around the perimeter that can be used for tents or for small RVs. Site 1 is very close to the road that leads to the northern camping area, and all other sites (except 7 and 8) require either pitching a tent on a serious slope or right on the internal road. RVers may find this normal, but tenters will not like the space. Sites 7 and 8 are the exceptions, with larger spaces and nice trees. Site 24 is an enormous (100-feet-long) pull-through, while the sites next to it (20-23) are half the size and only pullthroughs if the adjacent site is unoccupied. These sites are all next to the forest, under a canopy of trees. Nice 50-foot back-ins that are likewise shaded include 50, 52, 59, and 62. These sites are in the north area of the campground, off the main camping area. Pull-throughs include 51, 55, 58, 60, and 62, which can accommodate a rig of any size. Less pleasant are sites 30 and 31, which are very open, and site 27, which is close to the entrance, Frost Rd., and the propane vending area. Sites in this park are situated on a hill that overlooks the marina and the lake. All sites are 30-foot long and 40-foot wide paved back-ins, with the exception of 10, which is 40 feet Sites 1 and 2 have a partial view of the marina-for what it's worth. Sites 3 and 4, set farther back into the woods, are combined, making them best for groups who arrive together-and a possible nuisance if incompatible groups are forced to share these sites. This campground is wild, undeveloped, natural, and quiet. It is subtly but attractively landscaped with rock, cacti, and juniper. Sites 1-3 are 42-foot back-ins that back up to the (rather quiet) road. Site 4 is an unshaded site that also abuts the road, but backs to thick vegetation. Sites 5-7 are pullthroughs that average 55 feet in length; 5 and 7 are shaded, 6 is not. Located in a residential area, this property is a quiet, campground, with a large forested area at the back. Sites are extremely large (85×50 feet), with a mixture of pull-throughs and back-ins. This campground is divided into a south loop and an east loop. The south loop is farther divided into an inner and outer loop. The most desirable sites are in general on the outer loop 9 especially even 102-106, 109, and odd 113-117), as they have more space and back up to forest, not other campsites. Site 85 is set back away from the other sites, and therefore has more privacy. Site 67 (and 69, to a lesser extent) is adjacent to a pond. Sites 86-91 are doubles. Some sites (especially 86, 87, 95, 97, and 98) seem prone to flooding after a rain. Sites on the outside of the east loop back to seemingly endless forest, and the loop feels more "lost" (in a good way) because of this. Sites 1-9 are built along the edge of a hill, and some of the space is unusable due to an extreme slope. However, there is a large fenced-in area that contains the picnic table and a large concrete slab for camping. Sites are 42-feet-long back-ins, with two pullthroughs (4 and 9), of 42 feet and 75 feet in length, respectively. Site 1 backs to a large open field, and can allow for recreation right off the site. There are loads of interesting ornaments, plants, logs, rocks, and garden spots in this campground, giving it a somewhat artsy wilderness feel. All of the sites in this campground are forested, undeveloped gravel sites. Sites 1-19 ranging from 30- to 45-feet long on either side of an internal road. Of these, 1-12 back to a hedge, beyond which lies the highway. Sites 11 and 12 are fenced off, giving them added privacy. An exceptional feature of these tent pads is that they contain sawdust instead of crushed gravel, giving tenters a much more comfy bed to sleep on. These dirt sites are located under a canopy of trees, ensuring that all sites are shaded. Many of these sites are along the highway, which is normally quite quiet, but does, of course, carry the occasional vehicle. Sites M and N are the most remote, and R and S are also secluded. The rest rooms and showers are all very clean and spacious. Showers are all tile, which makes them seem as comfy as home. One really neat detail is the wooden number plates at each site, which each have a unique hand-carved cartoon. The Garden of Meditation, also a unique feature, comprises stone, twisted wood, plants, and sculptures, and is an extremely peaceful place to rest for a moment.

While the north and east sides of this campground face an industrial complex, the south has gorgeous rock cliffs over the river, and the west faces lush vegetation. Just two blocks from Main Street, this campground is convenient for visiting Old Hardy Town on foot, and has a comfortable, city parklike feel. RV sites are mostly open-ended, and can take a vehicle of any size. River sites (42-foot backins) have truly wonderful views, and are worth the slightly higher price. While you can't go wrong with any of these sites, 20-23 are definitely the best of the bunch: they are well-shaded and farthest from the entrance. Sites 10 and 11 are also well-shaded, and close to the bathhouse, while shaded sites 1-5 are closest to the entrance/exit. For a cheaper site (not on the river) or a pullthrough, 58–63 are better than average. They are well-shaded, full-length (120-feet) pull-throughs. (The other pull-throughs have two sites in an area

the same size.) The tenting area is a nice, unmarked grassy area behind the office. There is some shade, but no protection in the event of rain. The bathhouse is a disappointment. The inside is old cement with untreated cement floors. In stark contract with the attractiveness of the rest of the park, this is an obviously old facility in desperate need of renovation. (It might spur the city to action if enough campers contact the town of Hardy to let them know of this situation.) One additional surprise arrives with every train-loud whistles and rumblings. While infrequent, this may be enough to put off some campers, which is a shame given the camp's enjoyable environment.

This campground has very cute landscaping (including shrubs and a bridge), and very tidy gravel and grass sites. sites 1-3 are 75 × 44-foot pullthroughs on the north side of the park, near the highway. These are some of the largest sites. (Site 4, for example, is only 52 feet long.) The only sites that are larger are 10 (a 90-foot pull-through) and 24, which can be a 105-foot pull-through if site 23 is unoccupied. A strip in the middle of the park contains sites 12–17, which are 66×44 -foot back-ins. On the north side of the "island" in the middle, sites 18-22 are slightly smaller (60-feet) back-ins. This campground is run by the convenience store adjacent to it. Sites are laid out in two strips of 60foot pull-throughs (1-14 and 20-26) running from east (closest to the highway) to west (towards the forest). There is agricultural land to the south, which enhances the aesthetics of the campground. A strip of unfinished sites lies at the northwest end. The best sites are towards the western edge (9-14 and 20-22), as these sites have shade trees and are located farthest from the convenience store and the highway. Less desirable sites are closer to the traffic: 1-3 and 26. There are swing chairs located between sites 10 and 11, 21 and 22, and 23 and 24. They say that tenting is possible on the RV sites, but a much better bet is a grassy area under one of the many trees around the perimter-especially towards the north side. This campground is in a large city park, and there are hundreds of RV sites available, divided up into sections. Section A is open and grassy, to the north of the ballfield and the coliseum, with open-ended pull-through sites. There are a few trees, but most

sites are not shaded. A2 is between the barns and the coliseum, and consists of open, grassy sites. Section B is to the south of A, and is likewise an open grassy field with no real shade. C is similar, but consists of open-ended back-ins around the baseball field. Section D backs to the woods on the perimeter of the park. Sites to the southeast are better shaded, and are some of the better sites in the park for this reason. Sections E and F are on either side of the office, closest to the rest rooms. A campground that has the motto "in the city, on the lake," this RV park has nearly lakeside sites towards the back (37 is the closest). Most back-ins around the perimter are open-ended, with no maximum vehicle size. These sites back to a row of trees that provide some shade, but sites elsewhere in the park are open to the sun. Sites 1-6 are 42-foot backins in a strip on the north side of the park. Of these, 6 is the nicest, as it is closest to the trees and farthest from the entrance. An old pecan orchard, this campground has a small-farm feel to it. There is very attractive landscaping around the grounds (flowers around trees and lightpoles), and remnants of the farm it once was (barn, farmhouse). Towering pecan trees grow at almost every site. There is also, however, an air of oldness that could be swept away: cobwebs in the corners, dirt from many hands opening doors, etc. The laundry is small, and while the rest rooms are clean, the building itself looks old. Furthermore, the cement walls are speckled with reddish paint. But don't let that scare you. The campground is very nice, and nearly every site is an excellent choice. Numbered sites in the first five rows are reserved for overnighters-the rest are for monthly renters. All sites are 80-foot pull-throughs on grassy patches. Sites at the far end of the highway (10, 27, and 35 especially) are the best, as they receive less traffic noise and not much passing traffic (18, also an end site, is directly across from the bathhouse). Those at the highway end are a little noisier (9, 17, 26, 34, 42). The tent area is to the northwest of the bathhouse. There is an excellent grass cover. Several large trees lend shade, but may be too high to provide much protection from rain. While the campground needs a nice spring cleaning and a little less traffic noise to earn a full rating, it is very nice, and a destination where many campers will be sure to return.

Campers in large rigs will be happy with the numerous pull-throughs in this campground, which include all sites except those around the perimter. Rows G19-24 and R8-14 are closest to the road, and include 40-foot back-ins. (G15-24 are all in a forested corner of the campground, with gravel sites.) Sites R1-7 are well-shaded 56-foot pullthroughs, while G11-14 are even longer (75 feet). Row B has 75-foot pull-throughs, of which 1-3 face a residence. Sites in this state park, Arkansas' first, are divided into four areas, A-D. Area A is east of the Visitors Center, and contains sites 1-35, all 80-foot pullthroughs (except 32, which is 105 feet). Many of these sites are along (or near) the lake, and therefore are preferred or premium sites, costing more than the others. Premium sites closest to the lake are 19, 26, and 27. This campground is divided into two sections on either side of the highway, the north and south sections. In the north section, sites are arranged on the outside of an internal loop. Campsites in the park are situated along a single internal road. Sites on the north side have a sudden slope at the rear, while those on the south side have a more gradual slope. Although this campground is bordered to the northwest by woods, unsightly storage units to the south detract significantly from the beauty of this park. Sites are laid out in two central rows of 65foot pull-throughs, with 60-foot back-ins around the perimeter. The nicest of the back-ins (17-25) are along the northern edge, just in front of the woods. Sites 1-16 also back to trees, but the trees don't shade the sites. The pull-throughs are grassy and level, but open to the sun. Site 25 is next to the rec room, and may receive more than the normal amount of passing foot traffic. Likewise, 46, closest to the rest rooms, may be a high-traffic site. The rest rooms are clean and comfortable, and kept locked for added security. This park is a decent overnight stay, but not a destination for most travelers. One word of note: during our visit, the managers were involved in multi-level marketing, and tended to push their product on visitors-to the extent of including a product brochure with each site map!

Located in a wilderness setting and surrounded by forest, this campground is shady and quiet. RV sites are huge pull-throughs (75–95-feet) laid out in two strips, and all are well-shaded. Sites 1-10 are farthest from the office, but closest to the entrance. (Sites 1-5 are the farthest from everything-but not by much.) Sites 3 and 4,as well as 5 and 6, are angled into each other, which makes them slightly less private. The longest sites in the campground are 11-15, which are an impressive 95 feet in length. Tenting space is located in the southeast corner. Like the RV sites, this area is well-shaded, and it is closest to the undeveloped forest. While there is but thin grass cover, the dirt is soft and will easily take tent spikes. Tenters will especially enjoy the "lost" atmosphere of this park, although anyone in search of a quiet night in the woods will appreciate it.

Divided into three sections (A, B, and C), this campground has only RV sites, and does not accommodate tenting. Sites are all level, grassy pull-throughs. Row A has 65-foot sites that are all very open. Site 8 has the largest tree (across the internal road, by the grill), making it the best of this row. Site 12 is closest to the highway, making it the least desirable. Row B has 45-foot sites that are mostly open-sites 8, 11, 12, and 14 have shade trees. Row C has 60-foot sites, with the best sites in the higher numbers. Sites 11-14 face a nice field to the north, and have trees across the internal road that provide some shade, but 14 is close to the highway. The campground in general is not highly developed, which lends a natural feel to the sites but also provides for a sometimes choppy road. RVers should take the internal road at a slow speed. The rest rooms are clean and very modern. However, the showers could benefit from a tile scrubbing, and some of the lights were not working when the campground was inspected. This RV park is part of an RV-oriented complex in a commercial area off a main road. The park is located next to a sales and service center, while a fence running around the park hides a supermarket, restaurants, and shops. Sites are laid out in three rows. This overnight park is located in a residential area, with little to enhance its beauty. Sites are grassy and open, and situated rather close to the road. (Sites 12–16 are especially close. Mainly unshaded, they are as open to the sun as they are to passersby.) While sites are open-ended, anything larger than 60 feet or so seems not feasible, especially if a number of sites are occupied. Sites 10 and 11 are perhaps the nicest, with a couple of trees around them to reduce the amount of direct sunlight that reaches them. Site 16 also has a tree, making it slightly better than the other roadside sites. Of the remaining sites, 1–8, are the better sites, being farthest from the highway. Perhaps a telling detail: a warning sign that reads "Not Responsible For Accidents" is displayed prominently in the campground, suggesting that entering and exiting the premises is somewhat difficult in traffic. But then, unless you are running late you probably won't want to bother to find out.

West of the highway, with a cornfield to the north and an agricultural field to the south, this campground has attractive landscaping (using bushes at the ends of rows) and towering shade trees. Nearly all sites in the park are very well shaded, with a grass floor. Sites 1, 2, 4, and 9 are enormous (100feet) pull-throughs, while 3 and 5-8 are 75-foot back-ins. End sites 16, 24, 32, 40, 48, and H have enormous leftover space at the ends of the rows. Sites 50-54 are 60-foot back-ins in a strip across from the office. Adjacent to these sites are sites 55-62, arranged in a semi-circle in the grass. These are undeveloped sites in a wooded area, with a very natural, almost wild, feel. (These sites can accommodate any size of rig, and can be pull-throughs if the adjacent area is clear.) Sites A-H face a residential area, and A and B are the least best sites in the campground, lacking shade trees. However, there is nary a truly bad site in the park. The rest rooms and showers are immaculate, well-lit, and tastefully

decorated. The laundry is contained in its own cute little cabin, and is open 24 hrs. Located 15 miles to most attractions, and 22 miles to Graceland, this park boasts very friendly management and is worth the drive out, especially given the state of other local campgrounds.

This is a large campground divided up into three camping areas: South (1-41), West (42-73), and North (74-104), in order from the entrance. All sites are forested, and have a paved parking area for an RV or other vehicle. Most sites open to a grassy field that campers can use for recreation. The South Area consists of two loops in a figure 8, the more northerly of the two loops containing reservable sites. Sites 1 and 8 are set very close to the road, which makes them less desirable; while 7 is set back

farther than most, making it rather more private. Sites 23 and 24 are on either side of a hiking trail head, and may experience more foot traffic for this reason. Sites 25 and 26 together form a double. The West Area is close to Lake Dunn; sites 46-50 are the closest campsites to the swimming beach. California

California's motto, Eureka, means "I have found it!" That sentiment is just as applicable to campers today as it was when it was first adopted a century and a half ago by the '49ers of the gold rush era. Indeed, the camping prospects are richer by far than what remains of the Golden State's mineral resources. From its 840 miles of shoreline, millions of acres of federal land, and 264 state parks (with scores more on the county level), California's scenery is a glittering reflection of all that is rare and wonderful in the natural beauty of the United States. With its relatively mild climate, many campgrounds remain open all year.

As one might expect in a state California's size, this is a land packed with extremes and superlatives: from **Mount Whitney**, the highest peak in the Lower 48 states, to **Badwater** in **Death Valley**, the lowest point in the Western Hemisphere. Its coast redwoods are the tallest trees in the world, and the bristlecone pines of the **Inyo National Forest** are the planet's oldest living organisms. To the south are sun-parched deserts awash in cacti and colorfully eroded landscapes that explode with wildflowers in the spring. Up north are the **Cascade Mountains**, iced with snow, scarred by lava, laced with trout streams, alpine lakes, and thousands of miles of hiking trails. In between are snow-crusted glaciers in the **Sierra Nevada Mountains**, one crashing waterfall after another, especially in **Yosemite Valley**, more national parks and monuments than any other state in the country, and a number of historical sites honoring Native American, Spanish, and Mexican explorers and African and Chinese pioneers, among others.

Beyond its silky-smooth beaches and tide pools, where passing whales and nesting seals can be observed, in addition to the superb fishing and boating in pristine lakes, rivers, and reservoirs, California's abundance of wildlife is icing on the camper's cake. Grizzly bears are long gone, but you will find Tule elk, Roosevelt elk, and fallow deer among the animals gracing the coastal preserves; big horn sheep, kangaroo rats, and desert tortoises in the arid areas; and black bears, coyotes, and black-tail deer roaming throughout. One needn't be a sharp-eyed birder to enjoy the sight of condors, Canada geese, bald and golden eagles, acorn woodpeckers, hummingbirds, valley quails, and herons of various types warbling among the oaks or winging across the marshlands.

Under the Clinton presidency, the Golden State gained the newly created **Mojave National Preserve** and two national monuments, **Carrizo Plain** and **Giant Sequoia**. The domains of **Pinnacles National Monument**, **Death Valley**, and **Joshua Tree National Parks** were substantially expanded. Hundreds of properties within California's national forests have been revamped and are now run by concessionaires intent on keeping them clean, secure, and profitable. Dispersed camping on lands administered by the National Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management offers serious solitude-seekers and the budget-minded a less structured approach to camping.

The 31st state also is chockfull of fascinating destinations should you get an itch for the kitsch. Just outside San Francisco Airport in Burlingame, you can relive your childhood while at the **Museum of Pez Memorabilia**. Every October the Santa Barbara County city of Carpinteria hosts its **Avocado Festival**, where it is highly probable that you will be encouraged by the locals to participate in helping create the world's largest bowl of guacamole. But if what you really desire is to be in the middle of things, we suggest a trek to Felicity, otherwise known as the **Center of the World**, and have your name not only inscribed on the **Wall for the Ages** but entered into the electronic archive.

Whatever your interests and however you like to camp, despite the confines of your itinerary, California has so much beauty and space that on pulling into a campground you may well feel inspired to imitate the '49ers by exclaiming with exuberance, "Eureka!"

You will have to pass Lower Rush Creek to reach this campground and may very well feel inclined to stop there for the night. No problem, the two are comparably pleasant, and Lower Rush has several walk-in sites, hidden away beyond a small wooden bridge, that are perfect for reclusive tenters. Upper Rush, though, is the more densely forested, tranquil of the two and offers a better array of sites. Conifers tower over the hilly dominion, providing shade and-through their fallen needles-soft padding for tents. To the north of camp is a volcanic outcropping, while the narrow, trickling Rush Creek sluices along its southern boundary. Some of the real estate here is not very level, but sites overall are very roomy and scattered well apart. Units 3-5, nestled above the creek, are the most picturesque. This facility is in the Modoc National Forest, 35 miles southwest of Alturas, off of Hwy. 299. It is nearly a mile high in altitude, making for cold nights early and late in the season. In winter, spigots are capped and no potable water is available.

If you chanced to visit this campground when the Mojave National Preserve was first created in 1994, there was a very good likelihood that you had the entire grounds to yourself. Times have changed as word has spread about the subtle beauty of this area, and now you will probably have neighbors. Unless, of course, you make the mistake of visiting this piece of desert in summer when it becomes a sweltering inferno without a single shade tree to be found in the camp's single loop. But at an elevation of 4,400 feet, Hole-in-the-Wall can be pretty comfortable in both autumn and spring, even if late afternoon winds often require the donning of jackets and hats for warmth. And while the yucca plants and pencil chollas don't provide much in the way of screening, sites, with both pull-through and back-in parking, are roomy, well spaced apart, and attractively positioned just below a rough looking canyon. The sunset view of the surrounding mountains is an added plus, as is the Rings Trail hike, with its trailhead half a mile to the south.

To paraphrase Dickens, Lake Hemet offers the best of campgrounds and the worst of campgrounds. It has a fine sandy beach but doesn't allow swimming in its namesake lake (wading is allowed in Hurkey Creek by the playground). The rugged, natural atmosphere radiating from the surrounding San Jacinto and Thomas mountain ranges is partly diminished by the cluttered cluster of the long-term residences. Several stands of mature ponderosa pines are scattered around the property but sites of dirt, sand, and a smattering of grass are largely exposed to the sun. And unless you like plenty of company, forget about a waterside location, especially among the RV hookups; the outlying areas without electricity are your best bet for space and seclusion. Security is one feature this facility is unequivocal about, with an entrance gate, regular patrols, and a county sheriff's office on the edge of the grounds.

The scenic mountain drive along Hwy. 243 to Stone Creek is a good warm-up for your arrival at this gorgeous highland park. Set in a hilly, boulderstrewn forest of oak and incense cedar, manzanita, and ponderosa pine, the camp lies at 5,900 feet of elevation, so plan for cool evenings throughout the year. Regrettably, the somewhat wild, natural look of the place is balanced by sites that tend to be grouped a bit close together, with several lacking level tenting space. Best choices for RVers from the series of loops are sites 45, with a large pullthrough slot, and 50, for privacy. Site 26 is the most secluded among the tent options. Birders will enjoy the lively community of acorn woodpeckers nesting in the vicinity and hikers should aim their boots in the direction of trails that lead into the neighboring San Jacinto Wilderness.

Your first impression of Afton Canyon may well be that it is a dusty God-forsaken over-sized sandbox where even the lowly creosote bush has difficulty putting down roots. And your second impression might echo your first, especially if a freight train should chance to rattle down the nearby tracks while you are there. But give your eyes-and your other senses-an opportunity to take in the surroundings and you may just find the low-key beauty of the place growing on you. Some of the level, sandy sites are screened by mesquite bushes, and most are spaced well apart, while desert dunes and the russet colored namesake canyon lend texture to the setting. (So, too, does a disturbing amount of litter, but that's another story.) There's a chance you'll see the elusive desert tortoise here, though rosy boas and kangaroo rats are more likely visitors. Bring plenty of water-the source here is unreliable-and note that while the campground is less than four miles south of I-15, a hairpin curve on the dirt and gravel washboard of an access road is all but impassable for vehicles over 22 feet in length.

Rock hounds like this area for its abundance of fossils, but they're overlooking the obvious: Owl Canyon is a diamond-in-the-rough. Conveniently located next to Rainbow Basin National Natural Landmark, just 11 miles north of Barstow, this campground is dramatically set against a colorful, eroded canyon of bentonite and limestone. Roomy, level sites are well spaced along a tri-pronged loop, with numbers 12-23 among the more private. Tableside ramadas are an essential campsite accouterment in an otherwise primitive locale that consists of just desert scrub and a few sparse Joshua trees for vegetation. Owl Canyon lies at an elevation of 2,600 feet and can be scorching hot from midspring through early autumn. Whenever you visit pack plenty of water, as none is available at the campground. And drive carefully, as the last time we traveled through we encountered a large, shy desert tortoise crossing the camp's dirt access road.

A question to ask before heading out to this campground is, how much time will you be spending at the site? Bass Lake, a pretty green mountain reservoir, is right across the street, an attractive venue for fishing, boating, and waterskiing. The surrounding national forest land and Yosemite National Park, 25 miles away, beckon to hikers. If you plan to put in most of your time soaking up the natural splendor of the environment, go ahead and book a spot at Lupine-Cedar Bluff. On second thought, make that a double. For while its hilltop setting, among an array of manzanita, oak, cedar, and pines, is superb, the exposed, grassy sites are disappointingly small and crammed right up against each other. In many cases the dimensions are so tight you won't be able to set up a tent and safely light a fire. The dozen walk-ins are OK for tenters, but this is more of a camp for motor homes, with paved parking slips and the vast majority of its spots set aside as multiple units. There are a handful of fine single sites, but the concession that runs this property-and dares to charge \$18 a night-does not permit reservations by number, only by type (single, double, on up to quadruple).

Of the several campgrounds along Glacier Lodge Rd., Big Pine Creek, at an elevation of 7,700 feet, is preferable for its green grassy look and close proximity to the rocky jaw-line of the overhanging mountains. It is a gorgeous, natural setting, shot through with Sierra granite, a creek running by, and an abundance of Jeffrey pines complementing its flush of aspens. There is only one blemish to all this beauty, the presence of a handful of private cabins at the center of the property. As is typical of mountain camps, many sites run toward the miniature, and seem to offer less privacy than you'd enjoy at a nudist colony. The exceptions, though, make this a winner, with the spots by the creek providing the best space and seclusion. The pick of the park are numbers 9, appealingly set in an old stone foundation, and 21-23, which are roomy and private. Showers, a snack bar, bait and tackle, and other basic supplies are available at the lodge.

Your first question on arriving at this notably primitive place will probably be, "Where's the view?" Don't despair. While none of the remarkably spacious, well-separated sites offer vistas of anything much beyond the sage-covered meadow at the center of the large loop, walk a few minutes in almost any direction and you will find rewarding panoramas of the outlying valleys and mountain ranges. The best of this national forest land, though, lies five miles farther up the road, at the Ancient Bristlecone Pine Forest, with trails leading past some of the oldest trees on the planet. (The relatively new visitor center there keeps irregular hours.) Pull-through parking slots are available at a number of sites, and most of the latter benefit at least partly from the shade cast by mature junipers, piñons, and other conifers. Weather can be scorching in late spring and early autumn, but at 8,600 feet of elevation, expect nights to be cool and quite breezy. There is no water available, and trash must be packed out.

The redwood trees of Pfeiffer Big Sur are neither the largest nor oldest along the California coast. In fact, there is a more impressive grove just two miles south, at the privately operated Ventana Campground. The trees are so numerous there and grow so close together that the property, with small sites priced around \$40 a night, seems perpetually moist and dark. The trees at Pfeiffer, on the other hand, are big without blocking the sunlight. They compose only one part of three distinct habitats represented over the five dispersed loops, with an oak woodland and grassy meadows making up the balance. The Big Sur River parallels the campground, which consists of level sites of dirt and leaves. Those in the first two loops are a bit more spacious than elsewhere. There are some excellent hiking trails in this ever-popular park, with Buzzards Roost in particular delivering superb views of the surrounding hills. Poison oak is abundant around the campground and beggar squirrels can strip your table of food before you're even aware they've invaded.

East Fork is nestled in a rocky canyon with snowcapped Sierra peaks looming above, a thrilling setting very near the gorgeous Rock Creek Lake. The creek itself gurgles through the property, which consists of a hodge-podge of sites, some shaded by lodgepole pines and junipers, others screened by aspen trees, and many exposed to the sun. While most are respectably scattered apart, sites are on the small side, with some so snug there's not enough room to set up anything but a bivvy tent. Still, we find this Invo National Forest facility infinitely preferable to that at the lake, which is basically a campers' corral in a parking lot. Creek-side site 86 is especially recessed and private, 108 is quite large, and 110-112 and 114 are very good runners-up. At 9,000 feet elevation, this high altitude camp can get hit by snow at almost any time of year, so plan your trip accordingly.

"Stunning," "drop-dead gorgeous," and "breathtaking," all describe the spectacular beauty of this high altitude campground that is encircled by a series of jagged, snow-patched Sierra Nevada peaks. The rugged landscape is enhanced by its position next to Jamison Creek and the great variety of conifers, as well as willows, alders, and cottonwoods, that provide it with shade. Flourishing though the forest is, a fair degree of sunlight manages to warm the property. Most sites are roomy and set pretty well apart along a small series of loops. Eureka Peak was once known as Gold Mountain, a testimony to the extensive mining activity that went on in the Jamison area from the gold rush days through the end of the first world war. A mining history museum within the park preserves buildings and equipment from that era. Once a month, in summer, docents in period dress attempt to recreate a sense of what camp life was like in the 1890s.

In the dusty desert landscape common to this part of the state, Mayflower is a welcome oasis and, situated just seven miles north of I-10, a convenient one to pilgrims sailing along the highway. Well manicured, grassy sites are partially shaded by mesquite trees, eucalyptus and cottonwoods, with the tent area-separated from two other RV loops-especially appealing. The view of the Plomosa Mountains across the state line in Arizona is superb, but it is the border itself, marked here by the Colorado River (which flows just below the campground and is accessible via an in-camp boat ramp and swimming lagoon) that is the real attraction for most visitors. Peace-and-quiet seekers take note: boating on this stretch of river during summer months-weekends especially-is more popular than a high school prom queen, so be prepared to hear the constant whine of two-stroke engines being pushed to their limits. That activity largely fades away in the off-season, but winter brings hordes of a different sort of camper, snowbirds by the RV-load.

This good-looking, spacious campground is right off of Hwy. 1, just a short trail's walk from the ocean. Three separate loops undulate across sandy dunes in a semi-forested environment colored by ferns, dune grass, Monterey pines, and eucalyptus. Sites of grass and sand are decently roomy and planted well apart, with a number of pull-through parking slips on hand. Of the latter, numbers 3 and 4 are very private and shaded by conifers. Similarly isolated are 24, 32, 36, 69, 86, and 88, and their nestled-in-the-dunes position is a welcome buffer against road noise and brisk coastal breezes. The steady drone of a distant foghorn is less a disturbing influence than a contributor to the pleasant seaside atmosphere. In spite of its beauty, this facility is often wonderfully under-populated. This campground is situated in the mouth of the expansive Borrego Palm Canyon near the heart of Anza-Borrego Desert State Park. That central location ensures a level of use and popularity well beyond most of the many other camps in this, the largest of state parks in the Lower 48 states. A good range of facilities adds to its appeal, with drinking water, showers, full hookups, and even a few partially enclosed stone shelters (complete with fireplaces) available. Though shade is scarce, ramadas over tables provide some relief from a sun that is scorching much of the year. As the largest state park in the Lower 48 states, Anza-Borrego has many attractions: a varied desert landscape, beautiful wildflowers in the spring, a mastodon site, and no shortage of fine camping options. Of these latter, Bow Willow is one of the standouts, with a pair of loops meandering along the lower contours of a rocky canyon. Sandy sites are marginally screened from each other by ocotillo, mesquite, salt bush, and cholla cacti, with numbers 1 and 16 at the periphery the most private. An easy 1.5-mile trail out of camp leads to several shady groves of California fan palms, where we spotted a black hooded oriole and a fluorescent green hummingbird our last time through. No-fee overflow camping is available one mile up the road at the primitive Mountain Palm Springs.

To those who appreciate the low key beauty of the desert and enjoy roughing it, Culp Valley, nine miles west of Borrego Springs, is a hidden gem. Large granite boulders litter a chaparral landscape punctuated by buckwheat, cat's claw, staghorn cholla, and dwarf oak. Most sites are extraordinarily spacious, and several are shielded from view by high hedges of sugar bush, which makes for a more peaceful experience than what is possible in the more popular-and populated-developed campgrounds elsewhere in Anza-Borrego. The trade-off is that creature comforts are limited to surprisingly clean vaulted toilets; no water is available, and you will have to pack out your trash. A greater nuisance though is the biting wind that tends to whistle through camp from late fall through early spring. That, and an altitude of 3,400 feet, will make you glad you packed a heavy sweater, should you visit in the off-season. If you come in summer, you'll very likely find yourself alone in the whole blazing park.

A campground sporting the name Honeymoon Flat had better be the sort of cozily romantic place you'd want to take your sweetheart. Well, go right ahead, as this idyllic spot lives up to that promise, and then some. Twin Lakes Rd. divides it into two sections, with both hugging Robinson Creek. Many of the grassy sites along the camp's series of sandy loops abut the water, allowing you to fish for trout from tent-side, or simply dandle your toes in the rippling water. Though sites are a shade small, privacy is well above average, with screening provided by a mix of pines and, especially, the luminescent leaves of quaking aspen. Most of the sites are back-ins, however, seven pull-throughs are available. Site 3, very recessed and with water flowing by on three sides, might well be the envy of Diana. Number 5 is similarly romantic. Bears sitings in the park are common and generally cause little fuss. There are half a dozen other campgrounds in the neighborhood, but this is the only one that hasn't been smothered by an excess of asphalt. When you are at 7,000 feet, surrounded by the high Sierras, a campground shouldn't look like a parking lot. Due to the altitude, the road leading to the campground is extremely winding and not recommended for large RVs.

As far as rustic campgrounds go, this one, set at 4,000 feet among alpine meadows and mixed tree communities high in the rugged mountains of the Los Padres National Forest, is almost perfect. It is so far out-the nearest town is more than 15 miles away-that the only sounds likely to disturb you will come from Steller's jays, acorn woodpeckers, owls, or coyotes. Unless you happen to have particularly obnoxious neighbors. Even so, most of the dirt and pebbly sites along the double loop are regally spacious and far apart, screened by manzanita, live oak, and Coulter pines, with an accent here and there of shiny, putty colored rock outcroppings. Shade is abundant, though several units are open and sunny, and a few offer superb vistas of sunsets and the valley far below. In spring the hills are a velvety green that is a delight to behold, but be alert to changing weather as the pockmarked road leading here can be very tricky when wet. Figueroa is a pack-in, pack-out facility with an unreliable water supply.

In most respects Quaking Aspen is a very average, unextraordinary campground. Yet its position, at 7,000-feet elevation in the heart of Giant Sequoia National Monument's southern unit, makes it an ideal base for day hikes into the area's redwood groves. There is a grassy meadow on one side of this pretty, peaceful, hillside camp, and Freeman Creek flows nearby. Fair-sized sites of dirt and pine needles are set reasonably far apart around the double loop, and shaded by an abundance of lodgepole pines-but curiously few aspens. Units 12, 19, 21, and 29 are among the more recessed and shady, and 23 and 24 the more private ones in the meadow area. Tenters may want to consider Belknap (no trailers or RVs allowed), nine miles west on Hwy. 190, where they can strike camp under the protective aura of redwood trees. Telephone, gasoline, propane, and a general store are available two miles south at Ponderosa Lodge.

Lake Morena Reservoir is home to some of the better bass and trout fishing in the area, with the record for the former weighing in at a whopping 19 pounds, 3 ounces. But even when the water has been drawn down to the size of a pond, typically by late July or early August, there is still plenty to do here, from biking and hiking the nature trails to hooking up to the Pacific Crest Trail, which cuts through the park. Granite-spiked hills surround the domain, with the campground's grassy, fairly tightly concentrated sites well shaded by thick-limbed live oaks, incense cedars, and Jeffrey and Coulter pines. Best for spaciousness and lake view-at least when water levels are high-are sites 81 and 85, with 6-14 good fall-back options. And though rest rooms are a bit shabby looking, they are kept reasonably clean. Dogs are supposed to be kept on leashes, but enforcement is lax. Tent campers looking for more space and privacy may want to stake out a spot at the North Shore primitive area.

Tired of sweeping buckets of sand out of your tent or RV after every trip to the beach? Then you owe it to yourself to check out this splendid campground, located just five miles east of Santa Cruz off of Hwy. 1. The bluff-top real estate is lush and grassy, graced with a comforting balance of shade and sun that filters through a high canopy of pines and eucalyptus trees. Many of the refreshingly spacious spots enjoy great vistas of the crashing surf. And of those that do not, a hefty share have the edge in privacy, being buffered by dense hedges of coastal chaparral. Sites 25 and 94 are the most isolated, while 36 is the best screened of the view options. And if sand in your shelter isn't a problem, you can always bring a bucketful back from the idyllic beach, reachable via a short trail next to site 50. Poison oak thrives around the edge of this park. At the time of publication, this park was scheduled to close for up to one year for reconstruction so contacting the park before scheduling your camping trip is advised.

There is much to like about South Carlsbad State Beach. Such as the pretty beach and its convenient location just off I-5, 25 miles north of San Diego. Sites are positioned side-by-side high above the sea on a sandy bluff, and are both spacious and buffered with thick hedges that provide a certain degree of privacy. The straight-in linear layout of the camp road endows half the property with fine views of the Pacific Ocean. Of course, the narrowness of the bluff means that you are likely to have neighbors on three of your spot's four sides when the camp is busy, which is most of the year, given its near-constant use by hordes of college-age campers. At those times the flow of traffic can seem never-ending, a problem compounded by the busy external road that parallels the park's entire length. True, that constant hum of vehicles helps drown out the boisterousness of other campers and the squealing whistles of Amtrak trains that tend to pass the property on an hourly basis, but that may be of small consolation to light sleepers. At least the ocean-side sites benefit from the sonorous sound of the surf. Overall, South Carlsbad is quieter than San Elijo State Beach to the south, where the deafening roar of railroad and highway vehicles seems to be bearing down on one's tent. San Elijo does, however, offer some sites with hookups.

Planning to be in the Monterey vicinity? If you are hauling a trailer or driving an RV you will find that Saddle Mountain has a lot going for it. Like full hookups, including cable TV, a heated swimming pool (Memorial Day through Labor Day), basketball, volleyball, horseshoes, hiking, and even fishing in the nearby Carmel River. Formerly the ranch of Kern County Land Company, KCL is now one of two camps in Carrizo Plain National Monument, a park established near the end of president Clinton's term in office. The monument's staff suggests upgraded facilities are coming, but for now this campground offers nil beyond a portable toilet. No water, no trash pickup, no host, just a pretty setting alongside a photogenic barn and corral. The large sites are shaded by ancient eucalyptus trees, backed up against the base of the Caliente Mountains and with a view across the grasslands to the San Andreas fault and the Temblor Range. Ten miles to the east is Painted Rock, a pictograph-covered relic from when Native Americans still roamed the plains. Near that is Soda Lake, a glistening salt-crusted body of water that attracts migrating birds, most notably the sandhill crane, throughout the winter. The tall grass of the plains, where pronghorn antelope and black-tailed deer frequently graze, is streaked yellow with wildflowers in the spring before the scorching heat of summer turns everything brown. Note that the deeply rutted dirt camp road is impassable when wet, and the nearest telephone is at the intersection of Soda Lake Rd. and Hwy. 166, 20 miles southeast of KCL.

This campground is in a park that is way the heck off the beaten track, with just a portable toilet and non-potable water for amenities. Most of the year wind howls through camp, and when it finally

ceases the heat of summer feels like a blast furnace. So why bother to visit Carrizo Plain, one of the newest monuments in the national park system? For several reasons, actually, such as to see sandhill cranes-and many other water fowl-nesting during the winter by the salt-glistening shores of Soda Lake. And for ranger-led tours of Painted Rock, a 55-foot high rock decorated with Native American pictographs, with some estimated to be as old as 2,000 years. There is also a trail to the San Andreas fault that showcases the awesome power of earthquakes. Spring wildflower displays, too, are sensational. Trails into a Wilderness Study Area, part of the Caliente Mountains, start at Selby and pass through hills dotted with juniper, sage and salt bush. Selby, set at the base of a slanting escarpment, features five oversize, unshaded sites with plenty of parking for even the largest of RVs. The nearest telephone is 14.5 miles away in California Valley.

The stark, saw-toothed spires that give this small park its name rise some 4,000 feet from the Sacramento River to the tips of their granite peaks. If the challenging, highly strenuous hike up there from the campground doesn't take your breath away, the spectacular views will. The domain straddles I-5, with the larger part of it, including the crags, lying west of the highway. To the east, just beyond the railroad tracks and right alongside the river, are 12 grassy sites that are ideal for anglers. The main campground, though, is across the road, higher up toward the summit. Its three ascending loops snake through an attractively wooded hillside of oaks, cedars, and pines, with mediocre screening between closely set, shallow sites. The most private is 11, though its rear faces a chainlink fence. Similarly recessed are 14 and 15, and both 26 and 37 have pull-through parking. The stone masonry of the fire pits dates from when the Civilian Conservation Corps was active here more than 60 years ago. The continuous roar of traffic emanating from the interstate is a jarring note to an otherwise splendid setting.

Elam is a small, primitive national forest facility that is about 15 miles west of Chester, to the south of Lassen Volcanic National Park. It would be quite an appealing camp if it were not overcrowded so much of the time. A bubbling creek flows by one side of its short access lane, a steep embankment parallels the other, and granite rocks and boulders litter the narrow grounds. Why is Elam so popular? The answer, in a word, is trout. The creek is regularly stocked, and unlike other bodies of water in the area, anglers are allowed to keep what they catch. You can spend the day trying to lure the fish onto your hook, then while away the evenings swapping stories with newly made fishing buddies about the huge ones that got away. Level, paved-surfaced sites are small and exposed-not just to each other but also to the picnic area directly across the creekmajor shortcomings in such a highly trafficked property. Number 15, at the end of the lane, is the most private site, followed by 14, at the water's edge, and 11, also creekside. The altitude of 4,400 feet justifies packing a sweater, even in summer.

There is a rough-surfaced russet knob of granite on one flank of this expansive camp, a steep rocky slope on another, and all around are fabulous views of the mountains. Thick-trunked Jeffrey pines are the dominant trees in these parts, though the campground is also accented by juniper and such chaparral as salt bush and sage. Unlike Leavitt Meadows, just up the road, there's no river flowing by this turf, but sites here are clearly superior, and many offer pull-through parking. Most are roomier and largely more private, owing partly to a thick undergrowth of mountain mahogany, and partly to their wider distribution along a series of four loops. Additionally, the breathtaking views of the Sierras simply cannot be beat. Unless you strap a pack to your back and hoof it higher into the mountains, or head out to the Walker River to fish for rainbow trout. Elevation at Sonora Bridge, which is 20 miles west of Bridgeport, is 6,800 feet; icy winds whistle through camp early and late in the year, so bring along some warm clothing.

The marked increase in visitation to this sweet gem of a park proves The Secret is out. No wonder, with its grounds, which overlap the Sacramento River, so fertile and grassy, and its recessed, scattered campsites framed by massive, aged valley oaks. Unbelievably, this sylvan glade is not concealed in some forested outback, but instead is located a scant six miles east of Corning and I-5, three miles west of Hwy. 99 and Vina. If fishing is your game, prepare to mark your datebook: king salmon runs are optimum from October through May, the peak for shad is in July and August, striped bass in early fall, steelhead in October and November, and catfish may be caught just about any time of year. If that is not enough to lure you to this appealing recreation area, perhaps its extraordinary bird-watching will, with yellowbilled cuckoos, hummingbirds, pheasants, hawks, falcons, and many other species commonly seen. So are swarms of mosquitoes, from spring through mid-summer-plan to bring repellant. Older guidebooks list Woodson Bridge as having a dump station but fallen trees now make that inaccessible. There are no plans yet to restore it.

Heading south from Oregon along US 199, Jedediah Smith Redwoods State Park is the northernmost of several redwoods-focused state parks. Named for the first white man known to cross the Coast Range of mountains, Jed Smith is a striking introduction to Sequoia sempervirens. These giant redwood trees are the tallest living things in the world, with several old-growth groves towering over the 10,000-acre preserve. The campground is less than ten miles northeast of Crescent City, set beside the emerald-green Smith River. Tan oaks, maples, and rhododendrons thrive among the red barked atavars, with moss and hanging lichen contributing to the cool, shady, rain forest atmosphere. The roomy and well-screened sites are spread decently apart over a series of loops, the most private being 68 (with a river view), 70 (a spacious end spot), and 77. Site 60 has pullthrough parking. Years ago local Native Americans gathered the green, stringy lichen that hangs from the trees and dried it to use as soft bedding material. It-and all other vegetation within the parkis now protected by the state.

This campground is set in the heart of Mill Creek Canyon among a concentration of red alders and second-growth redwoods. It is a moist, antediluvian environment, with winter rainfall, which averages 100 inches, contributing to a fertile, mossy, jungle-like luminescence. Rhododendrons, azaleas, maples, and ferns thrive here, along with pale yellow slugs as thick as a thumb and a good deal longer. A sextet of loops features level grass and dirt sites that are smallish and rather crowded together, but fairly well-screened by the flourishing foliage and equipped with capacious car slips. One of the larger spots is 38, by the creek, and of the many walk-up units, 4, 5, and 6 offer the best privacy. A pristine stretch of beach is accessible via the challenging Damnation Creek Trail, an old Native American path that loses 1,000 feet as it descends through a grove of old-growth redwoods. Mill Creek is closed to fishing from October through April to protect spawning salmon.

This state park provides sun and surf lovers access to more than a mile of beautiful beach, with the good news for campers being that a healthy number of sites are set right on the sand. Stroll from your tent to the shore in one fluid motion, or bask in a sunset radiating over the water from the comfort of your picnic table. If it is high tide, this must be "surfin' USA"! And if the water is low, grab your children and go check out the tide pools. All of these somewhat tightly packed sites benefit from the fresh breeze of the salty sea, but the ones to the rear of camp are annoyingly close to railroad tracks, and also have the dubious distinction of facing a large housing development across the interstate. Best by far are those on the beach, such as 38-43, and odd numbers from 45-59. Though swimming is ideal from late June through early autumn, solitude-seekers will enjoy camping here in winter, when daytime temperatures are still comfortable.

If you are looking for a taste of the high Sierras without having to venture too far off the road, Leavitt Meadows, at 7,000 feet elevation and 25 miles west of Bridgeport, should be a good fit. This roadside camp, ensconced in a bend in the West Walker River, is close enough to the water that the raging current drowns out much of the noise of passing traffic. Rising across the river is a flinty outcropping, and a granite-streaked ridge looms above camp. Juniper, aspen, sage, and various conifers set the stage around the single loop, where diminutive, dirt sites are well spread apart. The handful of spots nearest the water are the most exposed, and tenters may find the waterward tilt challenging. An exception is number 9, which is well-screened and has pull-through parking. Away from the river, 15, while a touch small, is under a large pine and shielded by aspens. Drinking water is shut off early and late in the year, due to the higher risk of freezing weather. That is, nonetheless, our preferred time to visit this part of the Sierra Nevadas, when visitation is at its lightest.

Visit this campground between May and September and you'll have a good idea of what Hades is all about; you are also likely to have most of the domain to yourself. Certainly the "furnace" half of its name seems apt, with an oppressive blanket of heat clinging to the dry terrain in much the manner that bark hugs the trunk of a tree. As to the "creek," just be thankful for water spigots. Level sites of hard clay are closely grouped around a series of loops, with a bit of shade provided by mesquite, creosote bushes, and tamarisk trees. The blistering heat seems magnified by the camp's position at 196 feet below sea level, but we prefer it to Stovepipe Wells, which is little more than a pebbly parking lot without a twig of shade. The park visitor center is next to the campground, and a number of excellent hikes and drives are in the vicinity. Laundry machines, showers, swimming pool, general store, and gasoline are available at Furnace Creek Ranch.

The vast tract of land that is Death Valley National Park is far more than a barren, stagnant desert. Give it a chance and your appreciation for the parched beauty of the scenery will likely grow as you explore the park: from the volcanic craters in the north to the salt water basins to its south, from its shifting sand dunes to the multicolored mountains that range like twin spines up its entire length. You'll be in good position at Mesquite Spring to check out Ubehebe Crater and Scotty's Castle, a lavish 1920s vacation home built in Spanish mission style. This campground is more exposed than Furnace Creek, but it benefits, after the sun goes down, from being 2,000 feet higher. It is set against a mud-colored canyon wall and a dry creek, with two low mountain ridges paralleling its double loop. Dusty, pebbly sites are on the spacious side, and they are grouped farther apart than at Furnace Creek, allowing for a greater degree of privacy. A couple of cottonwoods mark where the spring is. The nearest pay phone is at the Grapevine Ranger Station, 2.5 miles north; fuel is available at Scotty's Castle; a general store is in Stovepipe Wells, 41 miles south.

The wonderful, oleander-shaded picnic area in the dramatically eroded Wildrose Canyon is misleading. You will find nothing so pleasant in the way of plantings at the similarly named campground. Still, there is a Spartan beauty to this arid, primitive camp. Very Spartan. It is located in a side gully of the canyon, with rumpled hills on either side. There are no shade trees to shelter the dusty, pebbly ground, only such scrub as creosote and salt bushes. The same, of course, might also be said of most of Death Valley's other campgrounds; at least Wildrose has potable water. Because the campground, which is 30 miles south of Stovepipe Wells Village, is at 4,100 feet of elevation, evenings are blessedly cooler here than elsewhere in the park. Comparable spots are roomy but exposed, and dispersed in two sections (the upper one being reserved for tents). Even when Furnace Creek and Stovepipe Wells are brimming with campers, you are likely to find plenty of space and tranquility at this remote place. Use it as a base for exploring such Death Valley attractions as the beehiveshaped charcoal kilns, Skidoo, a ghost town, and the Eureka mine.

Not too many years ago this family-operated campground was a dairy farm and many of the rustic buildings from that era remain, along with miscellaneous farm implements that have been decoratively strewn about the property. It is hard to imagine, though, that the scene was any prettier when cows lowed through the grassy meadows and varied woodland than it is today, even when brimming with campers. The level property sits in an oxbow bend of the Russian River, a perfect position that blesses it not only with a number of water-view sites but also a greater amount of serenity than the bucolic camp's road-side counterparks. True, the full hookup area next to a row of pollarded trees at Casini's core is typically congested. If you don't require pull-through parking and can get by without a sewer connection, such pleasantly secluded spots as 88-90, 92-94, and 96-98 are infinitely more appealing. Similarly, 36-40 are the pick of the primitive options, where grassy sites are so spacious and well buttressed by vegetation as to satisfy even the most finicky of tent campers.

People familiar with Lake Jennings from previous years may be excused if they fail to recognize it in its current state. The most obvious change is the spruced up landscaping, with geraniums and other annuals lending a welcome splash of color to a ridge-top setting marked by holly, acacia, prickly pear cacti, eucalyptus, pepper trees, and a variety of conifers. That's not all, as structural renovations have encompassed the rest rooms and showers, as well as upgraded electrical hookups. Unaffected by these alterations, alas, are the gravel sites themselves, which are shoe-horned close together, several resting on ground so tilted that hammocks might seem preferable to tents. Thankfully, abundant vegetation yields some privacy and many units along the park's spiraling loop road enjoy excellent vistas. Numbers 20, 22, 24, 43, and 45 are among the standout tenting options, with 89-91 tops for RVs. The lake is stocked with trout in the winter and catfish summertime, but boating is only allowed on weekends.

In many ways Rio Bend is a community unto itself. Dixon Lake is almost too good to be true: the camp's hilltop location lies at just over 1,000 feet elevation, with a dramatic panorama of greater Escondido on one side and the small lake on the other. This latter is actually a stocked reservoir with great fishing for trout in the fall and catfish and bass year-round. Like the fish you'll throw back, some sites may be a tad small, but they are spaced fairly well apart amid a field of granite boulders that just beg to be scrambled over, and amply shaded by an appealing potpourri of trees, including the ubiquitous eucalyptus, live oak, a variety of pines, toyon, and ceanothus, as well as a healthy accent of agave. Aside from the handful of spots near the park road, it is hard to go wrong, with numbers 8, 11, 12, and 37 particularly private and 26 and 29 yielding great city views. And when you tire of boating, fishing, and hiking, the San Diego Wild Animal Park is just a 15 minutes' drive away.

Palomar Mountain State Park is located very near an observatory that houses one of America's largest ground-based telescopes, a testimony to the clarity of the night sky in these parts. That facility is offlimits to the public, but barring an overcast sky you should be able to see plenty of stars from the privacy of your campsite. Most are pretty spacious and hug the contours of the hilly mountainside, which compensates for an overall lack of screening. Which is not to suggest that the terraced loops meander over a denuded knob (though there is a fair share of gray granite and mossy rocks scattered about the domain). On the contrary, this charming campground is well forested with cedars, live oak, Douglas firs, and Coulter pines. The rest rooms and a couple of sites are wheelchair accessible, but most of the rest involve negotiating a few stone stairs, solid relics from when the Civilian Conservation Corps was working in the area 60 years ago. The best seasons to camp here are spring and fall, though at an elevation of 4,700 feet the risk of snowfall exists from November through early April. Plan accordingly.

Unlike many of the other state-run campgrounds situated in redwood forests, this one is easy to get to on a smooth piece of road just five miles off US 101, 40 miles south of Eureka. The highly scenic Ave. of the Giants flows through the park, threading for 32 miles past several impressive groves, including the must-see Rockefeller Forest. Of the three campgrounds here, only Burlington is open year-round. Its sites are grouped fairly closely together across a convoluted double loop, with 29 one of the more spacious and 37 a roomy corner spot. There are some impressive specimens of Sequoia sempervirens within Burlington, sturdy red pillars that allow only filtered streaks of sunlight through to the dirt and pine needle-layered forest floor. There are also a handful of decaying logs and a shocking number of redwood stumps. These latter serve as sober reminders of what might well have befallen the remaining giants had it not been for the efforts of conservationists.

This inauspiciously named campground, also known as Pit No. 1, is actually in a very pretty-if somewhat overgrown—forested setting abutting the Pit River. You may find it totally vacant, which is ideal since the best site, which is right on the water looking across to a tiny island, is also the most popular. Or the twin loops might be choked with vehicles, especially on weekends from late spring through summer. Most of the level, leafstrewn sites lie in the shadow of oaks and a few pines, next to a scruffy meadow. The handful of spots by the water are crammed closely together; otherwise there is space and privacy galore. Pit lies at 3,000 feet of elevation, which is quite comfortable for this region of the Cascade Mountain range. Though not exactly an Eden, Pit River has had its share of serpents, in the form of litterers, despite the presence of plenty of trash bins. No potable water is available, nor does the Bureau of Land Management seem to supervise the land. Local police, though, occasionally patrol. The nearest telephone is in Fall River Mills.

The first thing you may notice on pulling into the pair of double loops that comprise this campground is that despite the park's name there are precious few burly looking redwoods in evidence. The natural forested atmosphere derives from an abundance of knob cone pines, madrone trees, and moss-covered oaks. The Cowell grove of redwoods is a 40-minute hike (or 5-minute drive) away. Such minor misrepresentations aside, this is a fine park with roomy leaf- and dirt-based sites ranging from sun-dappled to shady, from exposed to wellshielded. Unfortunately, noise carries here and can be a big problem on weekends when Bay Area residents descend in droves. The presence of a summer-time host augments an otherwise lax enforcement of quiet time. Trash tossed into fire grates is another nuisance. Be alert to poison oak

and if you plan to visit in the spring pack along insect repellant.

One of the more pleasant aspects of this county park is that it does not get over-run by hordes of campers, unlike other lakeside camps in the area. Boaters are not in dry-dock country, though; there is good fishing in the Kings River, which flows from the Pine Flat Dam past one side of camp, and boatramp access to the reservoir is nearby. The level, grassy turf is attractively punctuated here and there by a great range of such shade trees as oak, sycamore, and black walnut, and encompassed by undulating hills of golden grass and traces of granite. There is a uniformity to the double-loop layout, with open sites so comparable that one is as good as another. This is an invaluable oasis during the summer, which runs in these parts from May through September. The grounds are raked and well maintained, though some rest rooms lack taps and have a neglected air to them. There is a general store and fuel station in Piedra, three miles to the west.

Shelter Cove RV Park is for the Bohemian at heart, for people who love the ocean, enjoy fishing for salmon, and don't mind stray dogs wandering through their campsite. It is also for people who live to socialize and don't require much sleep, because in peak season the entire patch of gently tilting grassland that makes up this domain can seem like one continuous block party. On summer weekends there is live music on the patio and sizzling barbecues are centered around the giant crab cooker. Sites are small and shoe-horned together, but enjoy unobstructed views of the ocean, which is a few yards off the lot. Rugged highlands loom over the inland side of Shelter Cove. A small public park—complete with a diminutive lighthouse lies immediately to its south, and at the opposite end is a county airport. Unfortunately, the occasional plane that approaches the airstrip comes in so low you might think it's trying to land on top of your RV. Of the single lavatory located at the deli/snack bar, we've seen cleaner facilities at the end of a four-day beer festival. Your best bet is to use the toilets in the public park. This campground lies 25 tortuous miles west of Garberville across the King Range National Conservation Area, a drive that requires your vehicle's brakes to be in good working order.

This tidy, well-maintained campground is perched just above the Middle Fork of the Smith River, about 20 miles northeast of Crescent City along US 199. Though a rather average facility, it is a worthy alternative to Jedediah Smith Redwood State Park, just down the road, if the latter is full, or if the wild, moldering atmosphere of a moss-encrusted oldgrowth forest leaves you shivering. Its central location within the Smith River National Recreation Area also makes Panther Flat a suitable base camp for day hikes and fishing the several rivers in the locale. There are only a few redwoods here, of the spindly second-growth variety, and they are overshadowed by tan oaks and madrones. Level gravel sites, well-groomed and equipped with large back-in parking slips, are moderately spacious and evenly distributed around a small grassy meadow at the heart of the elongated double-oval camp lane.

Redwood trees are what this park is all about, with some groves so dense you may find yourself wondering whether the sun has gone into eclipse. Madrone trees and tan oaks round out a very natural, attractive hilltop forest habitat that is laced with 20 miles of hiking trails. Sites of matted leaves and grass are above average in size and distributed over four separate loops, with those in Tan Oak both more private and open to diffused sunlight. There is also a generous amount of gravel-surfaced pull-through parking slips available throughout the campground. The Civilian Conservation Corps was based here in the early 1930s; fieldstone fire pits in some sites are solid reminders of their efforts. Around the same time, William Hearst donated a pair of white fallow deer to the park. Their descendants are still present, housed in a pen near the visitor center. Black tailed deer, covotes, foxes, and bobcats also call this part of the Santa Cruz Mountain range home.

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Dark Day Campground, a tent-only, walk-in facility just up the road from Schoolhouse, is blessed from its bluff-top aerie with a heavenly vista of Bullards Bar Reservoir. Sites at Schoolhouse, on the other hand, enjoy no water views. Even so, it is a peaceful, engaging camp, located above the lake on a hill that is thick with conifers, madrone, toyon, and dogwood. The triple loop winds its way across an undulating terrain, where roomy sites are granted a fair degree of privacy. There is plenty of pull-through parking available, and many of the back-ins are large enough for vehicles hauling boats. The most secluded spots are 24, 37, and 40, while 26, a pullthrough, is very deep. From mid-October through early spring only sites 1-14 are kept open and no potable water is available. Bullards Bar Dam, constructed in 1969, is California's largest, and ranks fourth in size in the United States.

Of the many level, rather spacious sites here, there is a healthy balance between those that are open and exposed and others that are flanked by incense cedars, manzanita, Douglas firs, and ponderosa pines. Shade or sun, boating and fishing versus hiking or swimming, one thing that everybody can agree on is that the sightlines are magnificent from camp to glimmering Lake Almanor and the rumpled mountains looming above. Access to the lake is easy, too, with only a gentle tilt to the ground near the water-instead of the steep embankments of many other reservoir lakes-and loops that hug the meandering contours of the shore. Arguably, the very finest site is 40, isolated on a finger of land projecting into the lake; its neighbor, 41, is a very good runner-up. Similarly situated is 50, a double site that's ideal for large groups or oversize RVs. Tent campers should angle for 12, a cedar-shaded walk-in near the shore. A "camp library" of paperbacks is located in a cabinet across from the "supervisor," an on-site employee of American Land & Leisure, which operates the property for Pacific Gas & Electric.

Given a choice between camping at Moccasin Point or Fleming Meadows, just down the road, the first wins hands down. For one thing, sites at Moccasin are not wedged together quite as tightly, and they benefit from a greater concentration of such shade and privacy providers as oaks, various conifers, and manzanita. Another point in its favor is the picturesque landscape, which ranges from chaparral-covered Sierra foothills to rolling fields of wildflower-dotted golden grass. The layout consists of a figure-8 loop and a triple circuit, both of which descend toward the jade-green water over a series of tiers. The most private sites are B 6, 10, 17, C 7, 8, 15, and 16. One drawback of this fine campground is the dearth of lake views. Oddly, the best water access is available via its primitive D and E overflow loops, the latter being graced with its own lagoon. Site distribution is more concentrated there, but shade is abundant.

No one cares to stay at The Pines very long, seldom more than one night. That is no reflection on this peaceful haven just off of Hwy. 120, nine miles east of Groveland. It's just that with the entrance to Yosemite National Park 15 miles farther on, this serves more as a brief lav-over camp than a destination. The clean, attractive campground, located behind a forest ranger station, features level, grassy sites scattered over an L-shaped access road. There are plenty of oak trees, manzanita, and cedars sprinkled in among the mature pines, yielding abundant shade to this lush sward. Even so, sites, while somewhat roomy, are rather exposed. Best of the group are a pair of walk-ins, 6 and 7, which are well-recessed amid a clutch of stumps and a small marsh. Elevation is 3,200 feet, auguring for coolbut-pleasant nights most of the year.

Shortly after the end of World War II, renowned ceramist Marguerite Wildenhain of the Bauhaus school came to settle in this area. She found inspiration in the sublime beauty of her surroundings, a feeling that countless campers have shared since then. If you are able to get your vehicle up the steep, narrow, meandering access road-and that's a big if-you will find stunning mountain views and an enchanting forested atmosphere. Feral pigs, wild turkeys, bobcats, and the elusive spotted owl make their homes in these redwood- and tan oak-covered hills. You are more likely, though, to see frogs by the pond, where the camp lane ends. Fern-freckled sites are distributed fairly well apart and though they are a tad small and some are planted on slanting ground, such minor discomforts seem an acceptable tradeoff for camping in so attractive a place. The park closes when the fire risk is extreme, so be sure to call ahead in summer.

A popular rafting stretch of the Klamath River flows right by this pretty little campground, with easy put-in access to the water. Like Fort Goff to the west, this is a roadside facility, with a key difference being that Sarah Totten is recessed from Hwy. 96 and thus approaching autos do not seem to be bearing down on one's tent. In fact, road noise in most sites is pretty effectively muffled by the melodious churning of the Klamath. Of the two neighboring loops, the left-hand one contains five walk-in sites, with the oak-shaded number 3 the most spacious. Oak, pines, and horsetail grass also thrive in the second circuit, where peculiar mounds of river stones near the entrance are relics from the Gold Rush era, circa 1850, when extensive mining of the river occurred. Sites 6 and 7, with paved back-in parking, are tailor-made for RVs. The most private spot is 9, hidden behind an overgrown thicket of vines and weeds; it also has a water view. This is a splendid property, 40 miles east of Happy Camp, albeit somewhat neglected and overgrown.

Elk Creek is a privately operated campground with a rocky creek running through it, offering good fishing and swimming opportunities within easy walking distance of sites. The rustic feeling of the locale stems in part from its being thinly forested with maple, oak, madrone, and several types of pine, but also from its chaotic criss-crossing layout of lanes. Sites are level and surfaced either with grass, gravel, or dirt; the ones just above the creek are the roomiest and most secluded. While the setting is generally quite attractive, the appeal of Elk Creek was diminished at the time of our visit by the presence of several unsightly long-term trailers, some of which sport license tags that haven't been renewed in years. A change in management, though, bodes well; the genial new owners are determined to turn this place around. Miniature show horses are bred on the premises.

Hume Lake lies just below this good-looking woodland campground. Fishing and boating are popular pastimes here, so much so that you'll need reservations on summer weekends. It is well situated as a base camp for exploring the newly minted Giant Sequoia National Monument, of which it is a part, and launching into the neighboring Kings Canyon National Park. Manzanita, Jeffrey and ponderosa pines, oak, and cedar thrive across this hilly domain, where dirt- and pine needle-surfaced sites are spread decently apart over a convoluted series of six loops. That's the good news. The bad news is that few spots are blessed with lake vistas, and those that are, such as 63 and 64, are not specifically reservable. The concession that manages Hume Lake for the national forest service restricts reservations to "type," not site number. Thus, car campers with a tent might reserve a "type one" spot, while a motor home would require a "type two" or "type three," at a higher fee. Unfortunately, many in the first category have parking slips that are so tight you may wish you rolled in on two wheels instead of four. Gasoline and a general store are available at the Christian camp in Hume, two miles south.

Located just down the road from Hume Lake (and 15 miles from Grant Grove Village in Kings Canyon National Park), this thickly forested campground is a worthy alternative to that oftoverrun facility. It's small, and picks up traffic noise from the forest road, but the setting reflects an authentic Sierra Nevada flavor, with granite boulders highlighting the rolling turf, and several meandering streams trickling through. Sizable sites of dirt and grass are positioned well apart along the curvilinear camp lane, with abundant shade provided by incense cedars and Jeffrey pines-but no sequoias. Late spring, when neon-red snow plants push up through the ground, is a good time to visit, but at an altitude of 5,800 feet, evenings then can be downright chilly. Formerly, Landslide was a no-fee national forest camp, but now that it is part of the newly minted Giant Sequoia National Monument, the concession that operates it has imposed a \$12 fee. Hwy. 1 is a sleepy, sparsely traveled stretch of pavement in this part of the state, which is a good thing as it cuts directly through Salt Point State Park. The campground's two loops lie on either side of the road and that quirk of geography could not result in more contrasting realms. The westfacing Gerstle Cove consists of 30 roomy sites spaced well apart around a small grassy meadow. Most of the pines at the perimeter died years ago, victims of a forest fire. As a result, their skeletal limbs have an eerie appearance, especially when veiled in the fog that frequently cloaks this section of the park. When the air is clear, the camp commands a great view of the sandy cove below, one of a series of small bays and inlets in the vicinity. Inland is Woodside, where the dense concentration of mixed conifers, madrones, and ferns emerged unscathed from the fire. Sites here are no less roomy than across the road, but the forest environment contributes to better screening and thus superior privacy. Amateur mycologists will be delighted to find that king boletes and chanterelles thrive in these woods. Divers will want to explore the protected underwater reserve just off shore.

Paso Picacho is normally open year-round, but the severe cedar fires of 2003 have closed the entire state park until further notice. When it re-opens, and if you come in the winter, plan to dress warmly and don't be surprised if there is snow on the ground. That's because at an elevation of nearly 5,000 feet this is one of the higher camps in southern California, and thus one of the more pleasant—and hugely popular—in summer. Of course its rough-hewn mountainous setting has something to do with that appeal, with roomy sites shaded by oak, manzanita, and pines, and dispersed through a series of loops that snake across the hilly contours of the park. As with many

mountain camps, finding a level site can be a challenge: Best in that department (as well as for privacy and space) are numbers 3–12. Rangers report that area mountain lions have become bold, with a number of sightings, two attacks, and one fatality over the last 14 years.

This agreeable campground mixes grassy meadows with a forest environment and comes up with a series of loops laid out in a terracing of such shade trees as live oaks, Coulter pines, and incense cedars. The largely comparable sites have coarse sand and dirt for tent pads, with 73 and 84 giving tenters the most space and 36 optimum for RVers. You're likely to hear acorn woodpeckers clowning around up in the leafy canopy, and last time we camped here a number of wild turkeys gobbled through our site. There are seven miles of hiking trails in the park, with the scenic overlook on Desert View Trail especially rewarding. Looking for more? How about heated rest rooms, a nicely civilized touch of comfort. The park is just six miles from the scenic mountain town of Julian,

making it a great base when the latter holds its Apple Days festival throughout October.

June Lake is a lovely body of water, encircled by wavy, golden grasslands, with the choppy, rocky eastern Sierra range looming above. Pine Cliff Resort capitalizes on this rugged setting by positioning many of its sandy, mostly level sites among large gray boulders, while others rub up against high desert chaparral. Jeffrey pines thrive throughout the tilting, mountainous domain, providing shade and highlighting its natural beauty. Despite the trees, there is little screening here, and sites, which are on the small side, are too often crowded together. For the most privacy, try to reserve such perimeter slots as 133, 135, and 136; or any of 66-72, for their dramatic location amid a rift of Sierra uplift. Management deserves credit for the competitive pricing of its fuel and basic supplies, though for "people skills," campers give it mixed reviews. Pine Cliff Resort lies at 7,600 feet altitude, less than 15 miles south of Lee

Vining. The sandy access road to the beach and boat ramp is very bumpy.

The turbulent Kern River is a rafter's delight, and Fairview puts campers where the action is, right alongside that purling cascade of water. The sawtoothed Sierra range circles this rocky, mountainous setting, which is at an altitude of 3,500 feet. Very small, level sites, with equally tight parking slips, are crowded together over rocky, sandy ground. The host's spot has the best shade; elsewhere over the three loops it is sparsely provided by a few pines and cottonwoods, with Mormon tea and other chaparral making up the ground cover. Spring, when snow melt adds to the Kern's power, is the best time to visit, but bear in mind that the concession operating this national forest property charges the same fee whether you picnic, day-use, or camp. There are many maverick camps along the Kern that budget-minded campers may want to investigate. Many are sizable enough to handle small RVs and if they don't have facilities, at least they offer more seclusion and fairer river access than this and the many other developed camps in the area.

One of the more appealing aspects of this campground is its central location, within easy walking distance of the General Grant Grove of massive redwood trees and the Grant Grove Visitor Center. The first thing you may notice, though, on driving in is that many sites are considerably less than mediocre—tiny, unshaded, and exposed, as if carved out of the pine needle–packed ground as an afterthought. Indeed, for a rugged, hilly setting that is rich in redwoods, cedar, manzanita, madrone, and various pines, the overall absence of privacy throughout the many loops is hugely dis-

appointing. Still, spacing between sites is not that bad, and if you persevere you'll notice a few that take advantage of protruding boulders for a little extra cover, with 89 and 113 in this better category. There are also several tent-only spots, though many are grouped closely together. If you have the time, be sure to drive the awe-inspiring Kings Canyon Scenic Byway (closed in winter). Sentinel, near the road's end, is a beautiful, wooded campground laid out around a small meadow.

In an area where summers are long and hot, Don Pedro Lake, 35 miles east of Modesto, is a marvelous sight. The rolling hills around its multipronged arms are speckled green with oaks and awash in golden grass. The reservoir features 160 miles of shoreline, endowing Fleming Meadows campground with no end of water vistas. There is a trade-off for those splendid views; many of the dirt-surfaced sites lack privacy and space. Of the four loops, sites in the A group are better shaded and seem a little more spacious. The optimum are

A 24 and 25, which overlook the lake and are framed by a large oak; A 34, a comfortable unit with pull-through parking; and A 58, 59, 61, 62, and 64. Boaters may also indulge in primitive camping along the opposite shoreline. Not that a boat is necessary to enjoy this huge recreation area. Facilities include a sandy swimming lagoon that is six feet deep and two acres across, a softball field, horseshoe pits, volleyball, and no end of fishing opportunities. Boat service, fuel, a snack bar, and store are available at the marina.

Some may feel that is small reward for the clutch-grinding, white-knuckle drive from one hairpin curve to another. But on finally arriving at the park you may have the entire camp-

ground to yourself, especially if visiting midweek or out of season. The two small loops are deftly arranged across a hilly canyon to maximize the usable space. That is a good thing, as aside from the fallen giants that border some of the fern-dappled sites, screening is minimal. Still, this is a handsomely forested camp, with ancient moss-covered sentinels surrounded by their smaller, second-growth descendants, as well as oaks and azaleas. Site 28 overlooks a creek and is, with neighboring 29, among the better ones for privacy. Numbers 37 and 39 are attractive, too, though on the small side. Pull-through sites are available but drivers of long rigs should think twice about trying to navigate the goat-path of a road up to Portola. Also remember to fill up your gas tank before entering the mountains.

Clear Lake is one of the largest freshwater lakes in California. The angling in its shimmering bluegreen waters is so good, particularly for bass, bluegill, and catfish, that you just might forget for a moment the other liquids for which this wineproducing region is renowned. There is an appealingly wild, untamed air to the forested hills around the lake, and the park takes full advantage of that by dispersing its campground into four zones ranging from lake and creekside on up into the higher woodland. The prime water sites are 58–60 in the Kelsey Creek loop, where plant life is highlighted by manzanita, willow, cottonwood, and black walnut. The opposite side of that loop overlooks a creek (very buggy in spring) and numbers 29, 31, 32, 38, 39, 41, 42, 44, and 45 are gratifyingly spacious and private. Pines, oak, and sycamore are the dominant tree species at the two Bayview circuits up the road, with 110–112, shady and overlooking the lake, ideal for small RVs. Cole Creek, close and parallel to the access road near the park entrance, is the least attractive of the camping areas.

There is an enchanting quality to the raw, mountainous beauty of Aspen Grove, particularly in spring, just after its many aspens have leafed out into a fluttering luminescence. Jeffrey pines, sage, and other high desert scrub compose the complement of vegetation at this creekside, countyoperated camp, which is just five miles west of Lee Vining along the Tioga Rd. At 7,500 feet elevation, you'll find breathtaking views of the snow-laced Sierra Nevada peaks all around, with Mono Dome, at 10,622 feet, dominating the scene. Some of the dirt-packed, somewhat rocky sites are on uneven ground, others (most notably, those by the creek) are squeezed for space. The lion's share, though, are delightfully large and very recessed. Among the better choices for RVs are 22, 23, and 25, facing the creek. Great tenting spots include 54, also by the creek; 18, hidden among pines and horsetail grass; and, away from the water, 37 and 39, both being very private. Similarly rustic sites are available at Big Bend campground, half a mile east.

There is only one site here with a view of the camp's namesake Ellery Lake, lucky 13, a walk-in. Don't let that, or the overall lack of privacy and elbowroom, nettle you, though. This is an exquisite environment, surrounded by the jagged, snow-iced mountain peaks of Lee Vining Canyon, with a small creek gurgling by. The ground is level, parking slips paved, and a smattering of lodgepole pines and low-lying willows vie with boulders and campers for ground space. You can fish for trout in the creek or, better still, the nearby lake. The campground, which is at an altitude of 9,500 feet, is also a fine base for day trips into Yosemite National Park's high country, its east entrance being a scant three miles away. Nearly half the sites are walk-ins for tenters, with access to them cutting directly through other sites, an unfortunate sacrifice in privacy. The better spots are 9–14, shielded from Hwy. 120 in a nook behind talus rock.

The first thing you may notice about Cooper Gulch is the high tension wires that run directly over the campground. That impression won't linger. Not when you see how close the five level sites are to the edge of Lewiston Lake. That they are also close to each other and lack privacy is not really a problem, either, since almost everybody devotes their attention to the rippling water just a few steps away. Bring your hammock and anchor it to a couple of the pines and incense cedars that shade this charming spot. And don't forget your canoe or kayak, which can be launched from the small dirt ramp right in camp. It is hard to go wrong with any of these medium-small, pine needle–carpeted sites, but 4 is closest to the lake and 5, sheltered by oaks, is the most private. Amazingly, a host occupies one of the five coveted slots in summer.

Del Valle Regional Park is a quiet, unassuming place that just happens to be one of the more beautiful of the many parklands in the immediate Bay Area. A part of the Diablo Range, this rugged canyon setting consists of grassy hills, meadows punctuated by thick concentrations of oak, eucalyptus, knob cone pine, and sycamore, and at its heart a narrow reservoir lake that stretches five miles from end to end. Windsurfers and sailing enthusiasts take to the water like a child to chocolate, with motorboats restricted to a maximum speed of ten miles per hour. Fishing conditions are only average, despite regular plantings of rainbow trout. There are no views of the lake from the campground, but roomy, grass-covered sites are spaced well apart over a double loop, helping to

compensate for that handicap. Birders will find pleasure in the many species that make this territory their home, including several wild turkeys and a pair of peacocks. The park loses points, though, for haphazard maintenance: during a recent tour we found sites littered with above average amounts of plastic, paper, bottle caps, and cigarette butts. The open-air rest rooms were also in urgent need of an overhaul.

Even if you don't plan to hike Mt. Whitney, which, at 14,495 feet, is the highest peak in the Lower 48 states, this campground is a worthwhile, breathtaking retreat. From its rocky, pine-shrouded sites, up to the aspen-fringed trailhead, from the many streams noisily cascading down the mountain to the saw-toothed, jaw-like peaks that hover menacingly above, this is one spectacular, picture-perfect scene. As you lounge by your tent at 8,000 feet

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elevation, low-floating clouds seem close enough to reach out and grab. Boulders provide respectable privacy between closely grouped sites, and shade is derived from Jeffrey and ponderosa pines, as well as mountain mahogany. The most secluded sites are 8 and 9, flanked by large slabs of granite. Avoid the spots just below Whitney Portal Rd., which pick up more traffic noise than the others, and try to visit on a weekday, when there are fewer mountain climbers in camp. The trailhead picnic area is an Arcadian delight.

San Luis Reservoir lies in the heart of California's valley region, just off of I-5, about 40 miles south of Modesto. Summer starts early in these parts, with the sun scorching the neighboring hills brown by April. Water sports are therefore the logical activity of choice and fortunately there is usually enough H²O in the reservoir to satisfy boaters and swimmers throughout the hot season. Of the three campgrounds in the park, only San Luis Creek on

the O'Neill Forebay has hookups. It is a grassy, peaceful camp with many of its fairly exposed, roomy sites set close to the shore. Adding a splash of color to the setting are eucalyptus trees, pines, and sycamores. The latter are still too small to cast much shade but they are just large enough to attract larks and other songbirds. The only off-key note is the presence of power lines looming above a few of the sites. Showers are available across the street at Basalt Campground.

This is a rough-cut, wild-looking campground with a grassy, unmanicured feel to its sites. One might even say bucolic, a quality that is entirely appropriate given its location, just off Hwy. 1 along the unspoiled Big Sur coast. Coastal chaparral and shrubs provide excellent screening for sites that are mostly small, unshaded and tend to tilt toward the ocean. The handsome national forest land slopes steeply to the water and has the auditorium effect of projecting the roar of the surf into camp-thus drowning out the din of passing traffic-and endowing most slots with commanding views of

the Pacific. Best for privacy along the figure-8 loop are 8, 9, 21, 22, and 11, with the latter located next to the beach. Be sure to avoid tiny number 1, which picks up too much road noise. The only abrasive chord is struck by the nightly fee of \$16, a hefty sum given the Spartan facilities. Golden poppies color the hillside in spring.

This isolated camp is located within the treechoked Los Padres National Forest, 15 miles and an hour's drive from the coast along the windy, occasionally broken up, mountainous Nacimiento Rd. On pulling into Ponderosa, don't expect that Hoss and Little Joe will be there to greet you. In fact, there may not be anyone present at all, which is one of the virtues of this pretty property, in contrast to its overflowing counterparts along the Big Sur coast. Roomy sites of dirt and grass are well separated along the serpentine loop, with a babbling creek running by several and a handful of walk-ins especially secluded. This hilly campground lies at 1,650 feet of elevation near the crest of the Santa Lucia Mountain range and is shaded more by live oaks, oddly, than its namesake pines. We prefer this facility to Nacimiento, two miles to the west, the latter featuring exposed, shallow sites that are very close to the road.

State officials estimate that on holiday weekends as many as 25,000 people descend on Millerton Lake, an indication of its popularity, as well as when to avoid visiting. Beyond the charming setting, amid a series of wrinkly, dimpled hills, with long, golden grass and monzo-granite gleaming in the sun, the attraction is obvious, given the scorching temperatures here during summer months. But while the lake is the main show, the campground is no ugly stepchild. Its level sites of grass and dirt are very well scattered over an extended series of loops, endowing many with privacy and prime vantages of the water. Several kinds of oak grace the domain, as well as sycamores, willow, eucalyptus, and various conifers, providing a balance of shade and filtered sun. The best of many fine sites is 59, on a point of land jutting out into the lake; 6–8 are on the small side but secluded. There are also 25 boat-in spots, and a marina with a snackbar and

vending machines. Be sure to visit the Millerton Courthouse, circa 1867, preserved within the park.

The campground at Leo Carillo State Park is located directly across the Pacific Coast Hwy. from a wide sandy beach. While this detached position may at first appear to be a drawback, it is in fact the best of two worlds, with easy access to the ocean via a walkway under the road and a campground free of coastal winds due to its dramatic nest by the base of the steep Santa Monica Mountains. Gnarly sycamore trees overhang grassy sites along a double loop, with most being fairly spacious and decently screened by such riparian chaparral as bay willow, buckwheat, coastal sage, and black walnut. The largest and most private sites, 54, 57, 59, 61, 63,

and 66, are on the west side of camp along the creek. On weekends, rest rooms can be in an atrocious state, but overall the campground is surprisingly clean, given the high traffic it receives from large family groups. On the surface Malibu Beach looks like just another run-of-the-mill RV facility. Caravans are wedged one next to another, with a tenting area attached to the end of the serpentine camp lane seemingly as an afterthought. Probe a bit, though, and you will find this a superior property, just six miles west of Malibu on the Pacific Coast Hwy. on the inland side of the road. Shrewd terracing stretches sites up a bluff, thus maximizing vistas of the ocean. Yes, site privacy is nearly nil, but with that ocean panorama and the beautiful sunsets, who cares! Eucalyptus, palms, pines, and sycamores decorate the landscape and while they do little to

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provide shade, at least they don't obstruct the view. Though they will probably be taken already, try to get any of numbers 6-33 or V1–V13. Even the dirt walk-in tenting area atop the bluff is attractive, with small sycamores providing shade. Double-wide sites and pull-throughs are available, as well as a hot tub, game room, and Internet connection.

If you managed to get a site here without a reservation it may be time to buy a lottery ticket, that's how good your luck is. "Popular" doesn't begin to describe this park, which lies just six miles north of Malibu, on the sloping side of a grassy hill in the shadow of the Santa Monica Mountains. Though a forest of live oak borders the camp, there is scant shade to be found within its single loop. A recent round of plantings holds the promise of many shade trees to come, albeit years from now. And while the tilt of the terrain and small parking slips make RV camping a challenge, most sites are large enough for tenters to scratch out a satisfactory patch of turf. Heavy visitation means that rest rooms tend to be messy, especially on weekends. Overall, though, this is a remarkably well-maintained place. There are some Hollywood sets in the park, left over from when it was owned by Universal Studios, but most people come for the great hiking, mountain biking, and horseback riding. Try to get here in spring, while the long flowing grass is still green and wildflowers are in bloom.

It may be true that there is no such thing as a free lunch, but fortunately for budget-minded campers there are still a few no-fee campgrounds left. Glass Creek is one of those, a primitive national forest camp with no potable water, no trash pick-up, and rickety-looking vaulted toilets. It is also a quietly attractive piece of land that straddles its namesake creek (where the fishing for trout is pretty good), with generously large, dispersed sites on either side of the smooth, dirt access road. The slightly rolling terrain is partly shaded by very mature Jeffrey and ponderosa pines, and aspens that grow alongside the creek. Its great location, just 12 miles north of Mammoth Lakes, makes Glass Creek a popular base camp for the RV set. While ranger patrols are few and far between, the presence of vacation homes at the perimeter of the property is a reassuring sign of civilization. The nearest pay phone is at the intersection with US 395, directly across the road.

To describe this camp as dramatic and pretty, peaceful and exhilarating, is to fall frustratingly short of its true splendor. The pair of lakes that inspired its name rest smack in the middle of a high Sierra canyon. Jagged granite spires soar well above the tops of the highest lodgepole pines. In spring, snow melt courses into Twin Falls, making for a spectacular cascade, visible from the campground. The very best site, with a prime panorama

of the lakes, has been taken by the host. But there are many other agreeable options among the three zones that make up this park-like setting. Forget about the area by the entrance; those sites are too exposed to passing traffic. Better by far are the spots just across the bridge that divides the two lakes: 23, 25, 26, and 28 are small but enjoy their own private lakefront; 31, 33, 36, and 39, at the base of a steep hill, are fairly roomy, and detached from their neighbors; 62 and 70 are tucked into a thicket and blessed with a stunning view of the craggy canyon. The upper loop, in a more mountainous setting away from the lakes, is the roomiest; even the interior sites seem well separated. Given the elevation of 8,600 feet, you'll want to pack, along with a fishing rod, some heavy-weight fleece as a precaution against windy evenings.

The mineral springs of Grover Hot Springs remain a constant 102° year-round, making its hot and cool pools a major therapeutic attraction. There is more to this state park, though, than the chance to bathe oneself in simmering water. Like miles of hiking and riding trails, as well as cross-country skiing in winter. First and foremost, is its strikingly beautiful campground, set at 5,900 feet, with a series of corrugated Sierra peaks contributing an Arcadian quality to its forested, creekside location. The undefiled, natural look of this gorgeous preserve is furthered by its undulating terrain, which is well-salted with granite boulders, juniper, incense cedar, and leffrey and lodgepole pines. Sites covered with grass and pine needles are generally shady, generously large, and fairly well separated, though several lie on uneven turf. The most private are 11, tucked behind boulders, and 22, by a row of Jeffrey pines and a grassy meadow; 58, 66–68, and 73–75 are also worth shooting for. The pools close for maintenance the last two weeks of September, and shut down during thunderstorms, which occur regularly throughout July and August.

Indian Creek is easily reached along a well-signed, smoothly paved roadway, a rare double-treat for a Bureau of Land Management property. Then, when you pull into camp-the trifecta!-as this is as sweet as it gets for BLM land. It's a beautiful lakeside campground, backed up against the Sierra range, with its two loops enhanced by mature stands of piñon, ponderosa, and Jeffrey pines, as well as a few boulders and such high desert shrubs as salt bush and brittle bush. The first loop, which features walk-in sites for tents, offers the better vantage over Indian Creek Reservoir, where white pelicans were noisily cavorting our last time through. Bird-watching is no less rewarding at the second circuit, which faces the lake on one side and a grassy marsh on another. The optimum sites there are 44, 48, and 49. The ground slopes gently toward the water, but most units are level, distributed well apart and surprisingly clean; even the sandy tent pads are raked by a conscientious host. Situated on the west side of the reservoir, Indian Creek is almost too pretty for words when it is pleasantly illuminated by morning light.

You are barreling along on Hwy. 89 bound toward McCloud, with a fishing rod in the back of your vehicle and a kayak strapped to the roof. Where do you pull over for some R&R? Fowlers Campground is one of the better options in the area. The McCloud River flows right behind this clean, wellmaintained national forest-operated property. Brown trout inhabit the river and rainbow trout are regularly stocked from this point clear down to Lake McCloud. A small put-in for kayaks and canoes is just past the photogenic series of cascades by the day-use picnic area, 0.5 mile beyond camp along the dirt road. The campground's double loop threads by level sites that are situated reasonably well apart and decently shielded by a densely forested mix of incense cedar, manzanita, and various conifers. The tree-to-tree carpet of pine needles is speckled with pumice rocks, which enhances the natural beauty of this wheelchair-accessible camp.

The attraction here is the Salton Sea, a vast lake that lies 227 feet below sea level and is 25 percent saltier than the Pacific Ocean. The palm-fringed body of water is a Mecca of sorts to boaters and anglers, as well as birders drawn by hopes of sighting some of the great range of migratory fowl that wing through between late fall and early spring. The mildest weather is from January through March, a time that coincides with free ranger-led kayak tours of the lake (call ahead to make reservations). Of the state-run campgrounds in the area, Mecca Beach gives tenters the best beach access, but only has six spots with hookups. Headquarters, on the other hand, has the better fishing. It consists of two loops; one with 15 full-hookup sites facing the water across a paved, level parking area, the other with more space and privacy among desert ironwood trees, brittle bush, and desert scrub. A visitor center, located between the loops, has a short filmstrip on the lake and some interesting exhibits. This would be a delightfully peaceful bivouac if not for the occasional rattling of trains along the tracks by the park road. When the winds blow from the west side of the lake, that sweet briny air that is so reminiscent of the seaside can change in the twitch of a nose to such a strong stench of sulphur you may think you're camping next to a match factory.

This is not a campground where you are likely to feel comfortable sitting in an easy chair watching the clouds drift by. Not in the summer, anyway, when a smorgasbord of activities and distractions keeps the place humming. The family-oriented entertainment ranges from such stalwarts as fishing, kayaking, softball, and basketball, to crafts and games, campfire programs, karaoke, and bingo. Bring the "bug juice" and you will have the complete summer camp experience. The flat grassy camping meadow, tucked below an attractive array of hills, is open, rather crowded, and lacking in shade. The most desirable site is 11, set back under a large oak and pine, right by the creek. There are also clean cabins for rent by the small boat pond. In spite of its name, this camp is far more than just a "hole-in-the-ground." In fact, the contrast to Elam, a few miles to the southeast, couldn't be more striking. While both consist of sites sprinkled along short camp lanes that are flanked by gurgling streams, the ones here are roomy, well separated, and thickly populated with ponderosa pines and Douglas firs. Privacy is further enhanced by the remoteness of the setting, some three miles down a gravel washboard off of Hwy. 172, about 14 miles from the south entrance to Lassen Volcanic National Park. Amazingly, while Elam is often packed to the gills with rod-slinging campers, you may find Hole-in-the-Ground occupied by only a handful of visitors, if at all. The reason for that is fishing here in Mill Creek is limited to catch-andrelease, with barbless hooks. With an elevation of 4,300 feet, snowfall can block access to this parklike campground from mid-October through May. The rusty, old-fashioned water pump is a good incentive to bring plenty of drinking water.

The remote location of Butte Lake campground provides a tranquil respite from the crowds of sightseers thronging to Manzanita Lake, Summit Lakes, and such main attractions of Lassen Volcanic National Park as Bumpass Hell and the Sulfur Works. While only one site, B-1, actually enjoys a view of the stunning Butte Lake, the campground's proximity to the water, to a cinder peak, and to several fine hikes, makes it a winner. Roomy sites, evenly positioned across a slightly undulating hillside, are partially shaded by lodgepole pines and a smattering of ponderosas. As is typical in national park venues, few of them offer much privacy. Of the A and B circuits, the second area has the larger sites and more pull-through parking: best bets, in addition to B-1, are B-3, which overlooks the lava flow field, and the partly screened B-55. Butte Creek, a national forest camp on the dirt and gravel access road to Butte Lake, is a passable alternative when the latter is full or closed.

Lassen Volcanic National Park was established as a monument in 1907, and upgraded to national park status nine years later. An astoundingly beautiful chunk of the Cascade Mountain range, the park has hundreds of miles of hiking trails, several geothermal attractions, an abundance of wildlife, and a handful of excellent campgrounds. Of those, Manzanita Lake is one of the best, with its namesake body of glimmering water abutting it and snowcapped Mt. Lassen hovering above. Just five miles from Lassen's north entrance, the camp enjoys an illusion of privacy that stems in part from its thick concentration of various conifers, as well as from the pull-through and back-in sites being well-dispersed through a series of many loops. The shade provided by those evergreens keeps things cool and on the dark side, but tenters will find comfort in the spongy layer of pine needles that has accumulated on the forest floor. Best time to visit is September to mid-October, when the park sees fewer visitors. Just remember, at an altitude of 5,890 feet, Manzanita Lake can be chilly most anytime of year: Extra layers of clothing and rain gear are advised. And use the bearproof boxes to protect your vehicle from a furry intruder. Many sites are wheelchair accessible.

Summer seems to last for six or seven months in this steamy stretch of California's Central Valley. That's a major reason why Modesto Reservoir is so popular for much of the year; its cool, shimmering water brings relief from temperatures that frequently top 100°. Even on busy weekends, you are apt to find spots available in the sparsely shaded, full-hookup parking meadow. Far better are the smaller slots that are lined up one against another following the amoeba-like contours of the reservoir's wandering shoreline. What those lack in privacy they more than gain in shade from eucalyptus, plane trees, pines, and juniper. Their tent-side access to the lake is an added bonus. The many small islands that dot the surface of the water not only bless it with pleasing aesthetics, but also serve as safe havens for a variety of bird life, including pelicans, Canada geese, blue herons, bald eagles, red tail hawks, pheasants, and burrowing owls. An undeveloped section on the opposite side of the lake allows for more privacy, but lacks tables, fire rings, and potable water.

White House Cliffs is a fabulous fairyland canyon of melting sandstone and fluted folds, where cliff swallows nest and great horned owls occasionally perch during their nocturnal vigils. This feast for the eyes, a part of the El Paso Mountain range, serves as host to Ricardo Campground, right at its base, and has been a featured backdrop in more than 130 movies. Coarse sand-surfaced sites are backed up against the eroded nooks and alcoves of the canyon, gaining, in addition to a touch of privacy from their neighbors, a solid shield from the afternoon sun. From this primitive setting one can look across the valley floor, an arid landscape that is enlivened by creosote bushes, Joshua trees, and rabbit brush, to the headlights of distant autos humming along on Hwy. 14, while still enjoying a brilliantly starry sky. Indeed, the stargazing here is so exceptional that star charts have been posted by the latrines and kiosk. A visitor center and the remains of an 1890s mining operation are in the vicinity.

Lundy Canyon, a county park, is one of the better bargains around, especially with the explosion of price hikes at the concession-run national forest options. There is a subtle, understated beauty to this scruffy glen, where Lundy Creek discreetly trickles through and the Sierras tower above. Level, largely grassy sites, which range in size from shoeboxes to palatial, are spread out over several access points along Lundy Lake Rd. Skip the first 15 or so, as many later choices are endowed with superior privacy and a more generous amount of space. Excellent screening between spots is derived from thickets of aspen, as well as juniper and high desert chaparral. This diamond-in-the-rough, at 7,800feet elevation, lacks potable water, but the county has recently installed new tables and fire grates in several sites; new vaulted toilets are reportedly on the way. A boat ramp, boat rentals, and groceries are available at Lundy Lake Resort, just up the road.

Much of the 135 square miles that compose Henry Coe State Park are devoted to hiking trails, making the largest state park in northern California one of the better places for backpacking. You won't need to strap a 50-pound sack to your back to appreciate the beauty of this area, though, an RV or a tent will do nicely, too. Headquarters Campground, at 2,600 feet elevation, is located on the edge of a steep hillside, a few dozen yards from the wellmaintained ranch buildings that date from when the Coe family resided here half a century ago (one of those structures now houses a visitor center). This sloping terrain limits both sites (several of which are on unlevel turf) and parking slips to very confined space. Even the old-style outhouseswhich look as if they, too, date from the Coe era seem smaller than a telephone booth. Happily, the extraordinary views across the hills toward distant mountains are more than expansive enough to compensate. In springtime the hilltop meadows erupt in an array of wildflowers.

In many respects this is a very ordinary campground, with adequate elbowroom in the grass and dirt sites but little privacy. Facilities are minimal, and even the camp's immediate setting, with a few Bishop pines punctuating the green confines of the narrow canyon, is just a notch or two above average in pulchritude. Give the park a chance, though—all 8,000 acres of it—and what you will find is a spectacular coastal wilderness that rivals the Big Sur area in its unspoiled beauty. The drive into Montaña de Oro threads past dense groves of aromatic eucalyptus, with eye-popping views of the dune-draped shore and Morro Rock out in the

bay. Tall stands of cottonwood, oak, maple, willow, and box elder thrive elsewhere. Add to that miles of pristine beaches, highland bluffs and miscellaneous meadows, and you have a nature-lover's nirvana. For sunbathers there is Spooner's Cove, a romantic patch of sand and tide pools, just below the campground off the road. The vast array of wildflowers scattered over the hills in late spring is a heaven-scent sight.

The meadow, on the other hand, while exposed to both sun and neighbors, has the virtue of pull-through parking.

Like every story, there are two sides to Putah Creek Resort. As in lakeside and creekside. The main

compound overlooks lovely Lake Berryessa, a glimmering body of water that was created by the Bureau of Land Reclamation back in the 1950s. Yuccas and palms, knob cone pines and oaks, oleanders and pollarded hibiscus lend an appealing dash of beauty to a camp so developed it even has motel rooms and a restaurant-bar. Partial hookups are available near the boat launch, painfully close to the bar's open-air patio and within easy earshot of the motorboats and jet skis that often zip by. Across the road is the creek camp, in a greener, more serene setting. It is also endowed with a boat launch, and though many sites are too close to each other for camping comfort, a healthy majority overlook the water. Of the latter, 21-28 offer RVers a fine lateral view of the creek, while 3–8 put tent campers at the shore's edge. One negative to the creek area is that upkeep of rest rooms is sometimes neglected. Both zones are fenced and protected by gate house entrance booths.

Of the many campgrounds located along the Colorado River, few are quite as visually appealing as Needles Marina Park, where palm trees blend seamlessly with eucalyptus, mulberry with mesquite, and flowering oleanders lend a splash of color to the desert scene. Add to that a swimming pool and lagoon, a small sandy beach by the river, a boat ramp and marina, a hot tub, cabin rentals and you've got the recipe for one fine vacation spot. Holiday Harbor is at the northern end of Clear Lake, California's second largest freshwater lake and one of the top places for bass fishing in the entire country, according to reputable angling organizations. This is more of a marina than a campground, with comparable gravel-surfaced sites encircling the boat slips at the center of the property. There are a few sycamores and junipers on the lot, and though situated in a residential neighborhood, within easy walking distance of the commercial district of Nice. This wooded, pastoral setting is an oasis of calm and beauty only a few minutes drive from the urban bustle of Oakland and Berkeley. Five small loops are spread over a hilltop that is abundantly populated with fragrant eucalyptus trees-though contrary to what may be implied by the name of the access lane, Redwood Rd.-and a few sycamores. Some of the slim, exposed sites enjoy vistas of Lake Chabot, while others overlook a fertile pasture where goats often graze. Best of the latter are 10–12 in the hookup area. The most private of the drive-to sites is number 69 but ardent tenters should consider the even more secluded walkins in the direction of the water. In addition to several hiking trails there is a 12-mile bicycling path that is very popular with the thin tire set. The lake, which covers 315 acres, is stocked with fish on a regular basis. Nelson Point is a cozy property that rests on a grassy hill just above one rippling arm of Shasta Lake, a little more than 20 miles north of Redding. It is a convenient hop just off I-5, and that is also its major drawback: you may wake up in the middle of the night to the sound of traffic and think for a moment you're in a highway rest area. Oaks and pines hover over the dirt-surfaced sites, which are also spaced well apart along the meandering camp lane. While most spots enjoy water views, number 5, a walk-in of some 20 steps, is tops in spaciousness and occupies a small promontory that is blessed with a 180° panorama of the lake. More private is 7, though it lies close to the road, and 6, too, is tucked away from its neighbors. The appalling amount of broken glass, food debris, bottle caps, and even bullet shells littering the ground indicates this forest service diamond-in-the-rough could use some maintenance. An elevation of just 1,000 feet makes for very comfortable evenings early and late in the year.

Tall as they are, it is easy to overlook the redwood trees when you visit this delightful park. That is largely due to the presence of a good-sized herd of photogenic Roosevelt elk, which can usually be observed grazing in the open grassland near the park's entrance along US 101, as well as down by the shore close to the primitive Gold Bluff Beach campground. The latter is in a beautiful location, between the ocean and 100-foot-high bluffs, but to reach it you will have to navigate six miles along a dirt minefield of potholes, a stress test for your nerves as well as your vehicle's axles. Prairie Creek's other campground, Elk Prairie, is inland from the bluffs and far easier to reach. Its single meadow loop-favored by RVs-is prime elk-viewing territory, and its wooded double loop allows for shade, space, and privacy. Curiously, there are few redwoods present, but an abundance of other conifers as well as maples and moss-encrusted alders contribute to a lush, rain forest atmosphere. The largest, most private sites are those nearest to the creek, where the gently gurgling water will serenade you to sleep at night.

Black Butte Lake may seem like a mirage at first glance, its blue-green surface shimmering in the middle of sun-baked brown hills, with blackmauve volcanic rocks crowning the scene. Go ahead and pinch yourself, it's really there. It is also, as one of the largest lakes in the region, a hugely popular summertime recreation area that attracts anyone with a boat for miles around. Buckhorn is one of two campgrounds on this U.S. Army Corps of Engineers domain, 12 miles west of Orland and I-5. Several loops cling to the undulating contours of the hillside abutting the lake, which results in a high percentage of lake-view sites. A sprinkling of oaks shed adequate shade, and screening and space are average. While all types of watercrafts are permitted, the stiff breezes that often sweep across the lake make sailing especially rewarding. Black Butte Lake is one of the better locations for crappie fishing in northern California.

When Lake Oroville is full it is a beautiful sight. Unfortunately, its level depends both on winter snow melt and how much it has been drawn down during the summer. Management tries to keep the water near capacity at least through the 4th of July holiday, when the recreation area overflows with campers, but Mother Nature does not always cooperate. Not that campsites are affected either way, since few are endowed with water views. Of the two double circuits, Loop I (numbers 1-39) is the grassier, with limited space between pine- and live oak-shaded sites. The crowding is no better in Loop II (40-75), where the live oaks are complemented by madrone and manzanita. Two of the better sites for privacy are 31 and 44, but overall the constricted layout of this facility makes it more suitable for RV campers than tenters. The exceptions are the remote boat-in sites, assuming there is water available to provide access.

You've heard the expression "good things come in small packages"? That is certainly true of this beautiful park, another in the fine constellation of coastal redwood preserves that are located above Santa Cruz and to the east of San Jose. The drive to Butano is easier than the others, along a marginally wider road without quite as many mountainous turns. Sites, too, are roomier and scattered farther apart than those at Portola Redwoods State Park a few miles away. Direct sunlight onto the double loop is largely blocked by the magnificent stands of Sequoia sempervirens, which are so dominant that only a few tan oaks have been able to lay down roots. Tenters will enjoy the privacy of the many recessed walk-in sites, and of the drive-to options, 6 is level and very roomy, and 9, tucked behind a fallen giant, is quite private. We encountered quail, rabbits, and a doe with its tiny fawn on our last visit; they were attracted to the grounds by a small creek that runs through camp.

To reach Monte Cristo you will have to drive 20 miles north of La Cañada along steep, windy roads, with the stretch on CR N3 showcasing highly dramatic craggy peaks. There is no let down at the campground, either, which is tucked under sycamores and oaks in a mountain knoll (3,600foot elevation) deep in the Angeles National Forest. Agaves and pines round out a setting that is often overrun with family groups, especially on weekends. And no wonder, given that deep sites, surfaced with a mix of grass and dirt, are planted well apart along the camp's figure-8 loop, which is bisected by a small creek. Those spots are largely comparable, though we prefer the ones at the far end of the camp's entrance because that area picks up less road noise. As is typical of many national forest properties, security and maintenance are lax, with the result that litter is often to be found in the fire grates.

There is more than merely the aura of a resort town to Pinecrest, it actually delivers the goods. Activities range from hiking and bicycling to fishing, swimming, and boating; amenities include an expansive picnic area near the water, a marina, and, across the street, a post office, restaurant, and general store stocked with everything from fresh produce to liquor to hardware. The huge campground, which is 30 miles east of Sonora, is handsomely framed by its high altitude (5,600 feet) Sierra Nevada locale, rubbing up against the clear blue Pinecrest Lake, with pine and granite studded hills all around. Even Shangri-la has its downside, however, and Pinecrest is no different. Sites of grass and pine needles pinch a bit as space is at a premium over the camp's multiple series of loops. That constricted feeling is accentuated by the presence of private vacation cabins off to one side of the property, which also detract from the rustic atmosphere. Nonetheless, privacy is not bad, as thick groves of cedars, ponderosa, and lodgepole pines, as well as a widespread debris field of glacial erratics, contribute a degree of screening. The grungy, pitted rest rooms are being renovated. Three have been completed and six more will follow as soon as funding allows.

Sand and surf, in a nutshell, are two attributes that make this a central coast standout, one of the prettier stretches of beach in the area. Add to that the wintertime presence of tens of thousands of monarch butterflies, drawn to the park by its towering eucalyptus trees, and it's clear why swarms of tourists descend on the camp like ants to a picnic throughout the summer and most weekends the rest of the year. Located just off of Hwy. 1, one mile south of town, North Beach is separated from the water by a high series of dunes. These obstruct views of the ocean, but also buffer the campground from its blustery breezes. Grassy sites are level and of average size, with Monterey pines and flowering bottle brush enhancing the modest screening provided by the fragrant eucalyptus. Unlike Oceano, two miles to the south, North Beach does not allow day use, meaning that campers enjoy their piece of shore without the added crush of day-trippers. This is also the prettier of the two camps, but its lack of hookups means that if you need electricity Oceano is the place to be.

The concession that operates Ice House delivers primitive camping conditions for its nightly fee of \$15, which seems appalling at first blush. Don't let price-gouging deter you, though, from coming to this beautiful, rough-cut campground. Its wild, unspoiled appearance is an idiosyncratic reminder of the relative youth and vitality of the Sierra Nevada range, and a bit reminiscent of Grover Hot Springs State Park, at Markleeville. Ice House reflects two sorts of environments, from the reservoir below its two undulating loops to the lofty, snow-dusted mountain peaks high above. Sites of dirt and pine needles are grouped closely together, but are well-buffered by an abundance of enormous boulders and concentrations of ponderosa and Jeffrey pines, incense cedar, and manzanita. The latter appears in especially thick concentrations in the second circuit, which also holds more of the quirkily engaging sites. With an elevation of 5,436 feet, roads in this area can be snow-covered from late October until mid-May.

When you arrive at East Shore RV Park you will be handed map of the property, which is a good thing as without it you can forget about navigating your way through its maze of loops. Located just 30 miles east of downtown Los Angeles, above the shores of Puddingstone Lake and within the Frank Bonelli Regional Park, not only is this place attractively landscaped, with undulating meadows accented by such trees as alder, eucalyptus, sycamore, magnolia, and a range of conifers, but it is well endowed with a whole host of facilities. You want boating or fishing? You've got it. Looking to play some golf? No problem. Need to hook up to the Internet? That's a "cando," too. And security is tighter than a martinet's collar, with both an entrance booth checkpoint and regular ranger patrols. That sites tend to be wedged rather snugly together only really impacts tenters. And for them East Shore has set aside a "wilderness area" meadow, a dubious amenity with undesignated sites on ground so curvaceous as to be unusable by RVs. Two small knocks on this outfit are the occasional buzz of airplanes using the neighboring county airport and rest rooms that should be equipped with real mirrors instead of the shatterproof stainless steel more commonly seen in cut-rate national forest properties.

This attractive park is just 35 miles east of downtown Los Angeles, and yet to look at its verdant grounds you might think you were in the middle of farm country. That impression is accentuated by the presence of a neighboring ranch that pens cattle up near one of Prado's two loops. The pitiful sight of so many beasts herded together in a small parcel of muddy, denuded soil is outdone only by the powerful reek of ammonia emanating from their direction, a one-two sensory punch that could convert the most committed of meat eaters to vegetarianism. You won't have much to beef about though if you bring your fishing rod to Prado, as the lake is well stocked with trout in winter and catfish in summer. Grassy sites are exposed but roomy, set under young sycamores, eucalyptus, and pines. Aim for any of 7–75, as they are not only among the shadier, but also out of view of the bovine stalag. Of the great number of amenities here, one of the more unusual is an area set aside on the lake for radio-controlled model boats.

The last time we stopped by this primitive camp we were surprised to find half a dozen motor homes in residence. Not that the dirt access road off of Western Divide Hwy. is bad—it isn't (though the internal lane verges on abominable in places). It's just that for ages Peppermint has been a refuge for budget-minded tenters. Word of its rustic appeal must have spread. There are about a dozen tables scattered around this rocky, forested mountain knoll, mostly downhill by Peppermint Creek. There is also a dilapidated outhouse, of a similar vintage to the one at Quaking Aspen, just up the road. If you want more in creature comforts, you best bring 'em with you or go elsewhere.

Sun-scorched buttes rise above the multi-pronged lake that serves as a focal point to this recreation area. How people cooled off here before the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers created Lake Success in 1961 is anybody's guess. With plenty of iced-down beer, perhaps, and that might still be considered an

essential ingredient to any summertime visit. There is a scattered presence of such trees as oak, eucalyptus, buttonwood, oleander, juniper, and various conifers throughout the double-looped campground, but shade remains scarcer than candy in a dentist's office. In a facility that appears to put function ahead of aesthetics, ramadas would be a welcome addition to the sites. But hey!, the extra exposure to the blazing sun is just one more excuse to jump in the water. Not convinced? Then try to land 26, 29, 30, or 41, some of the few, the proud, the shaded. Located just off Hwy. 190, nine miles east of Porterville, the campground is subject to traffic noise. Unfortunately, an above average amount of bottles, cigarette butts, and plastic pollute the grounds.

If you are not towing a boat to this delightful lakeside facility you will probably be in the minority. A simple fishing rod will do, though pole-less nature lovers should find the natural beauty of the setting gratifying enough. No sites verge on Lake Davis, but many of them offer excellent pinefiltered vistas of the water, and short trails make access to the shore as easy as putting a night crawler on a hook. The tidy campground's three loops wind through medium-sized Jeffrey and ponderosa pines. As a result, this facility, at 5,785 feet of altitude, is carpeted with pine needles and cones. There is a respectable amount of space between most sites, and the presence of both double units and pull-through parking simplifies the maneuvering of larger vehicles and trailers. A dump station is located on the opposite side of the street, 0.2 mile south of camp, and the Grizzly store, two miles south across the dam, has basic supplies and pay showers.

Spring Creek is a splendid oasis of pines and saltbush, and a smattering of aspen, standing in contrast to the refreshing blue-green waters of Frenchman Lake, just below the campground. This arid, mountain-fringed, high desert domain sits on a hillside that is handsomely studded with volcanic rocks and tufa outcroppings. There is little screening between the level, pine needle-carpeted sites, but they are decently spaced apart, with manyeven those on the upper tier of the double loopenjoying great pine-filtered views of the lake. While sites on average are rather spacious, the central positioning of fire rings and tables may pose problems for campers with large tents. Despite the rock-rimmed shore, access to the lake for boating and fishing is as easy as capsizing a canoe, with a boat ramp located at Frenchman Campground, just up the road. Of the reservable spots, the best for space, privacy and water view are 30, 32, and 35. The concession that operates this Plumas National Forest facility offers double-size sites for twice the price of singles, and small bundles of firewood for \$6, indications that inflation is making a comeback.

Picos comes up a winner. It lies in a hillside riparian forest just a half hour drive from downtown San Diego, and a little less than that from the San Diego Wild Animal Park in Escondido. The dirt and grass surfaced sites, spread out over several loops, are amply shaded by eucalyptus and live oak, with several enormous 300-year-olds among the latter. Of the many amenities here, highlights include a jogging track, soccer field, hiking trails, and a kids-only fishing pond. The park loses points, though, for its rundown lavatories, in which three of four toilets in one men's room were out of commission on a recent weekend visit, and such noise problems as many low-flying aircrafts and neighborhood dogs barking throughout the night. Drivers of long RVs should plan to reserve site 56, one of the few with pull-through parking, while 9 and 12 are the more private, roomier tent options.

During a recent winter, snow and rain combined with gale-force winds to topple dozens of trees in Antlers RV Park. A lesser property would have been left scarred for years to come by such decimation. Not Antlers. The trunks and limbs were carved up and hauled away, and the campground continues to be a standout beauty. Its lovely perch above the iridescent Shasta Lake offers campers a balance of sun and shade among an abundance of such trees as oak, pine, cedar, and manzanita. Most sites are level, grassy, and surprisingly spacious for an RV-oriented campground. Even those with full hookups have plenty of elbow-room, with 108 one of the best in that class. In the ever-popular lakeview area, A38 and A39, decked with ramadas as well as shade trees, are the prime slots. Tent campers, too, will find more than enough space to spread their canvas, with the forested loops, where mossy boulders accentuate the natural look, providing the most privacy. Although Antlers is a mere two miles from I-5, surprisingly little road noise reaches it.

Heading north toward Lone Pine along US 395, a sign points the way to Fossil Falls, a geological site and campground. The falls in question are not fossilized, but rather a fantastic flow of hardened basaltic lava, spewed out of the eastern Coso Mountain range during a massive eruption 440,000 years ago. This little-known campground lies in a volcanic debris field in the arid Rose Valley, between the green-dappled Sierra Nevadas to the west, China Lake naval base to the east, and a red cinder peak marking its north side. The sublime beauty of this desolate place is not universally appreciated, especially as the grounds are exposed to an unyielding sun and periodic high winds. There are no shade trees here, just low-lying desert scrub across the mildly undulating terrain. Level cinder-based sites, spread well apart over three loops, are among the largest we've come across, and they take advantage of volcanic tufts, spires and mounds as privacy screening. Though this Bureau of Land Management facility lacks potable water and trash pick-up, the absence of ramadas is the most sorely felt omission.

If time weighs heavily on your hands during your stay at Lake Perris you will only have yourself to blame. That's because this recreation area has a little bit of something for everyone, from fishing and boating (rentals available at the marina), hiking, biking and horseback riding trails, and a Native American museum (open Wednesdays and weekends), to a pair of swimming beaches and a waterslide (summer season only). It is a pretty park, too, with lush grassy turf sloping gently toward the water and rocky hills coloring the horizon. Sites are open but spacious, many shaded by conifers, eucalyptus and pepper trees. That shade is essential, as summer temperatures typically hit 110°, scorching the grass brown and sending everyone with a swimsuit into the water. The weather is milder in the spring, when a fabulous explosion of wildflowers makes this place a must-see. Boating to Alessandro Island for a romantic picnic is considered by many to be a Lake Perris rite-of-passage.

Beal's Point is just 20 miles from Sacramento, a convenient proximity that explains why camping reservations are essential between May and mid-September. Once you get over the shock of so many people-and the absence of lake vistas from the campground-you'll be in for a treat. That's because this is a splendid woodland habitat that offers a little bit of something for everyone. At the top of that list are grassy campsites that are roomy, recessed, and shaded by conifers, blue and live oaks, and buttonwood trees. The many walk-ins make tenting here especially pleasant, though RVers do well with any of 16-38, which are level and shady. The lake features 75 miles of shoreline when it is full, and there are hiking, riding, and biking trails in the surrounding foothills. The marina offers both wet and dry slips (the latter when the water drops below 435 feet), as well as a snack bar, marine supplies, and fuel. If you have ever wondered what campgrounds were like in the old days, wonder no longer: Camp Switzerland may be just what you are looking for. Mesa Campground offers something for everyone, from private, well-screened sites situated among thick stands of manzanita, oak, and ponderosa pines, to a network of bike paths and hiking trails. And don't overlook Silverwood Lake, below the campground, which serves triple duty among swimmers, boaters, and anglers. No wonder that reservations are advisable, especially for weekends, from late spring through September. At a distance of less than 30 miles from San Bernardino, Mesa is close enough to Los Angeles to be hugely popular as a getaway destination and yet far enough out that it occasionally has problems with black bears raiding its dumpsters. You are more likely to hear, though, distant sounds of planes, trains, and automobiles, and, alas, your neighbors, as enforcement of quiet hours tends to be lax. Fortunately, sites are well dispersed through a series of eight loops, with numbers 101-106 appealingly shady and both 76 and 86 a little more secluded than the rest. The only site with a water view is 16, but gusty evening breezes make that a mixed blessing.

San Clemente seems to be in a constant state of renewal. A few years ago a tent loop was renovated, about a year later it was the picnic area's turn for a face lift, and recently the electrical hookups were upgraded. Now if only some vegetation could be planted in the RV hookup loop to provide buffers between its crowded slots. Until that happens, your best bet is to steer toward the two loops that lack hookups; marginally more spacious and with a bit of screening, sites there are also positioned on grass instead of the dirt surface of the RV lot. Especially roomy are 83 and 85, both of which overlook the beach and cliffs. Monterey pines, eucalyptus, and flowering ceanothus are scattered throughout the park, lending an attractive look to the domain. Less appealing is the occasional use of prison labor for landscaping.

San Onofre State Beach is composed of two campgrounds, the Bluff Area by the beach and San Mateo, one mile inland off of I-5. Forget about privacy at the Bluff Area, where sites are lined up one after another on a tiny stretch of turf alongside the parking area. Tranquility is another lost cause: trains hurtle along tracks just 100 feet from camp, basically paralleling its linear layout, and a few yards beyond an interstate reverberates to the continuous roar of traffic. Then there is the multitude of college-age campers that descends on the park from mid-spring through early September, filling it with the off-key melodies of their raucous partying and straining facilities beyond the capacity of the maintenance staff. Sites at San Mateo, by contrast, while not large, are at least scattered over three loops and enjoy decent privacy. The atmosphere is calmer—dare we say more sedate?—and setting more lush, though fine views of the coastal hills are somewhat offset by opposing vistas of power lines and produce fields. Both camps suffer from occasional helicopter overflights from neighboring Camp Pendleton. The best time to visit is from early spring through mid-summer, while the grass in the sites is still soft and green. Your San Mateo receipt covers the day-use fee at the Bluff Area beach.

Short of setting up camp in Golden Gate Park, it is hard to imagine bivouacking much closer to San Francisco than in Candlestick RV Park. This facility is located directly across the street from 3Com Stadium, formerly Candlestick Park, just five miles south of downtown. While its parking lot layout and the chain link security fence that encompasses the compound are not very appealing, management has done an admirable job of sowing a variety of exotic plants and trees around the perimeter. As usual for this sort of property, parking slots seem crowded together on the asphalt with no screening and negligible shade. A narrow strip of grass has been set aside for tenters but it seems to get more traffic from dogs, despite a rule that mandates dog-walking outside the fence. The rest rooms, on the other hand, tend to be immaculate. Just down the street is Candlestick Point State Recreation Area, with a bike trail, picnic area, and Bay access via a boat ramp. Also nearby, alas, is the airport, with loud flyovers common enough to make you wish your RV had double-pane glass. A shuttle service is available to ferry campers to downtown San Francisco.

Pacific Park RV Resort is conveniently located just ten miles south of San Francisco, right off of Hwy. 1 in Pacifica. It is loaded with amenities, from cable TV and Internet connections to a small swimming pool and Jacuzzi, from a horseshoe pit to a video game room. The Pacific Ocean abuts the lot, filling the air with a pleasant brininess, and a very short trail leads down to the sandy beach. The view across the busy road is not bad, either, highlighted by a wavy series of grass-covered hills. The bad news is the parking slots are wedged one against another, and there are no shade trees, no privacy, and no tents allowed. The best bet is to set up as far to the western edge of the grounds as possible, where an unobstructed view of the sun setting into the water is a killer, and the crashing surf is almost loud enough to drown out the noise of incessant air and auto traffic. Caspers Wilderness Park does not allow pets on the property for the same reason that minors must be accompanied by an adult: concern about mountain lions following a fatal attack 18 years ago. These restrictions have a positive side-effect, endowing the property with a greater degree of quietude than similar establishments elsewhere. Just eight miles inland from San Juan Capistrano and I-5, among the ranch lands and the rolling foothills of the Cleveland National Forest, Caspers occupies a transitional zone, with vegetation ranging from open grassy meadows fringed with prickly pear cacti and agaves, to sycamores and live oak. Most of the sites are rather close to each other, with about half in open grassland and the remainder appealingly sheltered under the high canopy of

aged oaks. In spring there is just enough water flowing through the campside creek to generate a tremendous insect population. So either bring plenty of repellant or aim to bivouac from midsummer on, when biting bugs should no longer be a problem. There are some fine hiking and riding trails in Caspers, as well as a separate horse camp.

In 1854 Samuel Taylor stumbled into a redwood grove here and was so enchanted by the sight that he promptly purchased 100 acres of land and set up a paper mill. Present-day visitors to this dark, densely forested park may wish that he had exercised less discretion in his timber harvesting to allow more sunshine to penetrate. No matter, it remains an appealing woodland of intermingled second-growth redwoods, tan oaks, madrones, laurels, and Douglas fir. The compact campground is tightly woven through two loops, with small dirtsurfaced sites rather crowded together. Although the preserve is open to RVs and even has six pullthrough spots, narrow cornering and limited parking space make it more practical for tenting. Yet even the nylon roof set may find most sites a bit shy of elbowroom. Of the two circuits, there is slightly more space and privacy in Orchard Hill (numbers 25–60). If you plan on coming between May and Oct., you will need to reserve far ahead. **BASICS**

The two campgrounds in this state preserve are very average in nearly every respect. San Simeon Creek is the more developed, with rest rooms equipped with showers, water fill-up, and dump stations for RVs, and good-sized Monterey pines sprinkled along its five paved loops. One of those circuits, adjacent to a noisy highway overpass, is reserved for tents. That awkward position makes the more primitive Washburn, up the hill along the park road, a more peace-

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ful option for sleeping in nylon shelters. The cinder surface to Washburn's twin loops is smooth and the vault toilets are well-maintained. In both camps sites are level and grassy, but in need of more shade trees. The high use this rather ordinary park receives throughout the year has little to do with the neighboring beach (which, like the campgrounds themselves, is often cloaked in fog). Rather, it is the location of the magnificent Hearst Castle just five miles north on Hwy. 1 that makes this the ideal overnight spot either before or after visits to the mansion. Just remember to book your tours at (800) 444-4445 well in advance.

Confusion is an understandable state of mind for first-time visitors to Cachuma Lake. For one thing, this is a huge campground, with more than 500 mostly level, grassy sites dispersed through an intricate maze of loops. For another, though the recreation area is less than 20 miles from Santa Barbara, the large shimmering body of water is surrounded

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by the relatively undeveloped Santa Ynez and San Rafael Mountains, giving the impression that you are much farther out than you really are. There will be no roughing it here, though, because Cachuma has just about every possible amenity necessary to comfortable camping (and a good deal that probably aren't), including a snack bar and on-site gas station, and rentals of various size boats, bikes, golf clubs, and even yurts. The large domain is semiforested with mature sycamores, oaks, manzanita, and holly, and if most sites lack privacy, at least a good percentage overlook the water. At an elevation of only 800 feet, weather at this park is pleasant throughout the year. Be sure to check out the excellent nature center (open weekends) for its Native American exhibits and to make reservations for naturalist-led wildlife cruises.

The bad news about this state-run property is that many sites border the park road and some industrial buildings, and if you happen to occupy one of those near the railroad tracks you may confuse a passing freight train with an earthquake. The good news? Never mind the distant off-shore oil platforms, a fair number of sites enjoy stunning views of the ocean, and the crashing surf nearby will drown out most of the noise emanating from your neighbors. The campground, which features an attractive balance of palm trees, eucalyptus, conifers, and sycamores, is broken into four separate sections, with Santa Cruz, Santa Rosa, and San Miguel providing beach access, while the shady Anacapa is situated away from the water. Not so coincidentally, the latter is the quietest, least crowded area in which to camp, while the former three loops feature sandy sites that are packed together like sardines in a can. The beach at Carpinteria, which is just one mile from Hwy. 101, 12 miles south of Santa Barbara, is also open to day-use and picnicking, and a large grassy meadow near it is excellent for kites and frisbee.

El Capitan is not your typical beach campground. Though its four loops are set amidst a series of coastal bluffs, there is more of grass and dirt than sand in the surprisingly roomy, agreeably private sites. And aside from the time you spend on the beach, you won't need a parasol: much of the domain, which is just off Hwy. 101, 17 miles northwest of Santa Barbara, lies within a lush forest of live oak, with a few eucalyptus, sycamores, and pines tossed in for good measure. Tent campers looking for a water view should try for sites 75, 76, 78, and 80 in the third loop; RVers desiring the same will do well with 110, 111, 114, and 116 in the fourth and highest loop. The first circuit (sites 1-31), on the other hand, is one to avoid, lying nearest the railroad tracks and with no view of the ocean. This is one of the prettier beach campgrounds we've seen, with the terrain particularly green and delightful in spring.

Gaviota was completely renovated recently after flooding buried one loop in mud and stripped out the sod in the other. Aside from the mature eucalyptus trees at the edge of the dusty, drab-looking campground, the few saplings here have only recently been planted; it will be ten or more years before they mature into shade trees-if they survive. Yet this park, which lies just off Hwy. 101, 30 miles northwest of Santa Barbara, is thrillingly set between a steep series of scenic bluffs and an unspoiled beach. To reach the shore you must walk beneath a century-old railroad trestle (more of a curiosity than noise nuisance) elevated some 75 feet off the ground. The pier by the water is fine for fishing and is equipped with a hoist for launching boats. A hot spring is located in the hills above Gaviota. The strong coastal breezes funneling through camp most afternoons and evenings make the packing of a jacket or sweater advisable.

Unlike the nearby Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park, Big Basin puts campers right in the center of a dramatic redwood forest. A fair amount of sunlight filters through the dense cluster of giants-which dwarf the tan oaks and hemlocks among themand an abundance of mossy rocks and fallen trees decorate the thick blanket of redwood needles lavered on the ground. Average-sized sites offer minimal privacy but their distribution over four separate campgrounds helps to reduce incidental noise. Big Basin was established in 1902 as California's first state park. Of its more than 80 miles of trails, the Berry Creek Falls hike (11 miles round-trip), which threads past a superb series of redwoods to a pretty waterfall, should be atop your to-do list. Although just 24 miles northwest of Santa Cruz, the road into the park, Hwy. 236, is very slow and windy. Tent cabins are in separate loop and are reserved by a concessionaire at (831) 338-4745.

Spring Lake is a small body of water encircled by rolling hills of mature oaks, pines, and bay trees. It is a calm retreat just a few minutes from the heart of suburban Santa Rosa. As such, it is hardly a wellkept secret, and you are liable to have company here at almost any time of year. No problem, the grasscovered sites are large enough for you to comfortably spread out your gear, and decently spaced apart around a tree-dotted meadow. Lichen-speckled rocks are scattered across the turf, adding to the natural feel of this agreeable camp. Some sites are impacted by a gentle slope toward the water, and none are graced with a view of the lake. Still, there is a good amount of fine slots, with 28 and 30, at the loop's periphery, ideal for RVers desiring privacy. Five, 26, and 27 are equipped with pull-through parking. Tent campers who don't mind being some distance from their cars should grab 12 or 14, which are secluded and give access to the lake. Note that from October 1 through April the campground is only open on weekends and holidays.

For comfort in camping, Santee Lakes merits an enthusiastic "thumbs up." From tight security to remarkably clean rest rooms, from a heated pool to a modem in the office, RV camping does not get much better than this. California sycamores, eucalyptus, and palm trees hover over the lush, grassy grounds, which also encompass a series of seven lakes-ponds, really. One of those is dotted with tiny islands and has been set aside for canoeing and pedal boats. Two others are stocked with fish, and the great number of waterfront sites means that anglers can camp where the action is. Still, despite respectable screening and level terrain, tent camping purists are likely to find the slots a bit too close together. Their best option-short of decamping altogether-is the remote and barrenlooking Cottonwood loop (only open weekends), where an absence of such amenities as shade, screening, and barbecue grills guarantees a high level of solitude. An added plus for this park is its close proximity to a San Diego trolley stop.

Potwisha is named for the Native Americans who once roamed these parts. It is four miles north of Sequoia National Park's south entrance station, 12 miles from the Giant Forest grove of impossibly large redwood trees. Situated at 2,100 feet elevation, Potwisha enjoys an understated beauty, especially in spring when buttercups and other wildflowers decorate its tall green grass, the buckeve trees are ablaze with white blossoms, and the steeply sloping hills are ripe with flowering yucca. There is an authentically natural flavor to this campground, in contrast to the mega-sized Lodgepole, a camper-corral in the heart of the park. Several sites are equipped with pull-through parking, and those along the lower loop, nearer the river, are the more private. Number 18 is all by itself next to a large boulder; 21, 22, and 24, above the river, are roomy and shaded by oaks. Regular bear sightings make using the metal storage lockers a necessity. A highly scenic trail along the Marble Fork leads out of camp by site 17. The road from Potwisha to the Giant Forest and Lodgepole, an uphill, serpentine, white-knuckle drive, ascends 4,500 feet and is not recommended for vehicles over 22 feet in length.

The Bureau of Land Management is in the midst of an ambitious campaign to revamp many of its longneglected properties. Nowhere is that more apparent than at this hidden gem, cloaked within the overgrown heart of the rugged King Range National Conservation Area high above the Lost Coast, about ten miles inland from Shelter Cove (the last three are a dirt washboard). Tolkan now features royally spacious, gravel, and dirt sites equipped with new tables, fire grates, and back-in parking slots large enough to handle the most colossal of motor homes. The units have been distributed so far apart that it is hard to go wrong with any, but the most isolated and largest is site 7, handsomely ensconced under a massive pine tree. An old-fashioned water tower rests on four stilts in the center of the single loop, partially screened by the varied conifers, manzanita, tan oak, madrone, and ceanothus that grow so abundantly throughout this mountainous ridge.

Gadzooks! What has this book steered me to, a construction zone? may be the first words you voice when, after maneuvering down the bad camp road, you arrive at an expansive mound of river stones. Persevere; the campground, right alongside the musical, rollicking Haypress Creek (which flows into the Yuba River), is a delight and well worth your initial discomfort. Of the three separate loops to this mountainous pine forest, the middle one climbs uphill to the best sites for views of the water as well as neighboring ridge-tops. The most spacious is 32, but 33-36 also overlook the creek. On the lower tracks, 7 is set well back in a corner location and 19 is tucked behind an embankment. While the ground throughout the property is rather rocky, most dirt- and pine needle-surfaced sites have enough smooth, level ground for the staking of a tent. Parking, too, is ample for medium-size RVs and trailers. Wild Plum, which rests at 4,400 feet elevation, is often over-run by youthful kayakers, especially on summer weekends. If you find it full, there is also a fair amount of secluded sites at the less-popular Loganville Campground, 1.5 miles west of Sierra City.

Of the great number of Stanislaus National Forest campgrounds along Hwy. 108, Boulder Flat is perhaps the most appropriately named, given its granite-strewn appearance. It is also arguably one of the prettier facilities, reflecting something of a wild, high Sierra Nevada ambience. A spiny alpine ridge flanks one side of camp, the Stanislaus River purls by another, while a series of pointy peaks hover over the scene. Grass and dirt sites, punctuated by several stands of enormous red-bark cedars,

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are larger and more dispersed than at nearby Brighton Flat, and less barren-looking and exposed than those at Eureka Valley (though the latter also features an impressive array of boulders, and has the river sluicing past on two sides). It is true that Boulder Flat picks up auto noise from the Sonora Pass, but the same might be said of all the other campgrounds along this stretch of road. The town of Sonora is 50 miles west, and Dardanelle, where you will find a telephone and general store, two miles east.

D. L. Bliss was a pioneering lumberman, banker, and railroad owner whose family donated 744 acres of this land to the state park system in 1929. More than 70 years later, the campground retains an appealingly rustic look. That it lacks the "Hooverville" feel of so many other facilities its size may be chalked up to its pleasingly chaotic Sierra Nevada setting. Huge granite boulders vie for space with incense cedars, lodgepole, and Jeffrey pines across a steep hillside that ends at a sandy

beach and picnic area on the shore of Lake Tahoe. Roomy sites are tightly clustered over a series of loops, but they don't seem crowded, due to a degree of buffering provided by the boulders. For the most space and best views of the indigo water, try for the loop with sites 141–168, which also has a number of pull-through parking slots. Make time for hiking the Rubicon trail (4.5 miles, one way), which offers stellar views of the lake and a chance to see osprey nesting in the tall trees. It ends at Vikingsholm Mansion (worth a visit), at scenic Emerald Bay. The shorter Balancing Rock nature trail (half a mile long) winds through the forest to a precariously positioned granite boulder.

Wishon, at 4,000 feet elevation, is not for the tidy at heart. It's a sprawling campground that overlaps a congested tangle of trees and rocks. The boulderlarded landscape adds convincingly to the mountainous feel here, and to the difficulty in walking through the domain after dark. The unspoiled allure of this primitive, peaceful setting is accentuated by craggy Sierra ridges that seem to brush the sky overhead. Middle Fork of the North Tule River cuts the camp in half, with the more appealing sites across the small bridge, where aged, spiderylimbed oaks bestow the gift of shade. Additional shelter and screening are provided by ponderosa pines, madrone, manzanita, and cedar. Sites 20, 21, and 28, tucked behind boulders, are the most private. This national forest campground is in the southern unit of the new Giant Sequoia National Monument, making it a great base for exploring trails in the area. The host's residence is adjacent to the property.

The Wappo Indians used to call this part of the valley home until being displaced by white settlers in the middle of the nineteenth century. In honor of its first inhabitants the park maintains a small "Native American garden" of herbs and vegetables the Wappos are believed to have cultivated. Indigenous plants are featured in a more natural setting around the campground, its lollipop loop being abundantly furnished with a variety of conifers and oaks, toyon, bay, madrone, manzanita, and poison oak. Most campers gravitate to the top of the culde-sac near the latrines. The more private sites, though, are 1-9 at the front end of the drive, and their gravel parking slips are long enough to accommodate almost any size RV. One of the better trails in Bothe-Napa leads to volcanic ash cliffs atop Upper Ritchey Canyon. And for unusual amenities in a state park, how about the swimming pool, open from Memorial Day through Labor Day? That sure beats wading in the stream that trickles by one side of camp, spawning hordes of mosquitoes in the spring.

Searching for a peaceful camp where you are more likely to hear birds chirping and the tapping

of woodpeckers than another camper's voice? Then Bogard is just the place. It is situated in a mountainous-though level-pine and alder forest, with rocks, pine needle, and grass coloring the floor of sites. That there are so few sites is refreshing. Of the many good spots, the very best for privacy are 4, 6, 7, 10, and 11. We prefer Bogard as a base camp to Butte Creek, also a Lassen National Forest campground, even though the second is closer to the Butte Lake section of Lassen National Park. Bogard is used less often by hunters and has thus suffered less wear and tear during the offseason. There is no trash pick-up, and the rustic pump delivers rusty water, so plan to pack-in drinking water and pack-out your rubbish. Surprisingly, the back-in parking slots are paved.

Aside from a vaulted toilet, which is shared with hikers doing the Bizz Johnson "rails to trails" path that runs by the camp, this place has nada for facilities. If you can do without the other comforts, though, you'll have it made in the glade. Goumaz, at 5,200-feet elevation, is a thinly forested, delightfully pretty, alpine campground in a level, sunny spot right alongside the Susan River. There is plenty of elbowroom between the five sites, and four of those abut the water. Thus, it is hard to go wrong with any of these units, though site 2 enjoys a commanding view of a bend in the river and 4, which has pull-through parking (as does 1), is just 15 feet from a melodic cascade. Pine trees and grassy meadows contribute to a peaceful atmosphere that is marred only occasionally by the buzzing of a passing military jet. Biting flies can be a nuisance from mid-spring through early summer, so bring repellant. Susanville lies less than 20 miles to the east.

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The deep blue Eagle Lake is California's second largest natural body of water, a magnificent mountain lake that is ringed by ponderosa, Jeffrey and white pines, with low-slung peaks nuzzling the horizon. The beauty of the scene more than compensates for the shocking impression made by the clear-cutting of national forest land along the drive to Eagle Summit, a process that appears to be turning large patches of forest into mountain heath. Sites at Merrill are evenly distributed over six loops and are either grassy or covered in pine needles, and partially shaded by pines. Many of those lie just 100 feet from the water, with 164 and 180 the most isolated. Also worth reserving are 167, 169, 171, 172, 174, 176, and 178. Security is above average for a national forest camp, with two separate hosts patrolling the domain. Also vigilant in summer are omnipresent game wardens, something to remember if you intend to fish. Showers, pay phones, fuel, groceries, and laundry machines are available at the marina, three miles away.

So close to Lake Tahoe, and yet so far. That, in a phrase, sums up one of the more frustrating aspects of this otherwise fine state park. General Creek Campground, at an altitude of 6,250 feet, consists of several loops that wind through a level pine forest that is uphill and across the street from the lake. but offers no views of the water. There is decent screening between sites, which is fortunate, given how closely they are clustered. The circuit with units 126-175 features the most dispersed spots, while that containing 76-125 runs a close second. This is the only state park in the area to stay open all year, a boon to cross-country skiers and hardy, hot-blooded campers. Spring, though, is one of the better times to come, before the roads are clogged by tourists, and while the snow plants and manzanita are in bloom. The Hellman-Ehrman Mansion, an opulent, pine-paneled summer home built a century ago, is open for tours from July through Labor Day.

If your idea of a restful vacation spot is a quiet place to pitch your tent or park your camper, don't even think about stopping at Meeks Bay. Just 11 miles south of Tahoe City, this national forest camp is hunkered up against a bend in Hwy. 89 as it follows the contours of Lake Tahoe, subjecting it to the roar of an ongoing stream of traffic. If, on the other hand, beach time is what makes you tick, drive on in and sink your toes into the soft sandy stretch of shore here at the heart of the scenically gorgeous Meeks Bay. Soak up the rays and enjoy the hazy view of Nevada and its mountains across the lake. Or get out on the water via the boat ramp at the resort next door. As for the attractive campground, at 6,300-feet elevation, its level, sandy, and grassy sites are dispersed around a convoluted series of loops. Though they are rather exposed, many are shaded by mature Jeffrey pines, with smaller conifers, some manzanita, and young incense cedars adding to the beauty of the scene. The Meeks Bay trailhead leads into the Desolation Wilderness, across the road.

Forget the hiking and equestrian trails at Lake Skinner and its proximity to nearly a dozen wineries. There is really only one reason to visit this huge campground, and that reason is spelled f-i-s-h-i-n-g. The lake is stocked weekly from November through May, making it one of the better fishing spots in southern California for trout, bass, bluegill, catfish, and crappie. Serious anglers will appreciate the lake-wide speed limit of ten miles per hour and may want to plan their trips around the derbies held for catfish in August and trout in November, when cash prizes are awarded. Keep in mind, though, that boats must be at least ten feet long and canoes and kayaks are not permitted on the water. Of the campground itself, there are three large loops spread over grassy meadows, with few of the average-looking sites endowed with a lake view. Shade, too, is scarce, despite the scattered presence of sycamores and pepper trees. B and C loops offer sites that appear marginally less crowded together than those in loop A.

Visitors to this breathtakingly beautiful state park are in for a special treat. We're not referring to Sumeg, its reconstructed Yurok Indian village. Nor to the thriving tide pools and pretty beach. Beyond the chance of seeing passing whales from towering, pine-shrouded bluffs, Patrick's Point has an ace up its figurative sleeve: its campground is one of the finest in the entire state park system. There is a wild, untamed atmosphere to the domain, with the rock-studded undergrowth thick with ferns and moss. Three detached loop areas feature sites that are uncommonly spacious and well-screened, a generous allowance of space that grants campers a refreshing dignity of privacy. Those in the shady Abalone circuit (from 16-85) are the roomiest, while Agate's (86 -97) enjoy more sun exposure and have stunning views of the surf. The RV section, admittedly, is typically tight, but its ocean vistas are a balancing amelioration. Cabin and yurt rentals are also available.

Campers who make a practice of shying away from oversize properties with numerous loops may want to make an exception for Logger, which is so vast it has west and east entrances. In spite of its inauspicious name, there is an abundance of ponderosa pines across its hillside perch, above the south shore of the deep blue Stampede Reservoir. Sagecolored salt bush and other low-lying shrubs don't add much to the minimal screening between dirtand pine needle-surfaced sites, but in general, space and shade are above average for such a crowded campground. One of the more private sites is 22, and 39 is well-shaded, with a water view; two of the larger pull-through slots are 32, also with a lake view, and 37. Other fine options include 25, 79, 83, and 84. Logger, which is less than 20 miles from Truckee, is at an elevation of 5,949 feet, making a coat or sweater essential apparel, even in summer. Stampede Reservoir is a popular fishing spot for Kokanee salmon, so don't forget your rod. Seasonal drawdowns, however, can leave the lake disappointingly low by late summer.

At just over 46,000 acres, Lava Beds National Monument may not seem a very large preserve. It manages, though, to pack a great deal within the confines of its boundaries. Located 55 miles south of Klamath Falls, Oregon, this high desert terrain has been dramatically painted by lava runoff from the Medicine Lake volcano, and a large swath of its rugged, rocky tufa-terrain saw the final curtain drawn on the Modoc war. Most dramatically, there are over 380 lava tube caves in the park, with two dozen developed for easy-and often thrillingexploration. Most of those are a short drive from the campground, which is divided into a pair of loops. Cinder and spatter cones mark the approach to camp, and such desert scrub as sage brush, rabbit brush, bitter brush, and mountain mahogany contribute a hint of green to the bituminous landscape. Aged, gnarly junipers scattered over the undulating lava meadow shed shade on a few fortunate sites, such as the roomy, recessed B25 and both A5 and A6, the latter two also being graced with expansive valley views. At 4,770 feet of elevation, nights at Indian Well can be quite windy and cold from late October through early April. Keep an eye out for kangaroo rats after dark.

This is a neat-looking camp located near the southern entrance to Joshua Tree National Park, just seven miles north of I-10. It is a long drive from here to the park's concentration of granite boulders, which are looked upon almost as totemic objects by amateur climbers, and the celebrated stands of Joshua trees that thrive at higher altitudes. Thus, this facility is usually the last to fill, even on weekends. It is popular nonetheless among RVers, partly because this is one of the few campgrounds in Joshua Tree to provide potable water, and pull-up parking is the norm throughout the two loops. Despite the sites being rather small and closely situated, most are pretty well screened by a mix of mesquite, jojoba, cholla cacti, and other desert scrub. Hidden Valley is fairly typical of the decidedly primitive campgrounds in Joshua Tree National Park. There is no telephone, no water, and the only shade comes from the oversized boulders that decorate much of the park. It is those boulders, composed of tan-colored monzo-granite, that lend Joshua Tree much of its visual appeal. Unfortunately, because monzo-granite is enticingly easy to scale, campground boulders attract amateur climbers at all hours of the day (and occasionally night), something privacy-seekers should keep in mind when selecting their site. The sandy sites here are fairly spacious and decently far apart, with creosote bushes, Joshua trees, and rabbit brush complementing the rocky terrain. Spring, when wildflowers pop up all over the desert, is our preferred time to visit this area, with autumn and the milder temperatures it brings running a close second. Daytime temperatures are mild from late October through March, but nights can be downright icy. Outside of summer months, when the desert heat is blistering, campgrounds fill up most weekends. Beware of beggar coyotes prowling the grounds.

You do not need to have a fishing rod or boat to enjoy Lake Mendocino, but it will certainly add to your pleasure. This green gleaming body of water receives quite a lot of use, with most of that falling between Memorial Day and Labor Day. Ky-en (also rendered Kyen) is typical of the three campgrounds here (a fourth, Miti, is a boat-in camp), nestled against a sloping hillside between Hwy. 20 and the lake. The most popular sites abut the shore, with 75, 82, and 103 the most private. The screening and shade are far better, though, up the hill where the loops snake through such varied vegetation as juniper, pine trees, oak, toyon, manzanita, and flowering ceanothus. Best of that section are 18 and 22 (both with pull-through parking), and 15, 16, 26, and 42. Security is good, with regular ranger patrols and entrance gates that are locked between 10:30 p.m. and 7:30 a.m. Rest rooms, though, could use a face-lift, and the grounds are disturbingly littered with bottles and cans.

Forget the jokes about "doughboy" campers and "poppin' fresh" fish: Lake Pillsbury is one pretty haven for boating, fishing, hiking, or just lazing around. There are four campgrounds in this region of the Mendocino National Forest, with Oak Flat, two miles up the road, offering better lake access than Pogie Point. The former, though, is a primitive facility and there is some truth to the waggish suggestion that this status owes more to the people it attracts than its limited amenities. Pogie Point is marginally better in the creature comforts department (though its latrines could use more regular maintenance), but leagues ahead in aesthetics. It rests above a tiny cove that is ideal for launching canoes and kayaks. The grounds are thinly forested with tan oak, moss-covered pines, madrone trees, and oversized manzanita. Sites along its double loop range from uncomfortably small and exposed to reasonably roomy and recessed. Elk, black-tailed deer, and wild turkey frequent these parts.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers created this reservoir in 1964 and continues to manage it. Which is not to suggest that you'll be rousted out of your sleeping bag by reveille at 0500 hours. It's more likely that the roar of motorboats will get you up, as this is a popular-though seldom fullboating and fishing spot. The only overt reminders that this is army land are the presence of uniformed volunteers at the entrance booths. In a sense that's a shame, since the oak-fringed, grassy meadows of the three camp loops, which slope water-ward, could tolerate more thorough litter control. On weekend nights, too, excessive noise, including barking, wandering dogs, can be severe enough to make you want to call in the MPs. Yet sites are well dispersed, if somewhat open, and many are shaded by toyon, pines, and oaks. There are also 30 boat-in spots available (first come, first served) from May through September. Oak Knoll, the primitive overflow area, costs \$6 less per night and offers a few decently private, lake view sites.

Lake Kaweah is a refreshing body of water that provides welcome relief in a part of the state where summer starts early and runs late. Its level was so high last spring that several of Horse Creek's sites were underwater. Nonetheless it remains a popular weekend retreat for area families, and for good reason: you can soak yourself in Kaweah's cool waters while the campgrounds in Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks are still under snow. Nestled in the Sierra foothills at an elevation of 694 feet, Horse Creek's environment is framed by the boulder-streaked, grassy ridges that hover over it. Nearer at hand, sites are plentifully shaded by oak, sycamore, buckeye, and cottonwood trees. An elongated loop, with three spur circuits, puts a great number of grass and dirt sites right at the edge of the lake. Privacy-seekers, though, should look toward higher ground, where sites 4 and 5 are roomy, set back from the camp lane, and enjoy a premium vantage of the water. The marina at Lemon Hill has propane and basic supplies.

The rolling grass-covered hills that make up this highly scenic park are dappled with live oak, knob cone pines, and juniper. If the extraordinary valley views don't take your breath away, you had better check your pulse! Or come back in spring, when an explosion of wildflowers should stimulate even the most colorblind of campers. There are three campgrounds here set at different altitudes, with the noreservations Junction the least appealing. We prefer the Juniper loop (3,000-feet elevation) because, in a park where sites run toward petite, Juniper's are the larger and better screened. Additionally, many are blessed with outstanding westward vistas. Prime among many fine choices is number 20, detached from its neighbors and nursed by a superannuated, overhanging tree. In summer months when the heat intensifies, the cool, shady Live Oak loop (1,450-feet elevation) is the sounder choice. As the risk of wildfires escalates in summer, the park may close. Plan to call ahead, therefore, for June through September visits.

Too often beach-side campgrounds are a compromise in comfort, especially in the southern part of the state. Sites are compact, they are laid out in a parking lot, there's no view of the water, trains thunder by at regular intervals. Sunset State Beach, located just 15 miles south of Santa Cruz, avoids most of those pitfalls, presenting campers with a stellar setting in the process. Plenty of shade is provided by the Monterey pines and eucalyptus trees that thrive throughout the property's three loops, yet sun-worshippers will appreciate that there is also an abundance of open space. Level sites are grassy, surprisingly roomy, and buffered from ocean breezes by a series of high sand dunes. Arguably, the most appealing loop is South Camp, with 26 particularly private and 25 offering a decent ocean view. The sandy beach is stunningly gorgeous, though slightly marred by the presence of a cookiecutter housing development at its south end. Surf fishing here is reportedly very good. If you value tranquility don't even think about arriving on weekends from Easter through Labor Day.

Gold was discovered in the Trinity River in 1848. The rush that followed left its mark on this entire region, from hillsides washed away with hydraulic pumps to the colorful names attached to various locales. Tannery Gulch is an example of the sec-

ond, and fortunately in its beautiful pine-forested perch above the jade-green Trinity Lake there is little evidence of the first. A few oaks and dogwoods are sprinkled among the tall conifers, and while the forest is fairly dense, a good deal of sunlight radiates through the canopy. As in any hilly area, some sites lack level ground. Most, though, are fine, being above average in spaciousness and distributed reasonably far apart over the property's five loops. Among the better choices for space and their partial views of the lake are 33, 34, 35, 40, 41, and 42. Most people come here for the water sports, but hikers (and horseback riding enthusiasts) won't have to sit idly by watching the moss grow: there are many outstanding trails immediately to the north in the Trinity Alps Wilderness. Weaverville is 12 miles south along Hwy. 3.

Some jokingly refer to this campground as "Rock Bottom," but you will probably not be laughing if you roll in hauling a motor home. That is because the area designated for RVs, right by the boat launch, is a paved parking lot with no shade trees or privacy. At least it is near the water, a good thing since you'll want to spend most of your time swimming or boating in summer, when it is so hot in these parts you could fry a trout on the blistering pavement. Tent campers fare far better with grassy walk-in sites situated on an oak- and pine-shaded knoll overlooking Whiskeytown Lake. A number of those are just a few steps from the park loop, but there is less litter and more privacy as you walk farther toward the lake. On average, the walk-ins are surprisingly level, and though many are wedged closely together, they are decently buffered by manzanita, madrone, and ceanothus. The concession that operates this National Park Service property, which is located 13 miles west of Redding along Hwy. 299, needs to devote more attention to the dilapidated rest rooms and neglected grounds. Note that personal watercrafts (e.g. jet skis) are not permitted on Whiskeytown Lake.

There are campgrounds worth building a vacation around, little islands of paradise one would willingly drive hours to reach, places where the passing of time is happily marked in days, even weeks, and when the moment finally arrives-all too soon, alas-to decamp, sighs of resignation involuntarily rise up from one's chest. Then there are the in-transit campgrounds, those we use while on our way to someplace else. Hidden Valley falls into the second category. It is a pleasant, averagelooking camp, conveniently located just off of US 101 about midway between Eureka and San Francisco, six miles north of Willits. Its single lane leads gently uphill from the entrance and by several long-term RVs, past pines, oaks, locusts, and bay trees. The most private and quiet of the somewhat closely grouped sites are 42 and 43, ensconced at the far end of the acreage. Other grass- and dirt-based sites worth reserving include 23, 25, 26, and 28. Isabella Lake is a Mecca of sorts for windsurfing, waterskiing, and year-round fishing. Cottonwoods skirt its meandering shoreline, whereas oak trees and pines populate the higher ground, especially around Tillie Creek, on the lake's western rim. The rocky locale in the foothills of the Sierra Nevadas is attractively wild, in a sun-baked area of wavy brown hills. There is plenty of shade throughout most of the multiple loops, with the exception of sites nearest the water, which are uncomfortably exposed. Across the domain, units are so shallow and small that tent campers will find it challenging to use the fire ring without singing their nylon. There are some larger-sized spots available in the type three and four categories, but none may be reserved by specific number. Thus, you have no guarantee of getting a shady site, or even a lake view. A distressing amount of broken glass litters an otherwise tidy camp. Basic supplies and laundry machines are available in Wofford Heights.

Given a choice, it is best to see Yosemite Valley in late spring, when its many waterfalls are at their peak and the dogwoods are in bloom. You'll be joining thousands of others then, so make your campground reservations well in advance. There are three campgrounds situated near each other, and where you stay may come down to the one with available space. If possible, aim for North Pines, which is superior for its views of the granite environs and its thrilling position at the confluence of the Merced River and Tenaya Creek. Like the neighboring camps, this is a family-friendly atmosphere that makes a great launching point for a number of excellent hikes. Level sites are, alas, packed rather closely together, and the many stands of lodgepole pine and oak provide only minimal screening. Best for privacy and access to the river are 136, 502, 503, 504, and 506. Do pay attention to the bear warnings, use the metal food lockers, and keep a whistle-or other noise maker-handy after dark. The nearest gas station is at Crane Flat, just outside the valley.

Summer doesn't last long in Yosemite National Park's high country, which translates to a short season for Tuolumne Meadows Campground, elevation 8,600 feet. Perhaps it's that scarcity of available time that lends an extra frisson to the delights of being in this glacier-wracked wilderness camp, which is only 20 miles west of Lee Vining. It is surprisingly attractive, given its enormous dimensions. Young lodgepole pines rise up off ubiquitous slanting slabs of granite and poke past giant boulders, while the fresh, clear Tuolumne River twists and bends, churning noisily by the campground. In late spring, and after heavy rainfalls, the river brims to the very edge of sites, verging on overflowing the campground. Of this camp's two sections, the A loops run closer to the river and offers vistas of Lembert Dome. Best for views, river access or privacy are A 50, 51, 52, 55, 63, 65, 66, 67, 71, 74, and 89. Sites in the B area are in a more forested setting, recessed from the road and a touch roomier. We find the \$18 fee outrageous, given the austere facilities, but if you don't take the site, someone else will. The Tioga Rd. closes in winter, depending on snowfall; call ahead if traveling in late fall or early spring.

Sitting in a camp chair, gazing over the South Fork Merced River as the afternoon sun radiates through the oaks, cedars, and cinnamon-barked ponderosa pines onto the enormous boulders protruding from the hilly domain, you may well feel a part of Eden. Go ahead and look for snakes, though bears are more likely nighttime visitors. Wawona, 21 miles north of Oakhurst, near Yosemite's southern entrance, is one of the national park's prettier, more sedate campgrounds. It is also one of the more spacious, as its series of loops are elongated alongside the Merced, rather than being concentrated one against another. As a result of that thoughtful layout, dirt- and grass-covered sites seem less jammed together, and a high number are favored with waterfront locations. Highly recommended are 34 and 37, and to a lesser extent, 51-53; while tent campers should consider such prime river sites as walk-ins 1-4. Away from the water, 42 and 44 are among the more private. The nearby Mariposa Grove trail leads into a forest of numerous spectacular sequoia trees, as well as many other impressive conifers.

Tree of Heaven is the common name for Ailantus altissima, a non-native tree that grows in this small campground, which lies just eight miles west of I-5. The forest service has thoughtfully installed a sign informing visitors that Ailantus altissima were "planted by early settlers for soil conservation and resistance to air pollution." That they were a fastgrowing source of shade is a more likely reason miners settled on them, something campers can be glad of too. Pines, junipers, and maples round out the shady mix of trees here, with grassy, level sites evenly spaced out along a single loop. The grounds and limited facilities show none of the neglect so ubiquitous to forest service campgrounds elsewhere. On the contrary, scrupulous manicuring may leave some campers feeling that the "wilderness" has been snipped right out of the domain. The frothy waters of the Klamath River, which is popular for its rafting opportunities, churn right alongside the property. A fish-cleaning station is located next to the river.

There is quite a lot to like about Yucaipa Regional Park, from its easy-to-find suburban location just five miles off of I-10, to the lushly manicured grounds that include three ponds stocked with trout and catfish and a one-acre swimming lagoon. Add to this a sandy beach and a pair of 350-foot waterslides, pull-through parking large enough to handle most of the larger RVs, and a separate area for tents complete with soft, sandy pads, and you have the makings for good family fun. Security is tight, with a gate that typically closes at dusk, and there are hosts in residence throughout the year. Critics may carp that the handsome mix of trees does not do much to shade sites, but at least they don't obscure the fine view of the San Bernardino Mountains
